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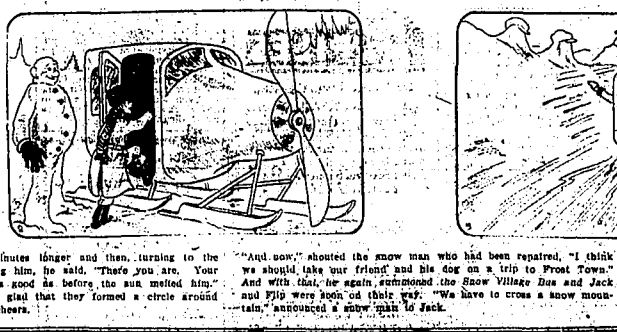

Things that are said in the city of Twin Falls are not usually half as bad as some "Busy Body" interprets them to be. If we could get a lot of these so-called interpreters of other people's thoughts to keep quiet there would not be one-half the trouble and discontent that there is in our city.

Some people will be forgotten before they get outside the city limits when they come to leave Twin Falls and perhaps some might be glad if they had never known them. We presume that the people we refer to will never see this so it may not mean you at all. Mr. Reader, but it is a great thing to live so that some of the things for which you stand will be remembered long after you are gone. It is possible for each of us to do this.

Community singing has done much for the various communities throughout the nation in the past decade and we believe that it will have a much larger place in our community life than it has had in the past. The willingness of people to gather into a community group and sing is an evidence that they are leaving much of the evil which usually pervades the general run of mankind behind them. Community singing will tend to bring co-operation about faster and more definite than any other movement. Twin Falls will have a chance this week to demonstrate that she can outstep every community singing white. But this cannot be done without the hearty cooperation of every singer great or near-great in this city. Will you do this with a zest and a vim or will you just half do it?

SEEDS YOU SOW

With spring approaching swiftly, most of us feel the stirring of the seed-planting instinct inherited from days when our ancestors lived naturally, close to the soil. It is an instinct that dies hard, even when smothered by the congestion of cities. You realize this as you see the city man ploughing a home garden almost pathetic in size, and his wife eager to plant flowers. In all philosophy, there is nothing more fundamental and far-reaching than the biblical parable about the sower who went forth to sow. Some seed fell on fertile ground and sprouted. Some fell on barren ground and brought no results.

In the above parable, artist Sutherland illustrates the ancient parable. And, by having the farmer sow by hand, he puts more life into his picture than if he had drawn a "scientific" machine sower.

The old parable applies to the life of each of us, in this way: We work on the law of averages. Effort is like seed. Not all of it brings results. But some does. Naturally, given fertile soil, the more seed we plant (the more effort we make), the greater will be our crop. The crop is fortune, fame, health, or happiness, whether they come singly or in combination.

Heaped down from the misty past is the bit of wisdom that we must sow as we sow. Not always, possibly, but true on the law of averages. Many of us, wretched and unhappy now, are merely reaping the harvest of wrong seed sown in the past.

The approach of spring should bring new courage and determination, for spring fairly shouts to us to forget the old crop and sow seed for a new harvest. As we are sowing now, we'll reap later—money, fame, happiness, health. It's the law of cause and effect—compensation, Emerson called it.

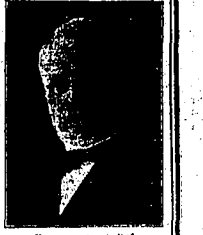

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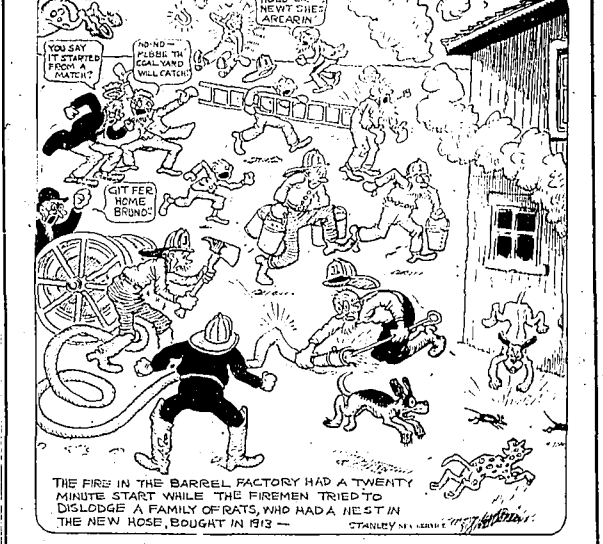
