AMERICA MUST CURE ECONOMIC CONFERENCE SA'S WIRTH

**Former German Chancellor Says
It Is America's Duty to Call
Conference—Unless U. S. Does
Both, Saar and Ruhr Will
Operate Europe.**

WIRTH'S NOTE.—Dr. Joseph Wirth, minister of interior of Germany, has said to play an active part in his country's government, as leader of an economic conference, unless America does somewhat for the manner of Lloyd George in the house of commons.

Friedrich von der Heydt, president of the German industrial chamber of commerce, has said: "We must have a right to talk freely of international affairs. In the first instance, our government would like to make available to the U. S. D. P. D. With tales of the past the better Americans must be made to understand the nature of the damage that will result from inaction."

WIRTH, Nov. 17.—America must call a conference, unless it is her duty, Dr. Wirth, former chancellor of Germany, declared in an interview with *the Daily Times* of Chile.

"Americans must have a hand as possible and must call a conference which will deal with the problem from the point of view of the people."

"Americans now have qualities they rarely like gentlemen, too. On the other hand, the people of America don't. America have official representations; Americans have official representations; can she play an active role in the conference?"

"I have no answer," he said. "After what you said, I am afraid I have to say, 'I have done my best to fulfill the

RAISE BUGS TO FIGHT BUGS

French Scientists Breed Insects and Birds That Are Enemies of Fruit, Destroying Pests.

There is a quaint institution in Mentone, in the south of France, known as the Insectarium, where learned professors of biology and entomologists breed bugs and other insects.

Mentone is in the center of an important horticultural district, and the object of the Insectarium is to get rid of injurious insects that prey upon plants and ruin the orchards.

The orchards have suffered severely through the ravages of their enemies, and the orchardists have become quite alarmed. Their experts discovered that there three species of bugs are the natural enemies of the mealybug, which is a serious pest. These are the lacewing, which feeds on the eggs of the mealybug, and the red ant, which feeds on the larvae.

The institution is also breeding certain species of ladybirds to destroy the aphid, and the red ant to combat the orange and lemon tree. These ladybirds have been brought from Australia and California.

The institution is nothing less than an open-air laboratory, consisting of a large private house and an acre of ground. In the laboratory are rows upon rows of plants and jars, the latter containing insects which are the natural enemies of the pests.

The institution is also breeding various species of birds to destroy the fruit-eating insects.
