FIRPO MAY GET JESS' BOOT WITH JOHNSON

South American Giant May Be Substituted for Jess Willard on 'Big Charity Show in Gotham' for May 12; Firpo to Get \$15,000; Boxing Commission Refuses to Allow Farmer Lodge to Go.

NEW YORK, March 28.—Luis Angel Firpo, the South American giant, may take Jess Willard's place and fight Johnson in the big charity show here on May 12 according to word going around today.
Although Willard has been reported as training actively and doing well at Excelsior Springs, it was intimated from sources close to Firpo that the South American giant has been asked to be ready to take the place of the fighter in the event that some hitch arises to break up the card.
Johnson broke all sporting records getting out of a fight with Tom Gibbons, and, although imprudently, it is possible that he might be working a hole to get away from Willard.

Firpo signed a contract right after the breathing fight after which he agreed to appear on the card against an unselected opponent and also to go in as a part of the main bout. If one of the principals failed to go through with the agreement.

The South American was all set to take on a couple of exhibition bouts and do a little "stage work" when Tex Rickard notified him that he should do nothing that might prevent him from acting as a pinch-hitter on cards. As Luis Angel is a "sweet" character, he paid heed to the words of Rickard.

After the promoters of the show had looked all over the country for an ideal set-up, he had decided upon Farmer Lodge, the huge Minnesota "lawbreaker" for the fight. The commission came along and ruled the plans by refusing to permit Luis to battle with the farmer.

William Muldon, chairman of the commission claims to be in possession of information that Farmer Lodge whipped the ears off the farmer in New Orleans March 16 and floored him in the first round upon intimated that Lodge became known as the "lawbreaker" by fracturing his jaw bones on the floor.
Firpo is now without an opponent for the scheduled bout, but the promoters will not be bothered if it is true that Willard has signed the terrible job of retiring in three and wants to call it off.

ARMY OFFICER IS TRIED FOR DEATH OF FRITZL MANN

SAN DIEGO, Cal., March 28.—Striking its first blow at the defense's suicide theory of the death of Fritz Mann, dancer, the state today began its case against Dr. Louis L. Jacobs, accused by the grand jury of the murder of the petite dancing girl.

The finding of the girl's watered belongings, including some of her clothes, her vanity case and other personal effects, was doubted by the witnesses who saw the body on the beach.
After two days of cross-examination, the jury, including two alternate jurors to serve in case some one of the regular jurors become ill or otherwise disqualified, was adjourned a few minutes before 2 o'clock yesterday.

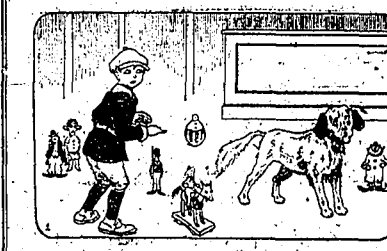

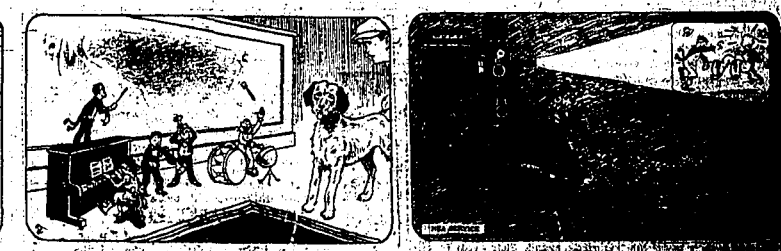

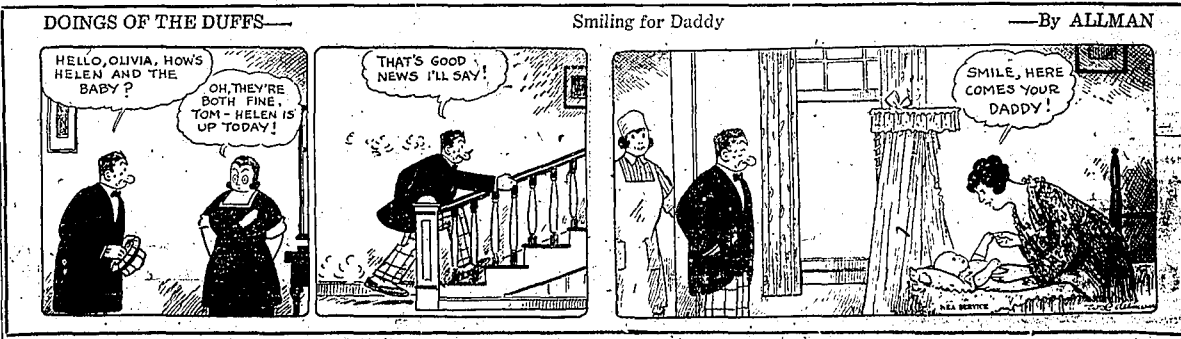
