THE PRESIDENT'S FUTURE

The last of our troops are home from the Rhineland and all active participation of America in the rehabilitation of Europe is ended. The conference at Lansanne has broken down, desperate appeals to the American "official" observer, Mr. Child, to invent an eleventh hour way out satisfactory to all...

Dispatches from abroad declare Europe is looking to America. Some diplomats see in the British debt funding negotiations now pending the beginning of a new era of international co-operation beyond the post-panic penances in which those of the late allies still on diplomatic speaking terms say meaningless nice things about each other—patiently for home consumption.

President Harding, to a debatable measure, was elected on the strength of his League of Nations-by-name-opposition. Can he repeat it? Has his "conference of nations" brought an appreciable measure of international good will? Has it been a step directly toward the solution of present conditions? Is America satisfied with its foreign policy?

These are some of the questions Mr. Harding must answer, but they are not all. He will be looked and probed on his domestic program. The executive undoubtedly will have a difficult time of it, but his has been no bed of roses thus far and he will probably not finish the ordeal. But chiefly he must answer as to the foreign policy. And he will find it difficult to convince many that the course of his administration has been satisfying.

SWEET GRAFT

A sugar famine this year? Not unless inventives staggered and create a shortage by stocking up with a hundred or so pounds for each family. Remember, that what started the sugar shortage several years ago and shot the price up around 30 cents a pound, Cuba this year will produce about 197,000 tons more sugar than last year, according to the leading sugar trade authority, Comma-Meyer. The European beet sugar crop will total nearly 400,000 tons more than in the 1921-22 season. In America we started 1923 with "war-time size" stocks of sugar in storage—official government report. Much depends, of course, on the size of the 1923 American crop.

But Cuban sugar is the main regulator of what we pay for sugar. And the supply of Cuban sugar for this year "appears to be practically the same as was available in 1921," says the market letter which the American Sugar Refining company sends to its customers. In 1921, five to eight cents a pound was considered a good wholesale price for refined sugar here in the United States.

It's hard to get at the truth about the sugar situation, for it's an industry of highly complicated statistics. Let's poke a bit of unfavorable news and analyze it.

The American Sugar Refining company estimates that the surplus stocks of Cuban sugar around the first of the year 1923 were 1,129,000 tons less than a year before.

Half of this decrease is counteracted by the 1922-23 gain in Cuban and European sugar production.

And it's reasonable to expect that most of the balance will be canceled by the fact that Americans this coming summer will make less home-made wine than last summer and the one before. The enormous increase in the amount of sugar used by Americans, during the last few years, has been due mainly to home-made wines. Fifty pounds of sugar doesn't look like much to a cellar chemist. Wine making is on the wane "too much trouble, not worth the fuss."

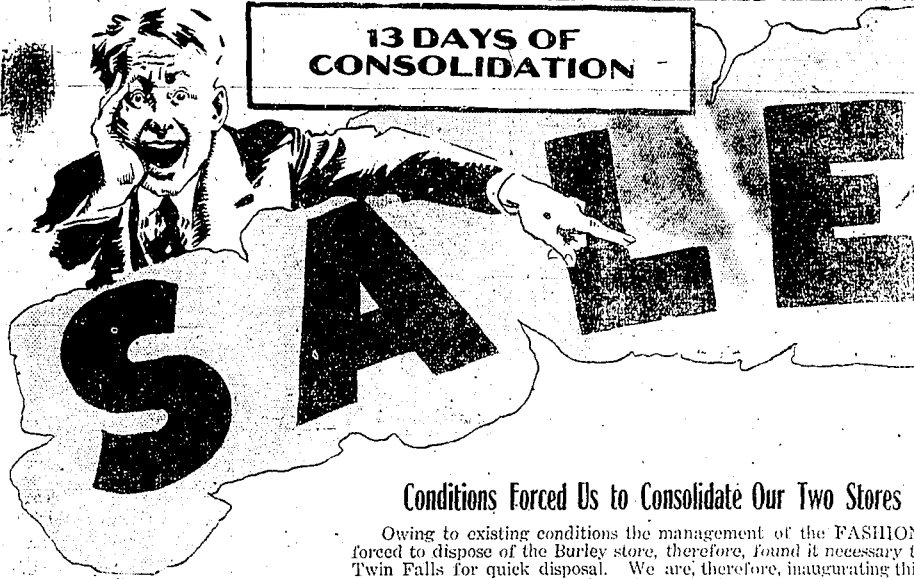
