GERMANY WILL FIGHT FRANCE IN SHORT TIME

Another Franco-German War Is An Accepted Fact Among Both Parties in Ruhr District. Germany Looks Stronger Now; France Will Not Evacuate Until Germany Pays In Full.

(Copyright 1923, by U. P.) DUESSELDORF, Feb. 28.—The most startling feature of the Ruhr fighting is the calm composure with which both the French troops and the inhabitants accept the idea that there will be another Franco-German war in about six weeks. It is the ultimate answer to the question of what is going to be the outcome of the occupation? For the immediate present a more pressing question is, "Will the French and Belgians ever get out, and on what conditions?"

The correspondent has asked Premier Poincaré, General Degoutte, Herman Meyer, a German mine foreman, and many persons in the invaded territory. Premier Poincaré said: "We will refuse to evacuate until Germany proves she will guarantee the Versailles treaty and give sufficient guarantees."

THE PRIMARY VETO

(By JAMES D. WHELAN.)

I would have no fault to find with Governor Moore personally for his veto of the primary bill, since he was elected on a platform pledged to the retention of the present system had there been no deception practiced.

Governor Moore, however, is not guiltless, or free from being a participant in the deceiving of the voters. His attitude is much like that of Harding in the last campaign.

The objections are of two kinds. In the first place there are numerous defects in which objections are made by Governor Moore, and some of these have merit.

Some of the objections raised are inseparable from any sort of elections. One is the element of expense. The people would save money if elections were abolished, if officers were appointed for life by an autocrat.

In his fallacious argument, the governor tangled in the web of his own sophistry, seeks to create the impression that in some way, by the process of straining through a convention, we let the sheep go through and strain out the goats.

God has implanted as part of nature itself, the principle from which all governments spring, in the human soul. Not in a few souls but in all souls of rational adult humans.

This is a government of laws not of men, but it will be such only when people take so active a part in public affairs that they can discriminate between issues, and vote for men for what they represent.
