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GERMAN TOYS

At least a third of the toys that Santa Claus will bring to American children this Christmas will have the "Made in Germany" label. This is the estimate among toy importers.

German toys have definitely returned to our markets.

But not as big a scale as before the war.

In 1914 America bought \$7,180,000 worth of German toys. Last year the figure was around \$5,600,000, and this will not show much increase when final checking of 1922 imports is announced.

Toys making in Germany is in small factories, rarely employing as many as 25 workers. For the most part, the toys are produced at home, where the trade has been handed down from generation to generation.

Most of the German toys are of the inexpensive sort, though making them requires highly skilled hand labor and a sense of the artistic.

These toys are coming again, in a flood. But they are not seriously interfering with the real function of American toy makers, who are following the national trend and turning out toys that can be manufactured on a big scale.

Germany sends miniature doll furniture, lead soldiers, Noah's Ark and Christmas tree decorations.

American makers supply most of the doll carriages, wagons, model buildings, electric trains and cast iron宇宙.

Before the war, nine-tenths of our toys were imported. We have built up a big toy industry. It is suffering from competition, though it is going to survive—doing the big things and not bothering much with the "small" junk line.

In 1920 toy imports totaled nearly \$11,000,000, the highest ever. This year it will be about twice less.

How much will America pay Santa Claus for all its toys? A very conservative estimate would be \$3,000,000.

Adding up all Christmas presents, you'll have a sum running into the billions. All this makes people happy; keeps hundreds of thousands employed, and over cuts cash registers in the stores.

It's a tremendous cost. Since we pay it, let's get our money's worth—pay Santa Claus to the utmost.

Money should be—and in most cases is—the last consideration of Christmas time. Happiness is cheap at any price.

YES-MEN

One of the best slang phrases ever invented is "yes-men." A "yes-man" is a fellow who always agrees with whatever is proposed, particularly when the proposal is made by his boss or any one else with whom he seeks to win favor.

Around newspaper offices, an editor picks up the latest edition and comments, "Well, that's a good paper as we've had for some time, don't you think so?"

This "yes-man" instantly and firmly chirps their agreement.

Their idea, of course, is to flatter the editor's vanity. Then, too, by agreeing with whatever is suggested, the "yes-men" is relieved of what he deems most of all—the agony of doing his own thinking, particularly reaching a personal decision along an original line of thought.

There's a "yes-man" in every office, every factory, every social gathering, every home.

You find them in politics—the voter who votes a straight ticket, though Satan happens to be one of the candidates, and the tycoon who can always be counted on for an "Aye!" when one of his political leaders tells him how to make up his mind.

The "yes-man" follows the line of least resistance. He is a mental losser. So he rarely rises to the top.

The man with more courage of getting to the top is the "not-by-darned-sight-man." This type is aggressive, has ideas of his own, personal convictions and is willing to work for them. Mentally lazy "yes-men" follow him giddily, like sheep, follow a leader.

Careless to extremes, the "not-by-darned-sight-man" is a bulldog. On general principles, he's opposed to everything suggested, often before he knows what is proposed. Like the shipwrecked sailor, who, crawling out on the shore of a strange land, was told "There's a government here." Instantly he said, "I'm agin it."

Much evil is merely good carried to extremes.

Which are you—a "yes-man" or a "not-by-darned-sight-man"? Answer this question and you know whether, by nature, you are a toughie down the hallway or a large being towed by the tug.

There's a third type that says, "I can't answer offhand, am not sure whether I like this thing or not. Let's go it over very carefully, consider it from all sides, make up my mind after due deliberation." Then, whatever we decide, we'll go after it hammer and tongs.

In the long run, this third type rules the world and its people. For this third type represents conservative progressiveness—which obeys a law of nature by striking "a happy medium."
