American Jurists and Jurists Have Decided That the Crime of Murder Must Pay the Penalty Regardless of Sex; Prominent Judge Makes Bold Statement When Two Women Are Sentenced.

NEW YORK, March 10.—Women are no longer "act with murder." The open season on murder, during which wives and sweethearts could kill with impunity, confound acquittal, is a thing of the past. American jurists have determined that women must pay for crimes of passion.

Biggest Bowling Tournery In U.S. Is On In Milwaukee

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 10.—The largest American Bowling Congress tournament in the history of the bowling game opens here today.

Milwaukee boosters terms, following speeches by officers of the American Bowling Congress and city officials, took the drivers and started the pins falling in the tournament, which officials say will go down in history as the largest ever held.

Official figures announced for the A. B. C. officers have the entry list at 1,862 teams, or more than 9,000 bowlers.

Last year when the entry list of 1,126 teams for the tournament at Toledo was announced, bowling fans all over the country gasped—this was a record. The Badger state has 1,000 teams, or more than half of the total entry list, which goes down as another record.

Not only the team, but the singles and doubles figures for this year far surpass those of last year's tournament.

The two team men mark is 3,773 teams, while at Toledo it was 2,411. Then there will be 1,000 teams seeking the individual championship from Willie Lunger, Chicago, who won the trophy from a field of 4,818 men at Toledo last year.

The prize money will probably be around the \$25,000 figure, according to an announcement by Secretary A. L. Lambert.

In order to accommodate the additional teams Secretary Lambert has arranged to roll five squads in the first Sunday of the event, March 11.

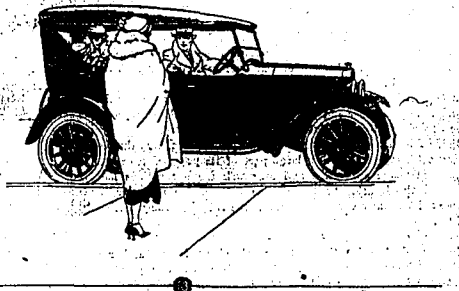

YOUR HEALTH

A fifth of the class I met examined for the American army during the world war were found physically unfit to perform any kind of military service either at home or abroad.

This is the most striking fact discovered by Surgeon General Merritt W. Ireland, in his analysis of the examination of more than four million selective service registrants.

One out of every five, physically unfit even for home duty! If you are looking for the greatest national peril, there it is.

Our whole civilization depends on the national health as its foundation.

Curiously enough, and contrary to what most of us would expect, defects of the bones and the organs of locomotion, which enable our bodies to move, ranked first among the causes of army rejection.

These defects constituted 17 out of each 100 rejectees! Diseases of the heart and blood vessels came second, with 45 per cent of the total. Diseases of the eyes ranked third. They came tuberculosis.

In Wyoming only 13 per cent of the "applicants" were physically unfit. At the other end of the line was Rhode Island, with 42 per cent so physically defective that they were rejected.

Rhode Island's bad showing, according to experts, was due to its being a factory state with a large part of its population drawn from abroad where oppression and overwork for generations had undermined the health. Seems hard to believe, for the average immigrant looks a lot healthier than the highly strung native American.

Money-mad America thinks too much about its natural resources and industrial products, not enough about our greatest product—the human being and his health. Foreign trade, factory output, the products of forest and mine and vein of the farm—all these are secondary to good health.

Health should come foremost. In many ways the government can help, by helping. But personal health is man's own up to the individual.

Get plenty of wholesome food, sleep, fresh air and outdoor exercise, and, barring the bad luck of inheriting germ diseases, health will be fairly good on the average. In particular, the auto driver should look up his car and go about on foot at least one day a week.

When health is gone, the rest doesn't count for much. Your body is a delicate machine. Take care of it.

GRAIN PRICES LOWER. CHICAGO, March 10.—Grain prices were lower at the close of the futures market today as the result of week-end realizing which developed late in the session.

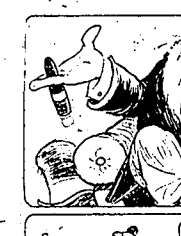

RAIL CONTRACTS TO BE LET FOR 15 MILES

Nevada Newspaper Leans That Construction Will Probably Begin on Idaho-Columbia-Silver Lake Extension, the Elkko Free Press, according to recent reports from Wells, the survey work is entirely completed from that city to Contact, which is the first stretch of road to be constructed.

The necessary map which will be submitted to the contractors for a bid on the work has not been completed, and it is probable that this spring will witness the actual start in the construction of this much needed road from the main line of the railroad to the heart of the copper district in northern Elko county.

A recent Twin Falls dispatch states that Contact, president of the Idaho Central, at the present time, was about ready to give up the project to other parties, but Mr. Wolfe emphatically denies this rumor, however stating that it is incorrect.

Mr. Wolfe, however, strenuously denies that he is without funds to carry the project to completion, stating that he is assured of the present time, ample finances to build the road through to Roseburg while the present firm is only to complete the work as far as Contact.

One thing is certain, and that is that construction will be speedily begun this spring or the present outfit will lose their certificates of convenience, and follow in the footsteps of the many other companies which have been formed to put this project across, but which have found the construction of the railroad too large a job for their finances.

From the recent casual statements made by officials of the railroad indicate that the contract for the construction of the first 15 miles from Wells to Contact, which is the first work on this much desired project will start in the very near future.

However, from the policy of silence being maintained by the company it is entirely probable that the construction outfit will have to be on the ground before the public will be aware of the fact that work has actually started on the construction of the road.
