

MUST CALL ECONOMIC CONFERENCE SAYS WIRTH

Former German Chancellor Says
It Is America's Duty to Call
Conference—Unless U. S. Does
Nothing, War Will
Break Out Again

Berlin, Nov. 17.—Joseph Wirth, retired chancellor of Germany, today issued a statement in which he urged the United States to call an economic conference to discuss the world economic situation. He said that unless such a conference is called, the world will be plunged into a new world war.

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Consolidation of Railroads Into Few Systems Proposed

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 17.—Consolidation of the railroads of the country into a few great regional systems, believed by many authorities to be the only solution of present transportation difficulties was before the interstate commerce commission today.

Hearings commenced on the proposed consolidation of the Northern Pacific with the Burlington and the Great Northern with the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul to be known respectively as systems 14 and 15.

The commission has previously held hearings on suggested consolidations of roads in southeastern states.

Today's hearings, as were previous ones, are being held behind the authority of the transportation act of 1920. They are to bring out whether the roads involved are willing to submit to the grouping proposed by the commission and to develop what opposition exists to its plan.

Recent reports from St. Paul, stronghold of Hill interests, indicated that the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific, so-called Hill roads, would interpose before the commission a counter plan to be permitted to consolidate with the Burlington. Such a consolidation would reflect the dream of the late James J. Hill, founder of the first two named roads and railroad wizard of the northwest.

Officials here, however, doubt that this plan will be allowed. The transportation act prescribed that the consolidation proposed by the commission must preserve competition in the regions where they were effective. In drafting system 14 and 15, the commission has endeavored to achieve two great parallel competing lines to serve the northwest.

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COLORADO RIVER PROJECT LEADERS AGREE IN MAIN

SANTA FE, N. M., Nov. 17.—Arrival of governors and representatives of the several states in the Colorado river basin today was awaited by members of the Colorado river commission following an announcement yesterday of an agreement on the main principles affecting allocation of the waters of the Colorado river.

In a formal statement issued yesterday, the commission proposed definite allocation of the waters between the northern and southern divisions of the states and extended an invitation to the executive of the states to come to Santa Fe and give their views on the plan.

The necessity for immediate erection of control works to protect the Imperial valley against disastrous floods was also pointed out.

The statement read: "The commission, comprising representatives of the seven states of the basin, and the federal government, met in conference at Santa Fe, N. M., on November 15, 1922, and reached an agreement upon the main principles of a treaty to be entered into between the seven states of the basin and the federal government for the division of water and the control of the Colorado river."

The plan provides for a division of the basin into two groups, covering the states of Utah, Colorado, Wyoming and New Mexico on the one hand, and California and Nevada on the other. The lower division, comprising California and Nevada, is to be known as the "lower division," and the upper division, comprising Utah, Colorado, Wyoming and New Mexico, is to be known as the "upper division."

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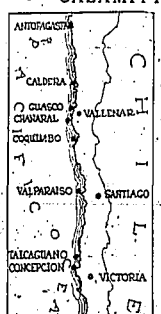
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AREA OF CHILEAN CALAMITY

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SHIP SUBSIDY BILL WILL BE UP NEXT WEEK IN CONGRESS

Republicans Will Force It

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 17.—The administration ship subsidy bill will be taken up in the house next week under a special rule which the administration hopes will prevent amendments from the floor, republican leaders announced today. They said they will fight to force the bill through.

At a conference between speaker Charles Campbell of the House and members of the republican steering committee, it was decided to discard the idea of "gag rule" prohibiting amendments to the bill, but to insist on the use of the "gag rule" as a means of forcing the bill through.
