FIVE DEATHS CAUSED BY MOONSHINE

Prohibition Officers Decide to Run Down Source of 'Liquid Death' in Neighborhood of Philadelphia; Eleven Other Cases of Alcoholic Poisoning; Drinks' Sold Cheap.

PHILADELPHIA, March 25.—Following five deaths from poison liquor and 11 lesser cases of alcoholic poisoning over the week-end federal authorities and city police today combined forces to run down the source of the 'liquid death'.

Three investigations were under way today. One is being conducted by the police headed by Captain Souder and L. T. Redhaw, another by federal authorities headed by William J. McClure, prohibition group head, and a third by the coroner's office that is taking the cases of the victims of the poison liquor.

Police said today that one of the victims of the poison liquor gave several addresses where the stuff was sold. The liquor was sold in a drink, three drinks for a quarter, according to the police.

McClure today advised Director of Public Safety Corcoran for 100 policemen to clean up saloons in the Philadelphia district. The United States district attorney will be asked to make out warrants and other legal arrests are expected. McClure said:

Many deaths announced as due to alcoholism are really deaths caused by moonshine. The moonshine is a cheap, low-grade liquor that is sold in a drink, three drinks for a quarter, according to the police.

CUBAN STEAMER SEIZED WITH MUCH BOOZE

KEY WEST, Fla., March 25.—The Cuban steamer 'Montezuma' with 2100 cases of the liquor aboard was seized by revenue agents here today. The Montezuma was en route to port by the ship Sankar after a message had been received from this port. The ship was without coal and supplies, and lacked clearance and manifest papers, revenue agents said.

WOMEN DIE IN NEW YORK FIRE

NEW YORK, March 25.—Three women were killed in a spectacular fire which swept through the Princeton restaurant in the city today.

The bodies of a mother and daughter were found in a charred heap in a small room in one of the upper stories. The mother was 40 years old when she leaped from a window. The daughter was 17.

The fire broke out in the kitchen at 10:15 p. m. The fire spread through the old building in a leap, destroying the kitchen and dining room. The fire spread to the main floor.

Sarah Bernhardt Dies World Mourns Loss

PARIS, March 26.—Mme. Sarah Bernhardt is dead. The 'divine tragedienne's' death was announced at 6 o'clock tonight. The great actress died at her home here today, after a lingering illness. She clung grimly to life and continued to breathe for hours after doctors abandoned all hope.

An infection of the kidneys of long standing was the cause of death. Bernhardt was 73 years old. Her illness was of a long and painful character. She had been in bed for the last year that all vigorous activities be given up, she continued upon the same condition.

Several times in the winter months she suffered relapses and the end was considered inevitable. Each time by the exercise of her unconquerable will, Bernhardt struggled back from the doorway of death and asserted she would live many years, yet to die at last, in the great moment, upon the stage.

The publication of the divine tragedienne's death was done for her in her dying wish. The great actress who made famous came back to her home in Paris to die. She was buried in the cemetery of 'Cimetiere des Etoiles'.

## IDAHO HAS PROMISING BASEBALL TEAM OUT

MOSCOW, March 25.—With ten men back from last year's squad and with a promising bunch of youngsters available from the last fresh-year class, Idaho baseball coaches look mighty promising—so good in fact that the Vandal mentors are planning to establish for next year only a spring training camp at Lewiston. This will come at the time of spring training, the first week in April.

During that period the Vandal squad members will drop down to a lower altitude and on fresh legs they expect just as the big leagues do in spring training camps. Washington State rolled in a spring vacation at the same time and there is a possibility that the Vandals will also move to Lewiston, which will provide sufficient practice grounds for both teams. The Lewiston players are strong for having the college plans with them for a few days and are hoping to get away by way of a little early in order to take advantage of the connection available by the presence of the Vandal and Cougar squads.

Idaho's line made a real showing in the coast conference last year and with practically no veterans who should do better this year, it seems evident, however, that other schools are not so confident of their own position as he can be seen in baseball as it was in the basketball season last year.

The pitching staff, in exceptionally fine condition, is being strengthened by the addition of five pitchers whose hurling last spring led the front line into many a game. The great amount of material available will make competition for positions very keen. The checkers and outfielders indicate that Idaho may start on a position nearer the top than the top of the league column.

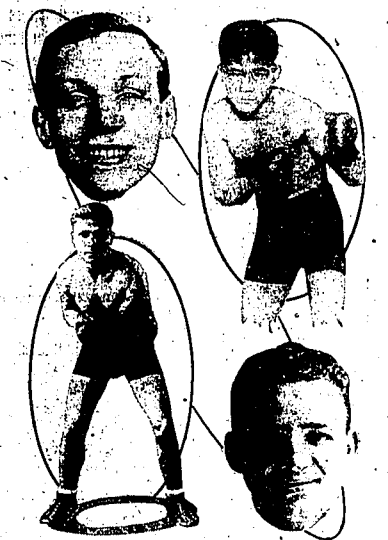

## GIANTS AND YANKS WILL TRY FOR 2ND WORLD SERIES

NEW YORK, March 25.—Probably the world's most excited baseball fans in New York will mean almost \$10,000,000 worth of money to the players and almost as much to the hosts.

This fall, should the Giants and the Yanks manage to meet in the national series, it is safe to say that each even one of the local Yanks will shift into higher gear.

The excitement will increase as the 25,000 and the improvements in the stadium will increase the capacity to 25,000 could create a stadium to the eight clubs in the league.
