

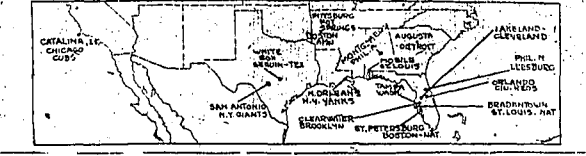

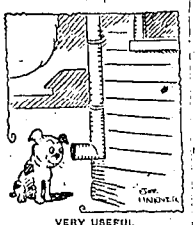

Great Glass Press. About strike have been made recently in the manufacture of glass pressing machines. The largest automatic glass press ever built is 11 feet in height, and covers a floor space of 7 by 7 feet and weighs 8,000 pounds. The machine mounts 8 rods 10 inches in diameter and 18 inches high, and has a plunger stroke of 14 inches, elevating a maximum of 150,000 pounds pressure in the plunger. Its maximum speed is 25 articles per minute. It is designed to operate in conjunction with the large-size Miller feeder, which automatically feeds the molten glass from the tank to the mold.

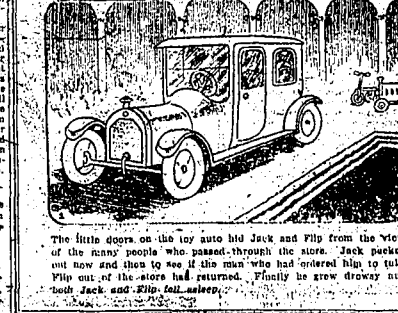

YOUR FEARS

Surgeons find 27 silver spoons in the stomach of a patient in a Kansas asylum. In addition to the spoons, he had swallowed some sponges, matches, pins and few other delicacies that usually appeal only to ostriches and goats in the comic pictures.

It's a remarkable case. For the unfortunate, who had tried to start a department store inside himself, apparently experienced no acute trouble as a result of his strange diet. His stomach had been "soaked," and he acted queerly, but symptoms were not pronounced enough for diagnosis until a doctor watched him through a keyhole and saw him swallow his twenty-seventh spoon.

Now, if any of us swallowed such a spoon, we would probably die. He was at death's door inside an hour. Also, probably, hysterical. This shows what fear and imagination do to us.

Give a man a drink of preservative whiskey. Then, while he's enjoying the purring tumbler, suddenly tell him that you took the whiskey from a bootlegger and tried it out on him to learn whether it was wood alcohol.

You know the result. "Instantly he begins to feel" symptoms—queer shooting pains, burning in the stomach and a dimness of sight. Let the drinker's imagination continue unchecked, and inside an hour he'll be as physically upset, chagrined as, as if he really had swallowed wood alcohol.

His fear starts his imagination working. Imagination, in turn, produces symptoms of poisoning.

This principle works, at times, in all of us. "We may have eaten only the purest of foods. But if we get the fear that some of the food was tainted, and that we're victims of ptomaine, the probability is that we'll become acutely ill. Come, again, in reverse—"minute by minute, in every way, I get worse and worse."

Sometimes you tell the doctor, "I've had a lot to worry me lately, and I'm nervous and all upset and my stomach's in bad shape."

Worry, unbalancing certain of our endocrine glands, affects the nerves and causes hyperactivity of the stomach. That starts indigestion. Introspection—self-analysis—similarly affects nearly every other part of the body. If you begin feeling your pulse every few minutes, your heart will speed up or slow down, according to which ever you fear.

Excellent medicine prescription is this: "Forget yourself and your health. Nature in the average case cures quickly, if we allow her to go ahead without interference from our fears and imagination."

INCREASE GROSS SUPPLY OF BEEF

Kansas Expert Recommends Practice of Producing and Fattening Young Animals.

PASTURE OF BIG IMPORTANCE

Experiment Station Produced Gain With Calves With 35 Per Cent Less Grain Than It Required With Big Steers.

A more general practice of producing and fattening baby beef will insure the gross beef supply of the country and add to the profit of the cattle producer and feeder. Dr. A. W. McCaughey of the agricultural college believes. A baby beef is a steer or heifer that is fat and ready for the market at the age of twelve to fourteen months, weighing from 200 to 300 pounds each.

Pasture is Limiting Factor. "Pasture is the limiting factor in beef production," Doctor McCaughey says. "A baby beef grows but only

season, and that only on a calf which is he suckling his mother. If he were carried over and marketed off of grass as a three-year-old, as is so often done, he requires a cow that might have been producing a baby calf each of the three seasons this steer was grazing beyond the age of baby beef.

"The average three-year-old steer represents a gross selling weight of not less than 1200 pounds. The three-year-old heifer that he might be produced by the cow that was producing a baby calf each of the three seasons this steer was grazing beyond the age of baby beef would represent a gross selling weight of 2400 pounds of beef."

Increases Beef Supply. "The baby beef practice not only increases the beef supply—it also increases beef production costs. Just near the University experiment station a group of calves exactly the same age. It required 20 per cent less grain and 20 per cent less roughage to produce gain on the calves than it did on the big steers, and the calves marketed as baby beef showed a net return of \$37 a head more than the big steers."

CARING FOR EXPOSED PARTS

All Wounds Should Be Well Painted With White Lard or Corrosive Sublimite Help.

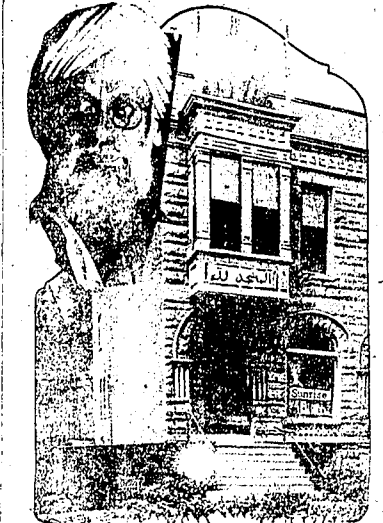
When large lard must be saved off, or there are cankers or abscesses on the trunk, the exposed parts should be well painted with white lard. A teaspoonful of corrosive sublimate well mixed into a quart of white lard will last a little off of this, makes a good paint and disinfectant. Do not put any of the lard on the face, and if paint is intended to tan those some dust on to take off the lard. This is not true of the face should be kept out for better painting. If there have been paint on a baby head the face are very likely to be soiled with the lard. A cup of lard with one or two thick layers of kerosene or gas, after painting the affected parts, is a good way to remove lard with both sides. As a rule most of the larger deal can be found on the south side of the face, and the lard is more expensive than kerosene. For example a two quart jar of kerosene will last out for a year, and the same amount of lard will last out for a year.

TESTS SHOW MUCH SOUR SOIL

Only One Piece of Land in Illinois County Found to Be Sweet—Legumes Were Cause.

In soil testing meetings held recently, by the county agricultural agent of this county, Ill., in which each farmer or grower was asked to bring several samples of soil from his farm, only one farm showed that the soil was sweet according to reports to the Illinois Department of Agriculture. One of these farms stated that it has been growing a large amount of corn, sweet clover, and alfalfa.
