BENTON CASE CREATES STIR IN MAJOR LEAGUES

NEW YORK, March 12.—Disagreement between the Baseball commission and the president of the National League as to the status of the Benton case has created a situation that will be a real one in baseball.

Landis ruled that Benton was good enough to pitch for the Cincinnati Reds if he was good enough to pitch for the American Association on neutral grounds.

Heydler instructed the Reds not to put Benton on the payroll and said the former Giant southpaw could not come back to Brooklyn.

Attitude of National League president in this instance is as consistent as it was in 1917 when the Herzog-Benton case first was brought to his attention. Both players made charges against each other and he permitted them to remain in baseball for their mutual period of usefulness and more six years later to raise objection to the return of Benton for reasons that existed for three years, while Benton was pitching for the New York Giants.

Benton claimed in 1917 that Herzog made him an offer to throw a game and that he touched it off and told Art Fletcher, captain of the Giants, about it. Benton pitched the game in question and won it. Heydler brought the case before him and they both questioned the veracity of each other's story. Herzog claims that Benton was "out to get him" because of some trouble they had then. Herzog was managing the Cincinnati Reds and Herzog was pitching for him. Herzog said at the time that he would get even with Benton and that Benton said at the time that he would get even with Herzog. Benton was later traded to the Reds and Herzog afterward went to New York.

Heydler's position is all the more prominent because he was one of the prime movers in the move to create the position of baseball commissioner and appoint the late Commissioner, Dan Johnson, American League president, opposed it and Heydler and

his National League opponent made the threat of a 12 club boycott and Landis was put in a difficult position. The position of Heydler is rather precarious as it is against him in this case. 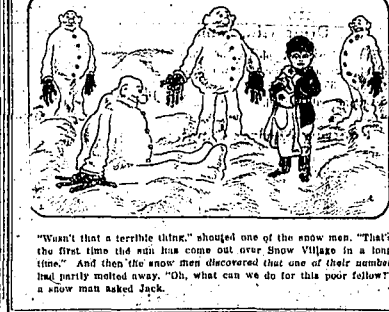

There is a growing demand for more of a community spirit in Twin Falls than there has been for a decade. There seems to be real signs that this thing may mature into a full grown spirit with all the earmarks of a real giant, but there are some great boulders still on our highway and the gigantic task of removing these is every man's duty to this city.

Perhaps the greatest stumbling block for many is the success of your neighbor. It is hard to believe but nevertheless we cannot bear to see our neighbors succeed. In other words we love the thought that our competitor is losing or failing. Too many times we hear this expression, "So and so is just about broke; hold out a little longer and you will have this thing by the horns and sailing will be easy. But such a spirit is not the kind that will bring us together as a community. Such a spirit will not make of us a fighting unit with the same loyalty that carried victory to the Allies in France.

There has been too much "small town stuff" in Twin Falls during the past ten years. There have been times when the churches were said to be arrayed against the business district and vice versa but if that was ever true it never should have been so. There can be no other ground if these two great forces do not cooperate we are doomed as a city as far as future growth and development are concerned.

And now we are facing an election and this same old question confronts us: Some say we have a business man's ticket and a church ticket, but if this is true it is the greatest mistake that the city of Twin Falls has ever made. The all important question is not which ticket shall win but the great question is what kind of an administration will we get if the head of this ticket or that ticket is elected to office. Let's come out in the open and play fair in this great event. We need a better administration than we have ever had since the city of Twin Falls was incorporated because the problems are larger and more perplexing than they have ever been before.

We are living in a great age and it takes great men and women to measure up to the requirements of this day. If you will permit me to name the most vicious sin which is permeating our community today I would say it is "Gossip." This weapon will be used in the coming election more effectively than all other agencies together and those who make the greatest use of this tool of the devil may win but we hope they will lose.

Let's play fair and fight in the open but whatever we do or whatever our lot let's stand true to the trust which has been bestowed upon us and let us say or do nothing against our neighbor which we would not have our neighbor say or do to us.

STORM KILLS TWENTY-THREE

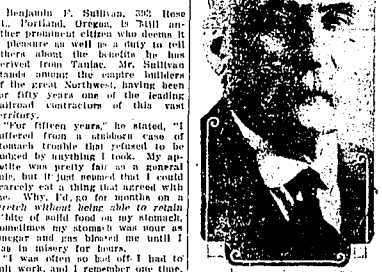

ROSS EXPLAINS CONDITIONS OF BEET CONTRACT COMMUNITY SINGING WILL BE TRIED IN TWIN FALLS CITY

Secretary of the Idaho Farm Bureau Association Tells About Agreement with Sugar Beet Growers and Types Different Farming. (BY MRS. C. H. KRENGEL.) The contract will amount to \$475,000 for the year 1923, being an increase of 25 cents per ton for every ton of beets delivered to the United States Beet Sugar Corporation. The committee will conduct an active campaign appealing to the farmers to not only accept the contract, but to approve diversification as a permanent agricultural policy in all sections where best culture is adapted to eliminate and soil conditions we are asking the farmers to increase their acreage. Each grower will be asked to contribute two cents per ton towards a general fund. The committee will employ an auditor and a chemist.
