BLACKMAIL PLOT TO FORCE MILLIONAIRE TO PAY HUGE SUM

NEW YORK, March 27.—Assistant District Attorney Fred Peora stated today he will summon to his office in connection with investigation of the murder of Dorothy King, Draper M. Daugherty, son of Harry M. Daugherty, attorney general of the United States.

My only information concerning Mr. Draper Daugherty's connection with the case comes from the press," Peora said, "but I can locate Mr. Daugherty today. I shall most certainly ask him to come to my office for a conference.


SETTLEMENT OF HILLSDALE FIGHT ANNOUNCED TODAY

Full adjustment of all litigation over the Hillsdale litigation district was arrived at this afternoon at a conference between Judge James H. Ladd, of the city, representing the Hillsdale district, and William E. Morgan, of Boise, representing the Hillsdale litigation district. As a result all parties are satisfied and all are united in favor of participating in the waters and in the benefits of the American Falls dam.

Some time ago a number of suitors sought to get out of the Hillsdale district by being located on what were known as the "mountain" and the "grassy lands." In the meantime the district sought to have \$100,000 bonds. The district refused the withdrawal and the matter demonstrated the validity of the bonds. The court sustained the district in the matter of withdrawal and took the bond issue matter and judgment. Under settlement the pump lands are allowed to withdraw, and sell from new irrigation ditches. All matters have passed at the last session. This will reduce maintenance \$2 an acre and four cent water rate. "Mountains" are cut off. On the other hand, the contract against the bond issue by withdrawal of its validity extends to withdrawal which was not admitted.

Vincenzo Richards is Going After Tennis Championship and It is Stated by Fans That He Has Good Chance; Franco Has Several Good Young Players but Most of Them Lack Experience.

By Henry L. Farrell. NEW YORK, March 27.—American colors were spread all over the place when the outdoor season had its real opening in England last week.

With the exception of the British amateur golf championships, American entries in all of the other European classics border on the cliché class. It does not follow that the American amateur golfers going in quest of the British title are of inferior ability, but the team is not representative of the real power of the amateur game in this country.

Vincenzo Richards arranged some time ago that he had decided to go to the tennis championships at Wimbledon and "Vinnie" stands a mighty fine chance to win the title that was won twice by "Bill" Tilden.

Richards is the third among the tennis players of the country, but there are no players on the other side who can compare with Tilden or Bill Johnston, the only ones who rank above the Forthman youth here.

Several recent occurrences will help Richards on his way through the tournament. If the Australians quit after their plan to invade the Davis cup youngsters after the Davis cup, Gerald Patterson, the present Wimbledon champion, will not be able to defend his title; and that removes the biggest obstacle Richards would have to face.

Another formidable contender was also removed from competition when Hannelstrom, the brilliant Swedish player, came to this country to establish himself in business. While his return to Sweden may be in Philadelphia his home, and will not compete in the Wimbledon tournament or the Davis cup match.

Franco has several good young players but they have not the experience of the American boy and none of the veteran players have anything on him.

Fernando means Mrs. London who seems to be in the best form of her career. Mrs. Leslie Barrer, the Bostoner who is now in England, can hardly have to win the women's championship at Wimbledon, but she has a fine chance to finish second and take all the American attention for the present time with the French girl at the peak of her game.

Another American player who is now being heralded by Walter Hines, Gene Strossen, James Brown and Joe Hanchison, make their mark as the boys who will have a battle royal among the Americans for the British open cup.

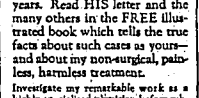

Any contracts generally similar to this contract, according to the resale value of the products delivered by said producers, after deducting therefrom the costs of maintaining the Association, and of transporting, handling, storing, selling, and marketing such products, of unexpended, handling, testing, storing, selling and marketing such products, and expenses not to exceed a sum deducted from any one member greater than 2 cents per pound for the products delivered by such member.

Any deduction or allowance or loss of any kind or description, in any way, shall be the responsibility of the producer, and shall not be a liability of the Association, nor shall it be a liability of the producer, quality or standard or condition at

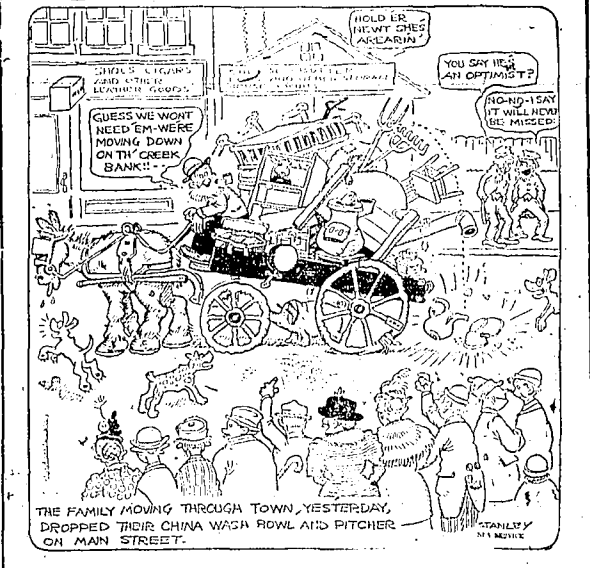

HODGINS TICKET FAVOR SUNDAY OBSERVANCE

Many Twin Falls Women Hear Hodgins Ticket Express Their Stand on Oligic Questions in This Campaign; Hodgins States He Believes in Enforcement of All the Laws and Has Always Favored Sunday Closing; Record as Peace Officer Praised by Woman.

About forty women of Twin Falls gathered last evening at the call of Mrs. Durton E. Morse for a discussion of the issues in the campaign at the office of Hodgins, Stephen A. North. They listened to a statement by the candidate of the Hodgins ticket relative to certain propositions which are being circulated in the city. Mrs. Morse made a few preliminary remarks on the campaign and said that whatever you believe in in this campaign do not sling mud or talk about the other candidates in a derogatory fashion.

Mrs. Morse then called on Mr. Hodgins to answer some questions which had been brought against him. A few of these were, first, that you add Hodgins is a Catholic, second, that you are for an "open town" and third that you are not a taxpayer.

sists of about 8,000 acres and was known as the Roseworth tract. Additional acreage may be added when the company furnishes proof that the work has been done to the satisfaction of the reclamation department and that the additional water needed has been secured. The land is pronounced unusually good for small farms by the state department. The tract, located within 20 miles and almost wholly publicly as the destination of the Reclamation service, which came there about a year and a half ago.
