Our individualism differs from all others because it embraces these great ideals, that while we build our society upon the attainment of the individual, we shall endeavor to every individual an equality of opportunity to take that position in the community to which his intelligence, character, ability and ambition entitle him; that we keep the social effort free from frozen strata of class; that we shall stimulate each of our individual to achievement through an enlarging sense of responsibility and understanding; we shall assist him in this attainment; while he in turn must stand up to the energy worth of competition.

We have learned that impulse to production can only be maintained at a high pitch if there is a fair division of the product.

We in America have had too much equality in life to feel ourselves inferior to pretending that all men are equal in ability, in character, in intelligence, in ambition.

That our system has avoided the establishment and domination of class has a significant proof in the present administration in Washington. Of the 12 men comprising the president, the vice president and cabinet, nine have earned their own way in life through economic inheritance, and eight of them started with manual labor.

Progress of the nation is the sum of progress of its individuals. Acts and ideas that lead to progress are born out of the womb of the individual mind, not out of the mind of the crowd. The crowd only feels, it has no part of its own with which it can plan.

There is developing in our people a new valuation of individuals and of groups and of nations. It is a rising vision of service.

Our American demand of equality of opportunity is a consistent militant check upon capital becoming a thing to be feared.

Our government's greatest troubles and failures are in the economic field.

To curb the forces in business which would destroy equality of opportunity and yet to maintain the initiative and creative facilities of our people are the twin objects we must obtain.

Volcano Wrongly Considered as an Enemy.

Furnish Carbon Dioxide, Without Which There Could Be No Animal Life Possible.

It might be a relief to many to be told that the "volcanoes" have something to contribute to the life of the world. Volcanoes are not enemies, but friends.

The most tremendous volcanic eruption of history, that of Mount Katmai in Alaska, in 1912, is being commemorated by Mr. Robert E. Huffer, leader of several parties sent to the scene of the catastrophe by the National Geographic society, and who discovered the Valley of the Thousand Smokes.

Mr. Huffer's trip to the volcano has been made fully successful by means of a special airplane, which he piloted for the entire distance.
