

CONGRESS IS PLACING TO ACCURACY SOON

Sixty-seventh Congress Will Expire at Noon Next Sunday. Ship Subsidy Rural Credits Bill and Many Others to Go Over Before That Hour. Many Die on Calendar.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—The sixty-seventh congress was winding up the home stretch today. Despite a large number of bills on the calendar for various other purposes, the closing session seems to be an unusual feeling of peace and contentment.

Most of these unpassed bills will die with the expiration of the session at noon next Sunday. Members feel the principal work has been done and that Congress will go away without fear of being called into extra session this summer.

Ship Subsidy Bill is Top. The disposal of the ship subsidy bill was the main business of the day. The bill was passed by a vote of 215 to 175.

During the closing days, leaders hope to get final action on the rural credits legislation which has been held up in the house since the senate passed it.

Additional nominations were expected during the week, including a nomination to E. Mont Holly as governor of Porto Rico and of Senator Harry New of Indiana as postmaster general, succeeding Hubert Work, who has become secretary of the interior.

Legislation which probably will fail to find a place in the present session of congress includes: The ship subsidy bill. Approval of American entrance into the international court of justice.

A mass of proposed railroad, tax and economic bills. The resolution proposing constitutional amendments against child labor, the exemption of income tax and change in the date of inaugurating presidents have slim chances of passage.

Armour and Morris May Be Restrained From Packing Merger. CHICAGO, Feb. 25.—Purchase of Armour and Morris packing by Armour, may go through despite opposition of Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, the interested parties here declared today.

At the hearing on April 2 the packers are confident they will be able to secure the necessary approval of the secretary of agriculture that the deal is not in violation of the packer control law.

Exports of Grains from U. S. Announced. WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—The department of commerce today announced exports of grains from the United States for the week ending Feb. 24, as follows: Flour—250,000 bushels. Corn—1,770,000 bushels. Wheat—12,000 bushels. Rye—1,200,000 bushels. Wheat—310,000 bushels. Flour—34,000 barrels.

Association of Nations Is Urged for World Peace

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—The farming administration fully realizes it is in a definite position to lead an association of nations, to take the place for the United States of the League of Nations, and that it will be made to accomplish such a step toward world peace.

This sentiment was made by the United Press today by one of the highest authorities of the American government, in a preliminary message to the senate for authorization to have the United States represented officially in the world court and honor by the League of Nations but with reservations keeping the country from any commitments with the league itself.

At the present time, there does not exist any very definite authority for this association, the authority indicated. He said that the policy of the administration is to take up and settle one important thing at a time. Consequently, the administration does not claim that American participation in the court is the "association of nations" that President Harding is pledged to do in a coming year. And neither may American entrance into the court be taken to indicate that such a step is being taken toward world peace, as the Ruhr fight

between France and Germany will bring it before the body for consideration. It was generally agreed in the senate that approval of the president's request cannot be obtained during the last week of the present session.

The belief prevails here that the president will have the country during the long recess of congress, and that he will be able to bring those who have been claiming the United States has not been doing its part in settling world peace.

Gasoline Prices Are Advanced All Over America by Standard

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—W. N. Huron, president of the Standard Oil company of Indiana today declared before the senate committee on commerce that his company was guilty of price fixing.

Huron declared that the charges, which were made by Thomas Hines, former president of the Western Fuel company, were absolutely false and that no advance information had been given to any concerning their alleged prices.

Gasoline prices were advanced in all parts of the United States today and parts of Canada. Standard Oil, the largest refiner, raised prices at the tank wagon 12 cents for New York and New England. A semi-official announcement said that prices in West Virginia were raised one cent. In Colorado gas was retailed at 22 cents, an advance of two cents.

Increasing stocks of crude oil and increased consumption with the winter season, it was said, were the given by men as the cause of the nation-wide rise.

FRENCH NEED CONSOLIDATION OF RAILROADS IN RUHR DISTRICTS

"Hands Off in Ruhr" is Dictum of French in Ruhr District with Regard to All Nations Seeking to Acquire Territory in That Region; About 12,000 Men Working on Roads and 120,000 Required.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—The French need consolidation of the inter-state commerce commission's tentative plan for consolidating the inter-state railroads into a single system was expressed by railroad executives in a meeting here today.

Spoken Mr. Schumacher, president of the Union and Southern, and the spokesman branded it "unworkable," declared it reduces competition and injures the public interest. He declared that efficient and economical operation would be impossible.

It is further stated that "The California Vegetable Union will also place at the disposal of the Idaho Producers' union all stock and other lettuce packing material now on hand in Idaho, same to be paid for as used from advertisements as referred to above." Inquiries are being made to know whether it is desired to sell celery, cauliflower, onions or potatoes through the Idaho Producers' Union.

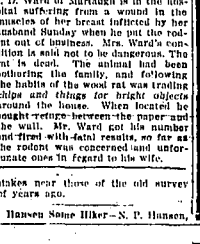

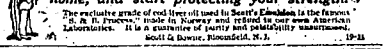
