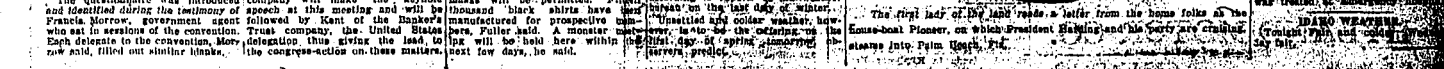

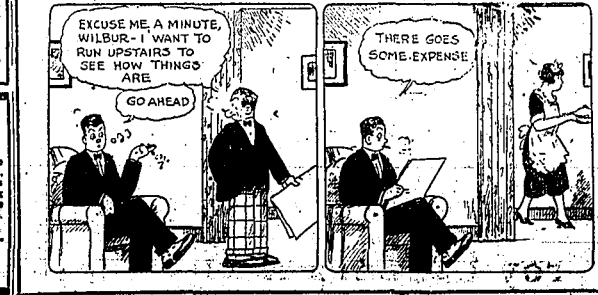

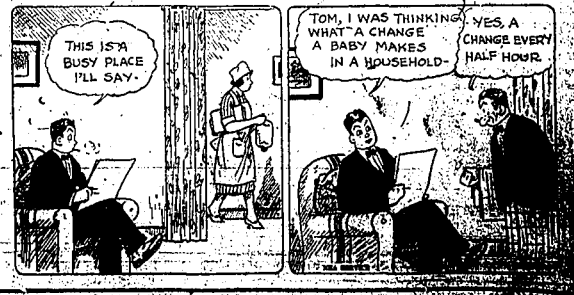

Reorganization Plan for Twin Falls High Is Adopted by Board

Three and Three System Will Take Place of Four-and Two Method Next Year; Office of Principal of Senior High Eliminated; Various Claims Made for New Form; Bradley Succeeds Foster on Board.

The Twin Falls school board at an adjourned meeting last night voted to reorganize the high school on the new plan, which is known as the three and three plan, instead of the four and two plan, which has heretofore prevailed. Combined the offices of superintendent and principal of the senior high school, under M. C. Mitchell and elected Mrs. C. A. North as principal of the reorganized junior. J. G. Bradley was appointed on the school board to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of W. E. Foster and the matter of refunding bonds outstanding at a lower rate of interest was considered.

It is argued for the new plan of organization which places the seventh, eighth and ninth grades in the junior high and the tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades in the senior high, that psychologically and physiologically it makes the break between the junior and senior schools at a more logical point, that it tends toward greater efficiency and that it costs less. It is also claimed, considering the elimination of a stepmaster, the total savings in making alterations in the salaries for the superintendent and the junior high principal will be something over \$1000 a year. The matter of elimination of the office of high school principal and its consolidation with the superintendent was considered last year, but the proposition then discussed did not involve reorganization.
