## METEORS TAKE GOODING HIGH BY BIG SCORE

Northridders No Match for Speedy Evans; Oohars; Exhibition of College Refereeing Given; Large Number of Personal Fouls Called.

Completely outclassing their opponents in every department of the game the Twin Falls high school basketball team sunk the hopes of Gooding high last evening, the final score reading 50-29.

From the initial whistle it was apparent that the Meteors would be superior for teamwork, agility and shooting. The only question was as to the number of points they could score. The winning total was swelled materially by Oohars' numerous free throws.

Referee Hulsehorn had an unusually sharp eye last evening and it is exceedingly doubtful if a single committed foul escaped his constant vigil. Most of the first half was spent in unguarded throwing at the basket.

Gooding playing second time through the air, the Meteors took advantage of the situation and scored. To many of the spectators the game appeared quite tame but the frequent foul decisions necessitated a speller and referee play which came about as a result. There was no foulball during the last stages of Friday's game. So many men were put out by personal fouls, however, that the referee began to feel the death of the game.

"Swede" Jenkins was the only Twin Falls man who went the entire route. The Meteors were in the lead from the start, repeatedly working the ball under the basket from where it was loosed through. Practically no fouls were made or even attempted during the scrap. The playing for the most part was in the local territory and Gooding enjoyed less than half the basket chances of their rivals. Both fires were deadly in accuracy.

"It is difficult to single out the best players of the evening, although Jenkins and Oohars with Cole not far behind were in the brightest glare of the calcium days for Twin Falls. Cromwell, who tallied 17 points for his team, acquitted for Gooding.

## New Yankee Baseball Stadium Topped By Copper Cornice Weighing 15 Tons



BABE Ruth's home grounds are now nearing completion in New York City and will be the world's largest baseball park, covering 240,000 square feet and seating 80,000 fans. One of the most striking features of the new stadium will be the copper cornice, weighing 15 tons that will surmount the roof.

The Yankee management wanted a fringe of soft green color to blend with the green

of the grass and planned galvanized metal at first. But when they found how much it would cost to paint it after thought to keep it from rusting they turned to copper which will be as permanent as the concrete of which the stadium is built.

The new field is to have a cinder running track so it can be used for athletic meets as well as for baseball. It will seat about 80,000 as many fans as any other ballpark in the country.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—Two judges and a referee voted that Bill Brennan of Chicago was a worse heavyweight than Floyd Johnson of Iowa after 16 rounds of milling last night in Madison Square garden.

Sitting at the ringside were James J. Corbett, Jack Johnson and Jess Willard, who were asked to give their verdict on the heavyweights.

Next to them sat Tommy Gibbons, who could hardly be kept from jumping into the ring.

Johnson beat Brennan beyond all doubt but in doing it he showed that if there is any one beyond all doubt, it is to think too much about Jack Dempsey.

Because he failed to knock out the veteran old Chicago warhorse he was not allowed to display any more finish is something for criticism because he is being built up for a crack at the heavyweight title next summer.

Business is starting off strong with the majority of the merchants of Twin Falls for the first two weeks of the New Year. If the other weeks continue as good as the first two have been, believe that there will be very little reason for complaint when 1923 closes her book.

If some one would devise a plan whereby some big factory or plant could be brought to the Twin Falls tract and put into operation so as to give people employment he would be hailed as the savior of his country. Will not the construction of the American Falls reservoir be a similar proposition.

If you are looking for a chance to be of service to some of your fellowmen just look about you in the Magic City and we believe that you will find some one whom you can serve and serve to a good end. Service after all is the greatest thing in life and the more you serve the fuller will be your cup of joy.

The board of county commissioners of Twin Falls county are starting on a rather unpopular road but they are sticking to the platform on which they were elected—economy. They have looked after several offices connected with the county capital and are investigating others. This we believe, is the proper course and will meet the general approbation of the public.

If there is a man of any description in this city or any other city nearly guilty of a criminal operation he should be arrested and taken into court, and given the full punishment of the law. But if this stuff we hear is only hearsay then some physician has been negligently wronged. No man has a right to get up and accuse another in public or private of such a crime unless he has the evidence to convict. That man and if he has the evidence the thing to do is apply the strong arm of the law rather than talk about it. ## Construction Needed on Twin Falls Tract

Few cities the size of Twin Falls have so many large construction outfits and yet as far as construction work is concerned these companies would have been idle for the past two years as far as work of this nature is concerned on this tract. Every one will agree that such a condition is deplorable in the extreme and the signs of the times would indicate that this condition is going to improve very soon unless certain definite steps are taken by the people of this part of Idaho to remedy this affair. The people of Twin Falls and in fact, all of southern Idaho, can improve this condition very materially if they will, but will they.

If some big piece of construction work started here tomorrow it would change the whole complexion of our commercial society in this locality. Business of every kind would take on new life, expansion of every description would start. Vacant homes would soon be filled, men who have been without work for months would find employment, defunct bank accounts would jump over on the other side of the ledger and business would soon begin to hum with that old time music and the rhythm would sweeten the lives of all of us. But where is the man or set of men that will undertake the construction of a big plant or the erection of gigantic undertakings. If some one would offer a contract for the erection of another apartment house or a contract for the building of another Hansen bridge it would help mightily.

But friends and readers we have before us a much more gigantic undertaking, the building of an immense reservoir and the bringing of thousands of acres of rich land under cultivation and in a word the expenditure here in this part of Idaho the magnificent sum of \$100,000,000 of government money. In other words, if we vote that this American Falls reservoir project shall be established it means that we have the chance of getting \$100,000,000 of good hard cash from an outside source brought into Idaho. We feel sure that the people of the Twin Falls tract and all southern Idaho will not vote against a proposition which means so much toward the development of this section of the Great state.

In the second place if we vote to construct this American Falls project we make a railroad to Nevada an actual necessity and take just another step toward bringing this railroad into a reality. Thousands of dollars of money will be turned loose here as a direct result of a favorable vote on this project. Don't drive capital away from the state by voting "No" on this proposition.

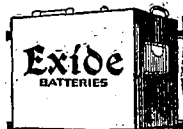
