The warning of the Idaho inspector for the United States on hog cholera is worthy of consideration by every grower of hogs on this tract. There may be no hog cholera but, to show a little caution to prevent same from appearing is the only wise plan to follow.

No one seems to be an office candidate for the position on the Twin Falls highway board and yet this is a post which involves much as far as this highway and is concerned. It means that he will have the power to expend a very large sum of money and will keep our highways in possible condition or otherwise. It is so good man's patriotic duty to accept this responsibility without remuneration and serve his fellows as a member of this board.

Statistics show that the average meat consumption last year was 25 pounds per capita less than it was in the preceding year. So governmental agencies have set on foot propaganda aimed to increase the consumption of meat. It is now declared that about of the bills that are charged to excessive meat-eating are not, after all, the result of such excess. The administration announces that it is prosecuting the campaign for greater consumption of meat in the interest of the live stock growers. Perhaps, then, there is the beef trust—about which, unfortunately, no mention is made. Why this oversight? We make bold to suggest there is yet another way to increase the consumption of meat. Suppose, for instance, the beef trust was to reduce the price of meat.

DRY CALIFORNIA

California was expected to "go wet" this fall if any state in the Union did. Yet it voted for an enforcement law which, by the testimony of the liquor advertisers themselves, is more strict in its provisions than the Volstead act. This result is as interesting economically as it is morally.

California is the greatest grape state in the country. Its prosperity was built to an important extent on its wine industry. California not only produced wine but liked wine. They feared the ruin of the grape industry by prohibition.—While the vineyards have been more prosperous than ever. Ruins and fresh grapes and unfermented grape juice have brought and are bringing far more money than wine ever brought.

That fact certainly had a great deal to do with the majority given for strict enforcement on November 11. And in Ohio, also, a big grape state, the same kind of vote was cast on the same day. All moral questions aside, it has been found in both states that prohibition pays in other ways than those usually urged by reformers.

USED WRONG WORD

While the supreme court holds that most of the applicants for citizenship must be treated individually, it makes clear that there are two naturalization zones, or Caucasian and anti-Caucasian. The decision is embarrassing because of the fact our courts have already granted citizenship to same Japanese. Under the ruling the citizenship papers will have to be revoked.

Just how Japan will view the findings of the court remains to be seen. The decision ought to settle much of the perennial controversy that arises particularly in the west and in Pacific coast states, where the Oriental race and the so-called Japanese question have been mooted since—Capital News.

The above loose use of language in a newspaper which is usually very accurate in verbal discrimination, is the sort of error that may lead to misunderstanding between peoples. The supreme court did not imply the line of demarcation to run between Caucasian and anti-Caucasian but between Caucasian and non-Caucasian. One may be a Caucasian and not be in any sense against someone who happens not to be a Caucasian. The great tribunal which decided, and rightly decided, the question regarding the admissibility of Japanese to citizenship, in no way reflected on the people of the Japanese empire. It stated in effect that most of the applicants were doubtless persons of admirable character. But they did not meet the requirements of the law of this country. What the court did was to define the law and pass on its constitutionality.

Unfortunately, some people draw with malice the same line of distinction marked out unintentionally by the Capital News. Thereafter become for reasons which seem sound to our law makers and to the majority of our people those not Caucasian are presented from becoming citizens, it follows that are must be against them, anti-Caucasian, in fact. Nothing could do more to breed international discord and lay the foundation for future war than this very error.
