The majority have plenty to eat and plenty to keep the children warm and all in all should return thanks to the Great Creator for his kindness. Many other communities and countries are not half so fortunate as the dwellers of the Twin Falls tract.

If you would catch the full meaning of the Thanksgiving spirit buy a nice turkey or chicken and hurry over to some old family that is not able to make such a purchase. We feel sure that there are a number of families in Twin Falls who would be glad to have such a treat brought to their door tonight and who will enjoy your turkey and other goodies all the more after such a gift. There is nothing which makes the heart leap for joy like making someone else happy. If you don't think just try it.

TOILERS OF THE MIND

Outside of the mine breaker a grimy figure raised a voice that shook with precision on "The rights of the toilers". Abduhl Imperial challenge a crowd gave back a sounding cheer.

A few hours later the town was wrapped in darkness. The noise of the breaker was still, but up on the high hill above town one light burned on. There, ineffectual, within the workers did not include among "the toilers" were wracked with problems that ran from day shift to night shift, entangled by going or whining.

Sweat is the basic currency of man. "The law of nature is that a certain quantity of work is necessary to produce a certain quantity of work is necessary to produce a certain quantity of gold. One every desire must be paid for with oil". The law of sweat is imperative for all. But there are two ways in which one may fulfill his obligations by brain sweat and by human sweat. Slightly speaking, the mental workers belong just as truly among the laboring classes as the manual workers. Both are producers.

It is a fallacy to speak of those who toil with their hands, as if they alone were workers. The orator at the mine breaker committed the common mistake of unduly exalting muscular effort, thereby deriding the priceless effort of toilers in the realm of thought.

Bare minds have been the cause of every forward movement. Let us encourage them we all advance; if we hinder them we all fall. To them the work of which is to turn our faces backward. The pernicious denial of the bolder springs often from ignorance, often from envy and malice. With what sound and fury did one taunt pronounce itself the equal of ten talents.

In the cause of human progress the merest drop of brain sweat has often outweighed an ocean of human sweat. A few years of mental effort from an Edison or a Barou has often carried humanity farther ahead than centuries of war and strife.

What caused the vast increase of wealth in America in the past fifty years? A recent workman's manifesto declares, "The toilers have created all the wealth of America." Right! But let it be clearly understood that "the toilers" includes not merely those that wear overalls. "We the toilers" includes the man who burns the midnight oil long after those who sit in the pale have sunk into restful slumber.

The country has had unrivaled industrial advancement because it has always afforded the greatest incentive toward effort. For eighers have been attracted to these shores before the mind of the wealth maker has been most active. But no sooner are many of these foreigners here than they are busy striving for a leveling down, forgetting that it is the richness of reward that has made this land of promise. If America would still go forward she must continue to be a land where the sky is the limit for creative genius.

A dangerous aspect of modern social legislation is that which overlooks the labor of the mind or seeks to relate it to a secondary place, as incidental to manual labor. A true common tendency is to put a premium on brains and a discount on brain. What would be the motive for the enlargers of our wealth if this leveling down continued? We had as example in the railroads. As soon as the roads came under government direction the first step taken was to cut off 17,000,000 from the brain end, and add 700,000 to the brain end. At this the unthinking masses shouted with glee. But what happened to the railroads?

Our hope is not in systems but in men, not in governments but in the creative force of individuals. If the frontiers of American business are still to advance we must continue to encourage those toilers of the mind upon whom advancement depends. -Selma Youngs Poole.
