Summary of Governor Moore's Speech Given

BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 8.—Following are high lights of the governor's message to a joint session Tuesday:

Excessive freight rates must be abolished. This reduction can be expedited by the department and limited effort of all of the people of the inter-mountain section working through the utilities commissions.

The farmer is ready and anxious to advance. Diversity of crops, and collecting his products in a more compact form before shipping will help to reduce freight rates.

We must put on the brakes and turn deaf ears to pleas requiring increased expenditure. Local requests for improvements, progress and expansion should be consistently held down to the common good of all our people.

In furtherance of the earnest desire to reduce taxation, I recommend that the maximum levee and bonding limits fixed for local taxing bodies be unalterably reduced.

There are certain changes that can be made in the executive departments of the state by the elimination of some and the consolidation of others, which will result in a substantial saving.

Highways have heretofore been built by all the taxpayers, but our roads should be maintained by those who use them, including tourists, and this can be accomplished by a gasoline tax.

The present plan of nominating state and congressional officers should be continued. The law for selection of nominees for county offices should be amended and strengthened so as to preserve party integrity.

This Commoner, in an exclusive interview with the United Press, declared he had given up politics for preaching.

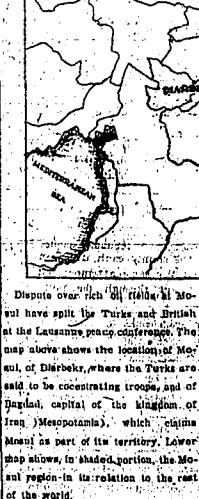
"It is not true, an has been reported, that my discussions of Bonapoleon and Darwinism have led me to withdraw my interest from governmental matters," he said.

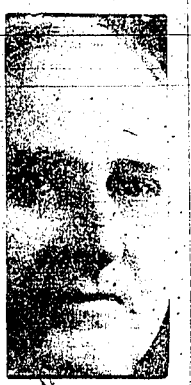

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, MOSCOW, Jan. 9.—Woodrow Wilson, former president, is the foremost living statesman according to a census taken among American history students by Professor C. A. Some of the reasons given for their choice by the students are: Woodrow Wilson, because he took the question of the league of nations out of the hands of the statesmen and made it a question of practical politics. Senator Borah won a place because of his willingness to "play a lone hand." La Follette was criticized freely but was admired for his courage and his business for 23 years that there were those to give and show to receive.

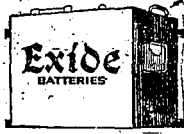

We hope that one of the outgrowths of the special meetings which start here next Friday evening will be a Young Men's Christian association. There are hundreds of young men here who would like to enjoy a gymnasium, swimming pool and all the other amusements which go with an up-to-date Y. M. C. A. Few cities the size of this one really lack a community center like Twin Falls does. Our young men have sorely a place today to congregate where the environment is what it should be. Who will start the movement for a modern Y. M. C. A. building with a donation of \$50,000.

Senator Johnson's rabid belief that Senator Borah has adopted the policy of Woodrow Wilson leaves the greatest moral force in the senate unutilized. Mr. Borah returns in his proposal of an economic arm conference with fresh enthusiasm. The "institution of death" is disintegrating. If true that Mr. Borah has the support of Senator Capper, the leader of the republican farm bloc, a radical shift in the center of gravity of the senate's European policy may soon be anticipated. It will probably be possible to trace the effect of the Massachusetts election returns upon the changed course of Senator Lodge.

The postal system of the United States had as its first head a famous name of aphorisms, Benjamin Franklin, and the post-office department's daily publication, the Postal Bulletin, is now coming forth every day with a quotation from the first postmaster general. Franklin was not postmaster general under the constitution. While serving as postmaster of Philadelphia, the British government appointed him deputy postmaster for the United States, an office which corresponds to that of postmaster-general. The Continental congress in 1775 provided for a postmaster general for the united colonies and the office was re-established by the federal constitution. Franklin's service as deputy postmaster ceased in 1774.

THE GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

In his message to the legislature, released today, Governor C. C. Moore has suggested a good degenerative program in the outline. He shows that many of the things held sacred by speakers for his party may be gotten rid of, as democrats said they must, before tax reduction can take place. While Attorney General Roy L. Black assured the people that the savings which could be effected by reduction in state taxes were infinitesimal, the new governor does not seem to see it that light. It has become essential to "put on the brakes and turn a deaf ear to new requirements for increased expenditure." No new buildings for new institutions, no new road construction, no new bureaus or commissions. "Except where there do they would result in retrogression." Of course, there will be an immense amount of equipment expended by those whose battle cry will be "no retrogression." The sacred cabinet government which Black "proved" so conclusively resulted in more efficiency and less expense, is no longer protected by a taboo. "Elimination of some and consolidation of others, which will result in substantial saving" is earnestly urged. So after all, changes in the statehouse CAN produce a substantial saving.

All this is to the good. The Times repeats that it trusts that the new governor will stick to his text, so far as the above program is concerned.

Governor Moore is also on the right track in urging the value of freight rate reduction. His recommendation of a gas tax will please the Intermountain Truckmen's association.

On the other hand, the new Governor, while consistent with his platform is out of harmony with the majority of the people in his insisting on the maintenance of the present method of appointing state and congressional officials. He deserves credit for consistency in thus facing a legislature, the lower house of which was organized by the selection of a speaker from the anti-administration wing of his own party. This does not portend smooth sailing. Speaker Roper was victorious when the present election law was enacted. He was speaker when the cabinet form bill, senate bill 19, was passed. Should he take the lead in opposing the present governor and join hands with the minority parties in forcing the repeal of the present election law, the necessary two-thirds vote to pass the measure over the gubernatorial veto would be easily secured in the lower house.

Democrats will surely need no prompting to induce them to stand by the governor on all things that he recommends that agree with their platform, and with his opponents on all things wherein they feel him wrong in his attitude.
