Filer Adopts the Hot Meal Program for School Lunch

The Parent-Teachers Association that organized a week ago for a special meeting at the grade school building Tuesday evening when the time plan for serving a hot lunch in the cafeteria rooms was thoroughly discussed by the members present.

The consensus of opinion was that the time had arrived when the hot meal must be served if it is to provide the greatest amount of benefit and a motion was made and adopted that the parent-teacher association foster the movement, and begin serving a hot lunch on next Monday.

Hot Lunches.—A committee of three was appointed to select donations of vegetables and the teachers of the building were asked to furnish a case of coconuts on their list to the under-stander, and from the members and to begin serving more than enough vegetables and sugar were offered to the teachers of the building for a month, and no doubt a fall by the committee that sufficient supplies will be stored for the entire year with the exception of milk.

To begin the work next week, hot vegetable soup alternating with good vegetable soup will be served for the normal sum of 10 cents per week per child, and as the cold weather increases, a hot, beefy lunch will be served later in the year.

Last year the school cafeteria was under the management of the school board, and it was found that it was not a success. This year the school cafeteria will be managed by the parent-teacher association.

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At the conclusion of the arrangements for the cafeteria, the president appointed the following planning committee: Membership, Mrs. M. J. Good. The program of the society will be on the basis of the first Thursday in December.
