



With the highway district election coming up Saturday, there was little interest in the contest, until last evening when the names of Hansen, Mayf. and Headlined of Hansen, J. H. Langford and H. Dunaway, who lives two miles west; Howie Carter, who lives at Berger on the Snake River; and Hansen, who lives north of Hansen. Carter bears the names of the candidates with him, and it is claimed he has voted twice, but failed to vote, whether registered or owner of property or not.

A. E. Pettigrove, attorney on the list of those endorsed, although unanimously endorsed by the Hansen electors at a mass meeting, his name did not appear on the list of those that each section was represented, and picked its own men. Twin Falls is not represented.

"Master Will Run."

"While I greatly appreciate the fact that they have been kind enough for the public to have this nomination, I feel that under the circumstances I cannot do justice to those who elected me to represent them in this election," said R. G. McAuley. "I accepted the place of the city commissioners after all the other commissioners had agreed to run, and I have no desire to carry out estate things and accept. I take any other position, I feel that it might interfere with my work and would be unfair to those who elected me."

Lanford Will Run.—"I have learned from reliable sources that J. B. Lanford, attorney and a member of the present board, would reconsider his decision in this connection if he could be assured that he would be elected. If reelected, Rupert Mayf. of Hollister is also mentioned. Arthur Swiney was definitely declined.
