## McGRAW SENDS NOTICE TO ALL UNSIGNED MEN

### Holdouts Have Created Obstacles—Among Baseball Managers and the Glens' Manager Has Decided on Strenuous Measure to Force Players to Place Their Name on Dotted Line Before Appearing at Camp.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—Holdouts have created such a serious situation among the world's champion Glens that John McGraw has been forced to do something he has done in 20 years.  
"Notices" were in the mails today to all Glens who have not signed contracts that they will not be allowed to report to Martin Spring or at San Antonio until they have put their names at the bottom of the papers.  
The club considered a most drastic move from a club of the liberal policy of the Glens. In the past McGraw has always allowed the players who were dissatisfied with the club's offer to report to the training camp and talk it over.  
The threat, however, may fall in its purpose. "The only reply the club received from the ultimatum was from Jack Bennett, the \$45,000 Baltimore beauty. The Glens told him he couldn't report until he had signed and heard that he hadn't intended to report and thanked them for their trouble.  
There are three exceptions in the club: George Kelly, Al Monson and Casey Stengel, who were with the management on the trip to the Orient. They will be obliged to wait for two weeks at the camp and show that the trip didn't hurt them before they will be offered a contract.  
Yank Frazer, Brian and Young are the only Yearling Glens on paper, but the situation is almost as bad with the Yanks. Babe Ruth and Carl Mayer are working under holdover contracts and Everett Scott is the only player who has signed a new contract. Waite Berging "came to terms," but he did not sign.  
Action of the Glens and a previous announcement of the Brooklyn club to the same effect, indicated that in the National league at least the club owners may have decided on this policy of bringing their athletes to time.

A few people have asked who are the "Gold Trust Twins," but the majority know them too well. In fact, a very fine old gentleman would be several hundred dollars better off in this world's goods in Twin Falls had he never met either of them.

If Senator Reed wanted to fight so bad why didn't he do something while he had a chance during the World War. It is pretty late in the day to begin to howl around like a whipped pup. Reed should never have been returned to the United States senate, according to our way of thinking because he is little better than a "plucker."

It begins to look as if some people in Idaho may not be so proud of having been a warm friend of the man who has been passing as the official representative of the Ku Klux Klan. At least if we can take the word of the head blegale in Chicago. We shall know the truth about this in a few weeks and then we will be better able to judge the affair justly. In the meantime we may be allowed our own opinion of him.

The farmers of this section should study the sugar beet industry and see if it will not pay them to plant a larger acreage to beets this year. We are not urging the farmers of the Twin Falls tract to plant all their land to beets but let's get more farmers to plant at least a part of their acreage to this crop. Diversified farming and don't forget the cows, chickens, hogs, etc., to make the farm pay.

One of the very serious things which is hindering the growth and development of Twin Falls is the sarcastic criticism which is passing from month to month about this one or that one. We will never get on as we should until we overcome this bad habit and begin to boast not only our own proposition but our neighbor's pig pen as well. Some people don't like our stars and many do. Some people don't like our hotels and many do. Some people don't like our daily newspapers but more do. We could follow this strain from morning till night and from Main street in either direction to Five Points and we would hear very little else, but this does not build factories or help make business better. If these same people could devote a little of this wasted energy to something constructive we would get farther in the next twelve months.

This week is the time set apart for the Boy Scouts of America and if you are a believer in "scouting" you should do something extraordinary for these boys. Twin Falls is decidedly behind many other cities in this great movement and now is our chance to come up to the mark. We should have at least 800 boys in scout work and we haven't largely because we have not had the backing to finance enough troops. Will you do something, Mr. Mayor, to help this world wide move for better citizenship. An old saying goes "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" so let's do the saying rather than cause the boys to do the serving later. If you will do your part in a financial way we can have twice as many troops in Twin Falls and five or six times as many boys in scout work. The Twin Rotary and Kiwanis clubs have started the ball with a good pound sum but this is not enough by any means. The question is what are you going to do.

### THE WOMAN ENTERS

No less an authority than Alfred Reeves, general manager of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, says that "man may earn the family income, but the woman in the home has a very influential part in saying how the budget shall be spent. In no vital purchase as a car, her wishes are certain to have an important bearing on the ultimate purchase."

