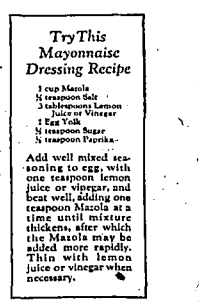

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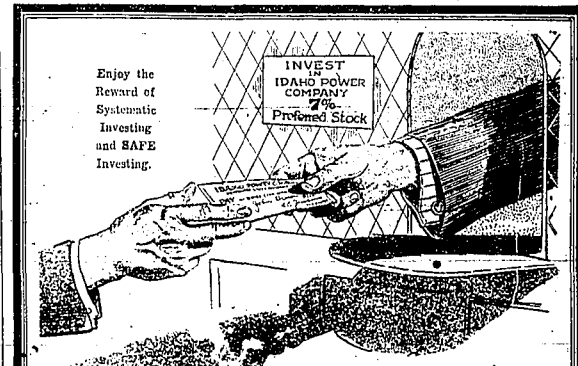

OBSERVER BILL OF OVER EIGHT HUNDRETH RACES COUNCIL FISS

Stormy Scene and Intimations of Bad Faith Fly Thick and Fast; All Says Costly and Futile Effort Has Been Made to Besmirch Good Citizens; Mayor Denies and Instructs City Attorney to Take Proceedings Against Some Named in Wolfenden Report.

The hurrican that had been brewing during a stormy commission meeting burst forth in full fury this morning when a bill of \$405.00 was presented by The Observer for printing the Wolfenden anti-Commissioner S. S. Allen denunciation which was the culmination of a disgraceful and disturbing element to discredit some of the best citizens in the community; an effort which had signally failed over more than \$5,000 of the people's money had been expended. Mayor J. D. Tucker replied in a heated talk in which he branded the intimation as absolutely false, and in which he ordered City Attorney H. D. Davis to investigate the facts set forth with a view of taking proceedings against some citizens. It was held over or measurement.

"I want to say that I am heartily sick of having my name used to do with this business," cried Mr. Allen, angrily, "which was done to my name and I have been secured for \$2000 and we have paid more than \$4,000 for it. Now, we have this bill in addition to these three legal city publications. The city has two newspapers, and then the Observer. The Observer wanted this publication but that was not his business."

Mayor Tucker replied, "When we were elected we promised the people that we had this thing made," said Mayor Tucker, "and were instructed by them to do it when they put us in power. We simply obeyed the people. The question was not discussed at that time and did not enter into consideration. We promised a multi-million dollar bill and we could have had it. Mr. Allen says the undesirable elements have charge of the printing and we are at fault. Well, to that case the undesirable elements have charge of the printing and we are at fault."

"I was talked on the street that certain officers would be named in an audit, reflecting on leading citizens of this town, and the audit shows that that was not the case, and it was used before me. I was asked to sign a statement and I would sign up the first administration of this city is absolutely false and I will be personally responsible for that statement any where."
