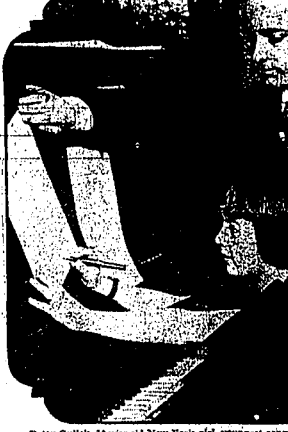

The average, thinking citizen will not be misled by the attempts of certain tricky scoundrels to withdraw the attention of the voters of Twin Falls from the fact that the present city administration is to pay more than \$1000 for the audit which should have been done for \$2000. Think this over, Mr. Taxpayer, and ask yourself whether this is true or false economy.

Did you ever notice that when you get a crook under fire he will always point his long, ugly finger at some other fellow and claim that this other individual is a great deal worse than he is? This happened last week in the city of Twin Falls and we believe that every-thinking citizen will understand where the finger of blame should have been pointed. The way of the transgressor is hard.

The women who are serving hot lunches to the children of the public schools are to be congratulated most heartily for their splendid service. They are rendering a real service to the boys and girls who come from a distance and would otherwise have to eat a cold snack on a cold day. Let us hope that those who have been helping this worthy cause from day to day will continue to help this excellent movement. We understand that they are serving daily about 250 pupils and all of this comes from donations by good-hearted farmers, businessmen and others who are interested.

We would like to ask by what authority the city commissioners have obtained the right to circulate a certain newspaper in the city of Twin Falls. If the legal authority of the city will give us this valuable piece of information we will be pleased to give it to the public. If there is authority in the city ordinances of Twin Falls for thus buying circulation well and good but we question whether there is any such authority vested in our city government. This charge for circulation will be added to the cost of the legal publication of course, but an investigation should be made and such a waste of the taxpayers' money should be stopped if such a thing can be done with the present bunch in power.

BOY SCOUTS AND OUTDOOR LIFE

If the boys you meet February 8 seem to be raising more of a rumpus than usually, it is in celebration of an event very important to Young America.

The Boy Scouts movement was incorporated and officially launched in our country, February 8, 1910, two years after Sir Robert S. S. Baden-Powell started the organization in England.

The general purpose of the Boy Scouts is to train boys in good citizenship, manhood and self-reliance. It founders, displaying considerable knowledge of psychology, assured its success by adopting uniforms for the members.

Man or boy, let him wear a uniform and he'll do almost anything. Some of our big national movements that fail might be successful if an attractive uniform went with membership. Maybe that's the way to enforce prohibition—officially permit abstainers to wear something like a red coat.

Did it ever occur to you that the uniform is the first thing that comes to your mind at mention of Boy Scouts?

Few of us have an accurate idea of the values the young generation get from the Boy Scouts. A scout starts as a tenderfoot, then works up, by merit and ability, to second-class scout, finally to first class.

To be a first-class scout, a boy has to be able to swim 50 yards. He must have at least \$2 in a savings bank. He must know how to wig-wag signals by flag. He has to be able to administer first-aid in case of accidents such as severed arteries and drowning. He must know how to read maps and make them, handle an ax, judge distances and be able to cook for campers.

Every Boy Scout pledges obedience to parents, kindness to animals, courtesy to all. He has installed into him a high code of honor and practical applications of the Golden Rule and Good Samaritanism.

The best thing done by the Boy Scouts is that it takes its members back to nature. The closer we keep to nature, the better for our nation. There is always hope for a civilization whose boys are prowling in the woods, hiking cross-country, studying birds and flowers and breathing fresh air.

In our half-and-half civilization, we have given the boy a raw deal, stripped him of his rightful playgrounds, caged him up like an animal, and handicapped him with unwholesome environment.

For all this, the Boy Scouts movement is in the nature of an antidote.

This would be a whole lot better country to live in if the grown-ups started a similar organization to develop the same ideals of brotherhood and get us out into the open country occasionally, away from filth, poisonous air, maddening racket and nervous tension.

We need an organization of Men Scouts, and Women Scouts.

OUR INHERENT RIGHTS

Editor of The Times: We do believe a father or mother has an inherent right to punish his or her child whenever they think fit for the good of the child. We do not want to admit this privilege, but this privilege we must have as parents.

The children must know too that we have this right whether we ever use it or not.

Some parents and teachers will never have occasion to use corporal punishment, but nevertheless their right to use corporal punishment should never be abolished.

The average parent and mother today will not agree with me, but what of that?

Let us look at the crowded juvenile courts or reformatories. A little session with father in the wood shed might have avoided all this trouble and saved the state tremendous taxes.

I say father, for I earnestly believe that mothers should assume this responsibility.