A recent survey of the New York district showed that of 75 per cent of the cars sold the final choice was made by a woman. A tabulation of the registration of 100,000 cars in various sections of the country showed that 6 per cent of these were owned by women, or 6,000 cars.

Thus, woman not only has a voice in the selection of the car for the family, but she is purchasing her own car in increasing numbers. The woman's tastes and ideas are, therefore, well worth recognition.

But this influence on the part of woman is not alone an indication of her personal interest in the motor car from a selfish standpoint. It is proof that she recognizes the importance of the motor car in the life of the family, and realizes that the automobile furnishes a type of recreation and convenience which father, mother and children can all enjoy together.—The Oldsmobile Peacemaker.

### FATHER AND SON ARE SCOUTS

The story of a father who in philosophical way forced a partnership with his son, to "work together in scouting" and who both recently received the highest award of merit, the Eagle badge, is a story of honor in Salt Lake City. It is a remarkable testimony of the spirit of scouting, and that the work and play of scouting can develop between a boy and his father.

"One day," says the father, "my boy would to me in a joking way, 'Dad, why don't you try and get some merit badges if they look so easy to you?' I told him I could get as many as he. So we started out. He would go to some scout and I to another for the same merit badge, and for a while it was his and back between us, but the new school of learning was getting the better of the old way with which I was familiar. One day we made up our minds to work together. We did not always agree on the same subject (we would not have been father and son if we had), but in the end we got our badge."

In addition I have found a son that likes to let me know he thinks his dad is the only man in scouting, and I think my boy will grow up to be a scout—one that can be depended upon. I have found the fountain of youth because becoming a scout, because a man never grows old if he mixes with younger boys. I believe there is no greater religion than to be of service to the boys. God bless the man who thought of scouting, and God bless the men who keep it up."

### SCOUTS AND RADIO



Many boy scouts interested in radio are serving their communities by locally transmitting the valuable messages sent out by various departments of the United States government, and by encouraging other people to receive this helpful information. The Radio Amateur boys, organized several years ago by the United States navy, to conserve the interests of the coming generation in radio activity, reserves on its membership list the numbers one to one hundred for scouts who have learned to send and receive code at the rate of 20 words per minute.

### Tremendous Growth of Silk Manufacture in the United States

By G. K. Adams, Statistician

The silk worm has apparently \$68,000,000 worth of silk goods. At least, it is felt that the price of \$107,000,000 in 1922. The total value of silk goods manufactured in the United States in 1919 was \$107,000,000. The four years after the close of the war, the value of silk manufactures exported, are nearly two and one-half times as great as that of 1919. The selection is generally made by a committee, often upon a slight knowledge of the subject, based, perhaps, upon other plantings which have been made elsewhere under their observation, perhaps not particularly successful plantings. The argument is that one must have something, and as there are not so very many kinds of trees one must stick to those one has seen, since anything out of the common probably will not grow. And so the decision is made.

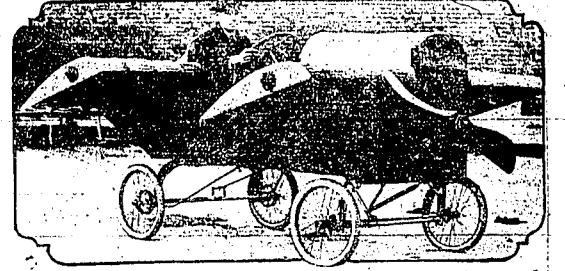
This method of selection, perhaps, may account for the widespread planting of the rock maple in American small-town streets. The choice of this tree is one genuine which the tree lover or student, and the tree knower will, protest. The rock maple is not particularly fast growing. It is awkward in its habit, and is brittle and frail. It is not as decorative as many of its sturdier brethren, and when so many better trees may be had at an equal or less cost, its popularity is difficult to understand.

"Utopia" is a word used to describe that which is pleasant, happy, and ideal. Rosemary and Rosebrook Rapids sounds a little bit like St. Thomas. There are no more mosquitoes, and no malaria. (The word Utopia means a place that is not a practicality.)

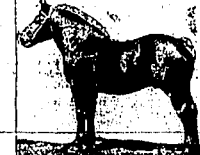

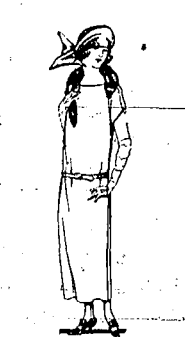
