PRIMARY BILL INTRODUCED INTO IDAHO SENATE LEGISLATURE

Direct Primary Bill Introduced Into Idaho Senate Legislature Today by Ada County Delegation; It Provides for State-wide Primary Nominating Election of All Candidates.

BOISE, Jan. 22.—A direct primary bill, approved by the Ada county delegation and the republican members from Lemhi, Jefferson and West Lake counties, was introduced Monday morning in the house of representatives. It has 23 typed pages, of which 18 are required for the title. The measure provides for a state-wide nominating election on a general, state, district and county officers; a non-political judiciary; restriction of elective county office to party affiliation; a state platform convention composed of party candidates and committees and a nominating convention for parties not eligible to hold a primary election. The bill repeals the \$50 inheritance tax, passed by the 19th legislature. The bill gives the governor power to fill vacancies in the legislature also was passed. The House of Representatives of the state of Idaho out of Pocatello, Washington, Adams and Yallop counties is provided for in section 10 of this bill. The bill repeals the 1913 act, introduced this morning in the upper house by Senator Frank Harris, director of Washington county. The way was paved for the introduction of this bill by Clapp, democrat, which would provide that Douglas, republican, be made the twelfth district. The sixteenth session had before it a bill which contained the same provisions as section 10, but it failed to pass. Both houses adjourned until 10 o'clock Tuesday morning.

GERMAN MINERS ARE SILENT BUILT UP OFFERS TO MEDIATE

France Revised Reparations Plans and Will Grant a Two Year Moratorium on Certain Conditions; Germany Must Raise An Internal Loan of Three Billion Gold Marks.

PARIS, Jan. 22.—France has revised her reparations plan and now has it ready for the commission. Chief features are: 1. Germany shall be granted a two-year moratorium, on the condition that she raises an internal loan of three billion gold marks, of which five hundred million may be used to stabilize the mark, the rest to go to Germany's creditors. 2. Establishment of state monopolies in Germany on tobacco, matches, alcohol, salt, sugar and gasoline. 3. Customs and export taxes to be turned over to the allies. 4. France will be permitted to collect the coal tax; find other details similar to Poincare's previous plan. The heart of Germany's richest fuel region was stilled today in passive protest against French inaction. The steel of Premier Poincare's reparations policy was on. Mines of the Ruhr valley were idle in protest against France's occupation; arrest of state officials; against the destruction of the railroads; and against the severing of all the arteries connecting the Ruhr with the rest of Germany. The strike started on schedule; besides the state mines, seven Thyssen holdings and other private pits ceased operation. Miners lounged about, sullenly eyeing the French troops.

PERMANENT PEACE IN PACIFIC ASSURED BY JAPAN AND U. S.

TOKYO, Jan. 22.—Pacific cooperation, permanent peace in the Pacific characterized by friendship and understanding, will be the goal of leading persons of Japan in honor of American Ambassador Charles J. Warren. Speakers declared that the accomplishments of the last two years had laid the foundation for permanent peace in the Pacific. Warren's resignation as ambassador is expected in two weeks and he will soon leave for the United States.

LUCKY MAN RECALLED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22.—Captain Dan Lutz, former United States Coast Guard cutter, is considered one of the luckiest men on the Columbia or any other ship. He was the only man on the Columbia who was not killed when the ship was wrecked. He is the pilot, whose name is only slightly hurt.

WAR BROTHERS ARE RECALLED BY OFFICIAL

Assistant Secretary of War Under Wilson Pleads Not Guilty to Charges of Conspiracy to Defraud U. S. Government During World War Period; Crowell Issues Statement on Actions.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Benjamin Crowell, Cleveland, assistant secretary of war during the World War administration, today pleaded not guilty in the district court to charges of conspiracy to defraud the government in connection with the construction of war contracts. Crowell is one of several former government officials named in the indictment. Crowell, following his appearance, issued a statement which follows in part: "I never profited one cent by the trust imposed in me by the country. No such conspiracy did or could have existed." "It is not in human nature for a man who gives the opportunity for service that there is any profit in the country's need, could have devised those two years in cold blood to the disadvantage of the country for his own miserable profit. The specification in the indictment against me is that I contracted with awarded the Cleveland Construction Company in May, 1918, and that at that time the stock of the Cleveland Construction Company was owned by a company in the profits of which I was interested." "The charge is absolutely false."
