

CONSTITUTIONALY IS ABOLISHED BY LEGISLATURE

Idaho State Senate Passed Bill Doing Away With State Constitution; Several New Bills Introduced; Expense Money Curtailed and New Administration Will for Institutions Introduced.

BOISE, Jan. 25.—Pledges made in the platform of the three political parties in Idaho for the abolishment of the state constitution were carried out in the state this morning when the bill repealing the constitution laws of 1921, which provides for the existence of the constitutional government, was passed by a vote of 20 to 10.

The anti-constitution bill was one of nine measures passed by the senate this morning, the others dealing with the repeal of the twenty dollar tax, guarantee of jurors' fees, approval by county commissioners of appointments of probation officers, and a bill of condemnation with jurisdiction of infants or insane persons, and others.

After adjunction to the committee of the whole house for two days, the bill to repeal the eight-hour working day for labor was recommended to the committee on immigration and labor.

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THEIR POWER FOR 2 DAYS

Hand-picked Tribunal Protected by 500 Members of Armed Mob Carried on Investigation Around Arkansas Town with High-Held is Testimony of Witness.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 25.—How 12 hand-picked members of a mob, vested with authority except the right of might, held full sway in their holdings for two days, protected by 500 members of an armed mob, held court and pronounced judgment on fellow citizens is told by M. H. Robbins, garage owner of Heber Springs, when brought before the investigating committee of the Arkansas legislature last night.

Robbins was the first witness to tell the vigilantes' side of the case. He told how groups of men from several counties took the law in their own hands, picked the tribunal, entered houses, without search warrants, ordered men before it and unless they agreed to sign pledges of allegiance they were shot or, American, hanged them from the county.

Robbins said his job was that of a hired hand man to Sheriff Emmett Hallock, but admitted he had not been paid for his services.

CONGRESS EXONERATES DAUGHTERY BY VOTE. WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 25.—The Daughters' impeachment case today was concluded by a vote of 204 to 77, occurred in the action of the judiciary committee to completely exonerate the attorney general from the charges brought against him by Representative Fisher of Minnesota.

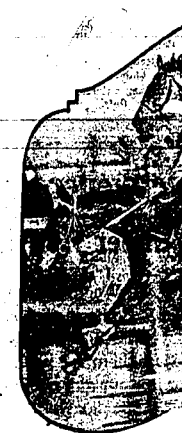
