

SWINDLERS TO BE FORCED TO OUT BY U. S.

Department of Justice is Starting a Nation-Wide Campaign Against All Stock Gamblers and Swindlers; Oil Stocks Have Been singled Out for Special Investigation.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 29.—The department of justice today began a nation-wide campaign against oil stock promoters and other get-rich-quick artists, who have robbed the public of hundreds of millions annually in the past year.

With reports reaching the department that thousands of people have lost their savings banks, oil mines and other stock promotion schemes, the first blow of the federal government will be struck in the heart of the oil country—the center of the swindlers' activities.

John W. Crim, assistant attorney general, has been assigned to the task of prosecuting the swindlers and get-rich-quick artists and is now in Fort Worth, Texas, collecting evidence as the first step of the campaign.

Crim's purpose, Acting Attorney General Sherman said today, is to obtain evidence that will be used in the alleged swindling ring by investigating leaders to jail. Later, indictments will be made against them.

The people of the United States, Sherman said, "have been deceived to the extent of \$100,000,000 a year by swindlers who have used the law to protect their ill-gotten gains."

Port Worth is described by department of justice officials as the center of small time swindling operations that yield millions of pieces of literature promoting quick riches for small investments.

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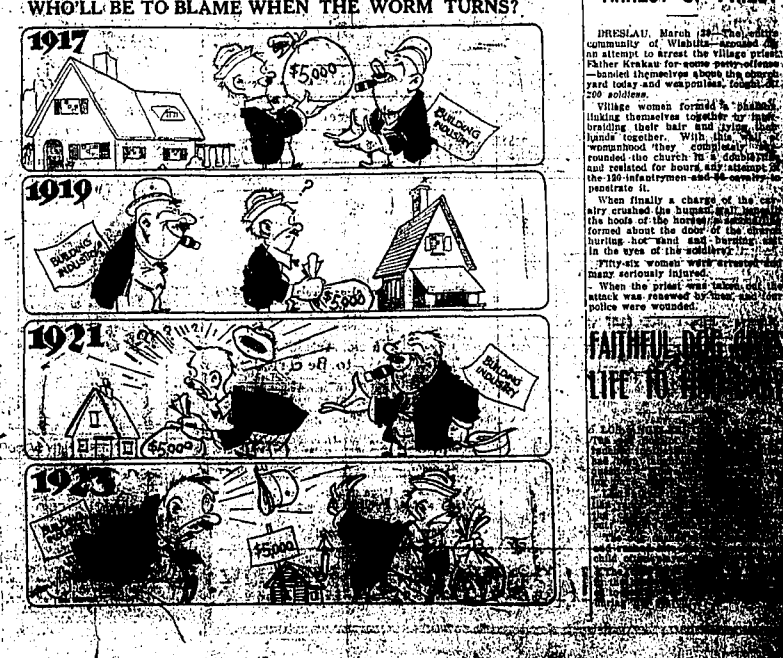

RESTRAINT OF DELIVERY OF WATER ISSUE

Olivia Demands That Pro Rata of Contents of Salmon Reservoir Be Made Regardless of Whether Settlers Used Full Quota Last Year or Not.

Another Salmon suit involving the ownership of part of the water stored in the reservoir was started today by Attorney John W. Graham, for M. Olivia and in behalf of others similarly situated. Olivia says that the court retain the company from delivering what is called stored water to those claiming ownership of the same.

The issue involved in one of last year's suits was a considerable surplus of water in the reservoir and a number of settlers did not use their full allotment. An amendment was made in the by-laws providing those who had failed to use the water to which they were entitled to store the same in the reservoir and draw it out as they wanted in the year. This year there is a relative shortage of water, compared with last year, and possibility of an almost slight acreage in the season is said to mean, Mr. Olivia claims that the water which he failed to use last year while permissibly the company to store water under the circumstances existing on the Salmon tract and that all settlers are entitled to a pro rata share of the water as it is stored in the reservoir. Whether they used all they were allowed last year or not, and he asks that the court be directed to order to be heard before Judge T. Hally Lee.

There was nothing to it, a report, but caused so much uneasiness and resulted in so many inquiries that the board has found it wise to officially deny the rumor.

DAIRYMEN DISCUSS ASSOCIATION AND MARKETING PLANS

The Twin Falls Dairymen's association met in Judge Duval's court room Tuesday evening to discuss the plan of incorporating into an organization. The association would incorporate with the idea of marketing interest as an association. It would be a co-operative marketing association and later the market would be taken into the manufacturing business.

It was stated at this meeting that the plan had brought from the north side more than 100,000 pounds of milk. It was also stated that there are eight cream buying stations here and this business could be handled more economically by one large association. It was also argued that the production to the amount of 100,000 pounds of milk would be worth \$100,000. A "claudin" acted as chairman and on several occasions he discussed the advantages of this association. It is a "claudin" and he argued in favor of the organization and said of his experience as a dairyman. Maurice Owen spoke of the necessity of being careful about the quality of dairy cows and also careful in what the dairy man does or it would be a failure. He stated that only about one man in ten would make a success of the dairymen's business. W. J. Hagarty spoke of the importance of the dairy business as conducted by those who are already engaged in the work. He stated that they had made remarkable success. 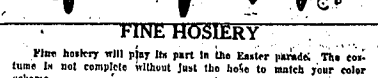
