

COFFIN TAKEN COFFIN ELECTROCUTED

Murderer Electrocuted and Placed in Coffin for Dead but Physicians Discover That He Was Still Alive and He Was Taken Back to Electric Chair; Brothers Killed Old Recluse in Lonely Hut.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Feb. 2.—F. O. Bullen, murderer, was taken from his coffin and electrocuted at the state penitentiary here today after physicians found the first electric charge had failed to kill him.

Bullen was one of four men sentenced to die at daylight. After the high voltage had passed in a wooden box and preparations started for his burial.

Physicians making a second examination however, found he was still alive.

Bullen was taken from the coffin and again placed in the electric chair. He was pronounced dead three minutes later.

Bullen and Ben and Duncan Richardson, brothers, were charged with murdering Ira H. Culp, an aged recluse whose body was burned in his home here in the electric chair. A man electrocuted today was Will Debord, convicted of the highest murders of H. M. Blaney and wife.

Duncan Richardson made a dramatic attempt to save his brother and Bullen, his pal, from execution. He called prison officials to his death cell yesterday and related a graphic story of the murder which he claimed was innocent and absolving the other two.

Governor McFadyen, however, refused to interfere when court records showed the story differed from evidence produced at the trial.

Ben Richardson was the first man sent to death. Calling jail officials to his cell he begged for mercy. He was electrocuted at daylight.

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GERMANS HATE THE FRENCH FOR RUSSIAN INVASION

Kindred Inhabitants Go About with Murderous Intent in Their Hearts and Bloodshed May Be Expected Most Any Moment.

REHLIN, Feb. 2.—The people of the Ruhr valley have murderous resentment in their hearts.

The women are shedding tears of rage—not grief, and they are tearing their hair as they stand in the long, polluted blue coats of Frenchmen who go swinging through the streets of their towns, and bivouac in their public squares.

They are waiting grimly. They are about the same stunts as West Virginia miners just as ready for the German, holding their breath. There is no talking which this restraint will stop.

I have been over the whole Ruhr industrial district. The French soldiers are everywhere, of course. The "Hilfs" army, the new force, the cobbles, or the jagged of their cavalry accommodations, are heard on all sides. The German government is dimly gung the nutters, watching their ride tall. In these crowds are many men who a few days ago wore the gray garb of Germany's army and marched deep into France. Now they appear content to stand and wait.

The French are fetching all the implements of war along with them—artillery, field kitchens, airplanes, machine guns, tanks, etc. The situation presents every element of war—except an enemy army. The new force will cut whether such an army is going to spring to life from the ranks of those who are satisfied with standing on the curbstone, watching the parade.

The strangling French blockade also has the Westerners, the new force, that even if it is partially effective it would still bring the mines to a standstill. This continues to be the workers' picture of early unemployment, followed by hunger. They are not at all satisfied with their lot, according to the rapidly with which prices are outstripping wages.

CONGRESS IS CALMER OVER REPARATIONS

Senator Borah Will Press His Economic Conference Early Next Week; as Appropriation Bill Comes Up; Objection to Interest Rates.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—Congress was calmer today concerning the funding of the British debt as the significance of the terms accepted by the League government was later understood.

While the first flurry of uneasiness over the League's offer of interest between the interest to be paid by Britain and the interest the United States has to pay on its obligations had passed, there was still some opposition, particularly in the senate, and administration leaders invoked President Harding's personal influence to get the way cleared for the debt legislation which will be introduced next week.

Mr. Harding will send a letter to the senate shortly urging again the need of prompt action on the remaining items of the legislative program. He will stress particularly his view of the importance of a vote on the ship subsidy bill, which now, in the opinion of its foes, is definitely killed.

Senator Borah will press for action on the ship subsidy bill, for a national economic and disarmament conference in the senate early next week. It was known today that the floor on the time the army appropriation bill is being considered.

Mr. Borah, however, declares he has no intention of seeking reduction in the size of the army though he believes that this would be an appropriate time for discussion of the resolution.

SENATOR DOES NOT REPRESENT BOND SHARKS

Alabama Senator Called Down Twice in U. S. Senate for Indecent Remarks but Olligs to Theory That He Is Not Controlled by Wall Street or Other Sharks.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 2.—Senator Tom Heflin of Alabama was called to order twice today for attacking other senators.

At the opening of the senate session, by a roll call vote, the ruling of the Vice President, Coolidge, that the remarks by Heflin into yesterday were objectionable and out of order, was upheld. Heflin had said:

"I am here to represent the people; to represent in part my state. I am not here to represent the bond sharks and the big characters of Wall street."

Senator Lodge took exception to the attack and moved that he be struck out. Senator Heflin of Arkansas asked that Lodge's motion not only a senator's words but his thoughts should be held in question. The objection taken to the statement by Lodge was on the basis that the senator's remarks misrepresented the bond sharks and financiers.

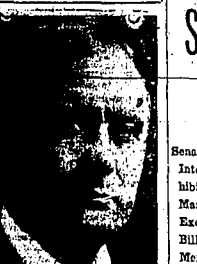
Those voting with Heflin opposing the vice president's ruling were: Brookhart, Capper, Johnson, Ladd, La Follette and Norris.

