

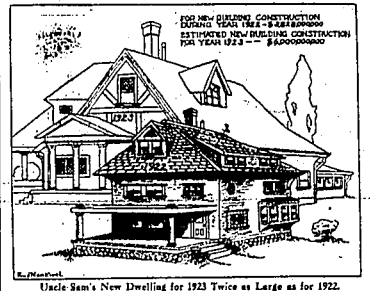

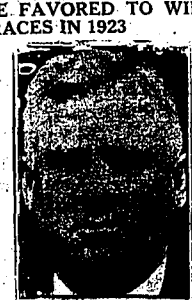

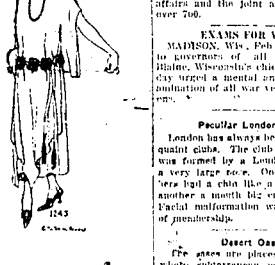

The market news service of the U. S. department of agriculture in a report received here, refers to the growing of lettuce in this state as follows: The increasing importance of Idaho as a lettuce producing state is shown quite clearly by the shipment this year of 322 cars, compared with 122 cars in 1921 and only 26 cars in 1920.
