BRYAN AND EVOLUTION

(By JAMES D. WIELAND.)

It is not necessary to agree with Col. William Jennings Bryan in all the arguments that he uses in regard to the theory of evolution or even to reach the same precise conclusion that he does in order to find much to admire in the fight he is making against wild and misleading assertions of some and unproven hypotheses of others that are accepted as scientific axioms, and using imagination to evade the drudgery of getting facts, tell tales as unfounded as the voyage of Sinbad the sailor, and with far less foundation than the story of Santa Claus and those on innocent children who have grown up reading knowledge.

The theory of evolution is not necessarily inconsistent with the doctrine of divine intervention and creation, but there are certain hypotheses advanced as truths, and assumed as necessarily implied in evolutionary doctrine, which lay the foundation for destructive doubt in many minds, on religious subjects.

It is doubtless this fact which makes Colonel Bryan assault in such sweeping terms everything that is classified as evolution.

One of those doctrines, taught in many works, is that there is no difference in kind between the reasoning of human beings and the mental activities of lower animals. An unscrupulous child reading such statements placidly reads, with supposed admiration, of specific acts of supposed reasoning on the part of brutes, does not stop to consider whether this is questioned, and has just the right to regard the value of the assertions made.

Many of the greatest of even the modern evolutionary scientists reject as untrue or approve the essential sameness of the two sorts of mental processes.

In his work "Psychology," given to the press late last year and just received by the Twin Falls Public Library, Robert S. Woodworth, Ph. D., professor of psychology of Columbia university, says:

"Is man the only reasoning animal? The experimental work on animal learning, reviewed in one of our earlier chapters was begun with this question in mind. Previous experience on this point had been limited to anecdotes, such as that of a dog that was found opening a gate by fitting the latch with his nose, and was supposed to have been seen upon the gate in that way, and to have reasoned that if he could do that, why not a dog? The objection to this sort of evidence is that the dog's manner of acquiring the trick was not observed. Perhaps he reasoned it out and perhaps he got it by accident; you cannot tell without watching the process of learning. You must experiment by taking a dog that does not know the trick, and perhaps first 'showing him' how to open the gate by lifting the latch; but it was found that dogs and cats and even monkeys, could not learn the trick in that way.

"If, however, you placed a dog in a cage, the door of which could be opened by lifting a latch, and motivated the dog strongly by having him hungry and placing the food just outside, then the dog went to work by trial and error, and lifted the latch in the course of his various reactions, and if he were placed back in the cage, time after time, his unsuccessful reactions were gradually eliminated and the successful reaction was finally attached to the situation of being in that cage, so that he would finally lift the latch without any hesitation. The behavior of the animal does not look like reasoning. For one thing it is too impulsive and motor. The typical attitudes of the 'reasoner' whether 'lost in thought' or 'studying over things,' do not appear in the dog or even in the monkey, though traces of them may perhaps be seen in the chimpanzee and other manlike apes. Further, the animal's learning curves follow 'seeing into' the problem. In short, there is nothing to indicate that the animal recalls facts previously observed or sees their bearing on the problem at hand. He works by motor exploration instead of mental. He does not search for 'considerations' that may furnish a clue."

Just What Is Meant by Standardization

It is not a new idea at all. A good many years ago it was originated by the American Medical Association, its ultimate aim is to standardize, or in other words, to eliminate lowest competition and get control of all departments of public health by any means obtainable, and exclude any doctor who is not a so-called "regular" physician. The real blow is aimed at the osteopath. The inside ring of the medical profession would be the only people to receive any benefit from standardization of the hospital.

The public is their last consideration so far as benefits to concerned. If such is not the case why do they resort to legislation to compel the people to employ an M. D. Surely the American people are capable of choosing whom they wish to care for them in the sickroom. They demand and are allowed the right to choose their form of religion; why should they be denied the choice of their physician? Look over the list of patients of any reputable osteopath and you will see that they are representative of the best class for them in the community. They deny them the use of the hospital because they do not believe in the use of an M. D. Is unjust and un-American. The M. D.'s have had full privilege of practicing their trade in the hospital unhindered by any one; if their hospital case records are not accurate, they are their own fault, and it seems of their own members have been "irregular" or "unethical," who is to blame?

Because the druggists doctors have the right to use the hospital it is no excuse for turning it over into the hands of a select few M. D.'s so that they can say who shall and who shall not be admitted to complete with them.

The real object behind the whole plan of the A. M. A. is to crush every college osteopathic institution that does not measure up to the requirements of that political organization, or that does not control a majority of the colleges endorsed by the A. M. A. are the big universities centered upon state appropriations and endowments from founders and other private individuals. No osteopathic colleges receive any financial help from the state in which they are located, but are maintained by the profession, tuition from students, and gifts from private individuals. The great majority of osteopathic hospitals.

Any one who will study the question in connection with the osteopathic colleges, and the public with which they are concerned, need be going down to eliminate the competition.



Mining Engineer Dilates on Wonderful Resources of the Famous Copper-Camp in Letter on Subject, Railroad by July 1st, He Avers.

The wonderful resources and possibilities of the contact mining district is set forth in a copy of a letter received by Philip Young, director of the Wisconsin Mining Society from G. H. Larson, mining engineer, who is in the district planning organization of different properties. This letter reads:

In response to your letter concerning the contact mining district, I must say that so far I have only had one week time to devote to examination work and have necessarily confined my activities to that section of the district which I feel is the most promising. This section is located in the contact area of the district, which supports an average population of more than fifty houses.

This district has large bodies of high grade iron ore near the surface, which are estimated to contain in all about two, three and four billion tons of iron ore, and contain values in gold and silver which are estimated to be worth millions of dollars.

After viewing the various developed and undeveloped mines on the west side of the range, I have estimated that they may in the aggregate, produce more than fifty thousand tons of iron ore, and after about further work putting them in shape for continuous production. In view of the fact that the district is situated in an area where the district will require immediately at least one thousand miners, there will be a large demand for labor in the district, and it is estimated that the population of the district will be increased to about 100,000.

SCHOOL BOARD OPPOSES LONG TRIPS FOR TEACHERS

Informal Discussion Shows That Long Journeys for Football Boys After They Have Traced Training and One Night Interference Will Retard Classes.