Later Heflin sarcastically arranged Senator Cossens. The Michigan senator denounced that the remarks be withdrawn. The senators who stood behind Heflin in the earlier attack upon him in condemning his alleged improper language.

Discussing the vote on Lodge's motion to rebuke him, Heflin attacked Cossens said:

"One of these senators, who came down here parading himself as a progressive, is a millionaire money lender over. When I heard that I said it will never open on him; someone attacked him go over and take his place with the bond sharks and the standpat party. This morning I saw him do it. He went and took his place right under the whiskers of Senator Lodge."

NEW MAY GET CABINET POST

SENATE BILL STRIKES AT KLAN ROBES

Senator Harris Introduced Bill Into Idaho Senate Today Prohibiting Wearing of Hoods or Masks by Secret Organizations Except for Masked Balls, etc.; Bill Would Require Names of Members of Order.

HOISE, Feb. 2.—A bill aimed at all hooded activities of secret societies in the state of Idaho, with certain exceptions such as masked balls, etc., was introduced in the senate this morning by Senator Harris, democrat, of Washington county.

The bill would prohibit the parading under mask, teaching of intimidation or anything other than that provided by law and would also require filing of membership lists by all secret organizations with the county auditor. The bill was referred to the state affairs committee.

It introduced this morning in the senate, has practically the same purpose, requiring filing out of names by all who participate in the sick, except that it clarifies the provision that it does not operate in conflict with the statute of any organized religion. Use of the titles of doctor or professor and persons holding offices would be illegal.

U. S. WITHDRAWS OBSERVER FROM ALLIED EUROPE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—The state department today announced withdrawal of the American observer on the inter-allied Rhineland high commission. Major General Henry T. Allen, former commander of the army of occupation, was holding the position.

It was explained that Allen, with the commission, to keep the United States informed as to the regulations of that body for the same occupation and that since the commission force had been withdrawn there was no further need of the American observer, continuing to carry in the capacity.

Our First Twenty-five Years Control of Tropical Islands

By D. F. Austin - Statistics

Trade of the United States with its island possessions in the first quarter century of our occupation totals about 5 1/2 billion dollars against a little more than one-half billion in the 25 years preceding our occupation.

It was on July 7, 1898 that the United States Congress adopted the resolution annexing the Hawaiian Islands in accordance with the "proposed" providing for the creation of Porto Rico to the United States was signed; and on December 10 of that year we signed the treaty with Spain ceding the Philippines to the United States. Guam, former Spanish island, was also occupied by the United States the same year, while the tiny Samoan Islands, Tutuila, with the best harbor in all the South Pacific, passed completely under our control in 1899 after several years in which we had cooperated with other countries in the control of the Samoan group.

That the year 1923 marks distinctly our first quarter century of control of these tropical islands with a population of about 12 million. The record of our trade with only these islands, 5 1/2 billion, is a record of our occupation in the market of the tropics. The record of our trade with all the islands of the Pacific is 5 1/2 billion, 99 percent of the exports of the United States.

Sugar, tobacco and Manila hemp are our chief imports from the Philippines, sugar and pineapples from Hawaii, and sugar, tobacco and tropical fruits from Porto Rico. To all the islands we export manufactured goods, and also limited quantities of food, especially flour and meats.

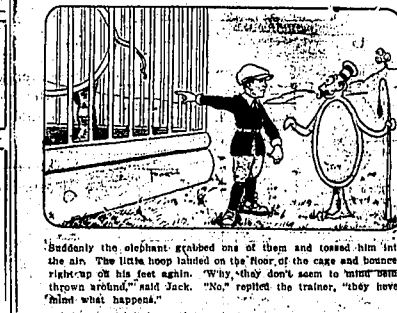

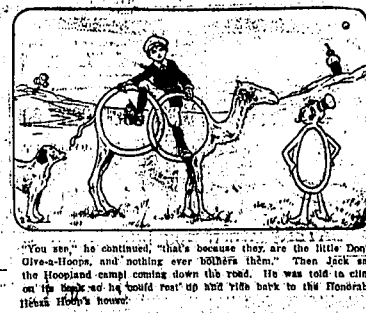

In ordering the publication of the city audit by John Wolfenden in the Observer and a copy thereof delivered to every house in the city, free of cost, of course, the commission admitted the insufficiency of a publication in the regular issue of that paper. The motion made three times by Commissioner S. S. All that the printing of this long document go to the lowest bidder was ignored and no second ever made to it. It was rushed through after the hurried deletion at secret conference with part of the commission of the items aggregating more than \$50,000 "supposed" to have been sold the city by members of former councils. Why a supposition should ever have crept into an audit is a mystery. It would seem in view of the sudden attention these items which voters were led to "suppose" last spring would be proven, it would at least have been reasonable to allow the matter to wait until the next meeting, as Commissioner All suggested. This is especially true, as the wording of some that were not stricken out were changed before the commission finally met yesterday afternoon. Having paid \$4,450, when the Van Deusen company offered to make an audit for \$2,000 and guarantee it, the city now takes the most costly way of getting it to the people. The value of the whole proceedings is more than questionable at the price and perhaps at any price.

Now if The Observer is not a paper of sufficient circulation in which to publish an audit, may there not be a suspicion that its circulation is not sufficient for the proper, as distinguished from the legal publication of the city ordinances.