I know the fathers have shifted their duty and they hope that some teacher or preacher can make of their boy or girl good citizens.

Many parents are taken up with their own selfish pleasures, while others are too indolent to correct their children; they find it much easier to let them do as they please.

Now, of course, the child should know why we punish it. It is because we love them too much to see them doing things that will eventually lead them into great sorrow and pain.

We have a law which forbids corporal punishment in our schools; neither can the teacher expel the unruly student, for another law says the child must be in school.

The child knows the facts as well as we do, so he or she acts accordingly.

What do we find then? The unruly child going to school, doing very much as he pleases, poor lesson on his part, lack of attention in the class, and respect for his teacher. He blames the very purpose of the school, which is to teach and receive. Will an unruly student in the school room or class room no good can be accomplished. The question is—can we have good homes and schools without corporal punishment? Our nation depends on the kind of homes we have. If the child does not respect the law of the home and school he will not respect the laws of the state.

What I have said means very little compared with what God says on the subject of correction.

Anniversary Roundup of Boy Scouts To celebrate the Thirteenth Birthday of the movement in the United States, every effort is being made to recruit 200,000 more boys, an increase of 25 per cent over membership records of a year ago. YANKS SIGN YOUNG PITCHER AFTER COLLINS

Pennack Expected to Win Fifteen Games for Yanks This Summer
Yanks Must Take Pennack This Year to Break Even as Gamblers

NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—Eddie Collins, veteran second baseman of the Chicago White Sox, probably will perform in a New York uniform next summer in the new Yankee stadium.

Having put over the deal last night with the Boston Red Sox for Herb Pennack, 31-year-old south-paw pitcher, the Yankee bosses are now hot after Collins.

Demand of Kid Gleason for young Willie Hout, along with Ward and Messel for Collins, held up completion of the deal for a time, but now that Pennack has been acquired to work regularly, Hout and Hout will be sent along to Chicago.

For Pennack the Yanks gave Frank McMillan, second-infielder; Frank O'Connell, George Murray, a first promising young pitcher, and Combs, a fair outfielder.

New York thinks it is the worst deal ever made in the big league, and it gives Harry Frazee perpetual ownership of the title of the champion David Harum at all weights.

Considering the policy of the Yanks, the deal does not mean that the "bain" colonies were asleep or drugged when they signed the papers. The Yanks have to win the pennant next season to keep up their standing with the Giants.

Miller Higgins figures that Pennack will win 15 games for him and young Murray would get a chance to win one game sitting on the bench or singing in the ball pen.

Like McGraw, the Yanks are becoming opportunistic. They will accept any future prospects for the time being, figuring that if the best comes to hand they will provide the necessary.

Miller Higgins always has had a leaning toward the veterans. The club owners cannot help but be aware of this and it doubt they felt that Murray, McMillan and Skinner weren't carrying money sitting on the bench.

Standard Oil Faces Discrimination Charge

BASKET BALL QUIZ

Wrong Basket
If a player loses his sense of direction and cages the ball in his opponent's basket, does it count for the opponent?

It certainly does. That is the penalty for fouling such a unbalanced play, which by the way comes up several times every year.

Two-up
When the referee tosses the ball up for the centers, is it necessary that both players jump and make an effort to touch the ball to make the play legal?

It is not, but if the ball is tapped by one player other than the jumpers, the referee should toss it up again and order both players to jump and make a real attempt to tap the ball. Failure to comply with the order can be construed by the referee as a foul on one or both for delaying the game.

Four Points
What makes the position of the feet when jumping foul center or elsewhere for the ball? Often players shift feet as the ball is about to be tossed and so position themselves that they interfere with their opponent. In some cases they actually step on their opponent's feet as a handicap. Is this legal?

The feet of the jumper must be within his half of the circle. Such action described is not to be permitted. So player would be in foul away with it very long with a wide-awake referee.

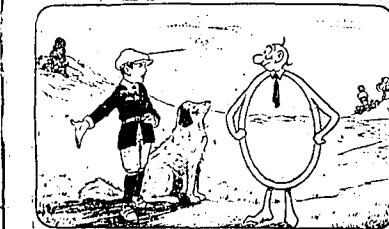

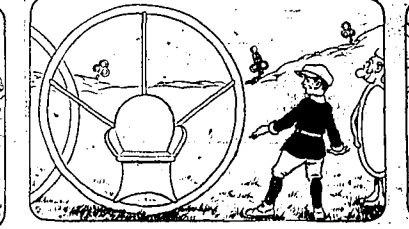

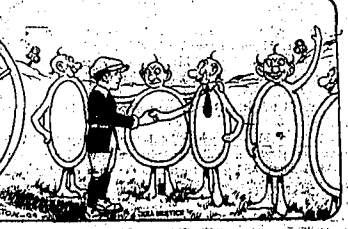
