**EXECUTIVES' CONFERENCE**

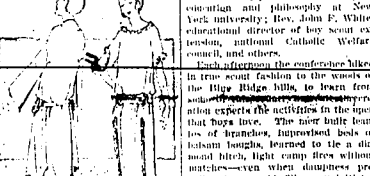

### TO HAVE FRUIT IN THE HOME GARDEN

Bearing Trees, Bushes and Vines May Be Had Within a Very Short Time.

Plant in the home garden is taken as a matter of course by many people. It is not until they have it and it does not they have it.

By far, especially the smaller kinds, where the family orchard, usually set by the pioneers of the vicinity, is not considered. The fruit garden is the one who usually supplies the vine and bushes.

Within a couple of years it is a very easy matter, with proper care, to have a very good bearing strawberry patch, a good blackberry, raspberry, gooseberry and currant patch and grapes in three or four years.

Two or three hundred everbearing strawberry plants should, under normal conditions, supply berries for the family throughout the season—until frost. A couple of dozen of the larger berry bushes will produce well after the second year; the same with currants and gooseberries.

There is no question as to the value of freshly picked berries as there is in favor of fresh vegetable taken from the ground just before they are to be used.

Berry crops, of course, cannot be stored for without some labor; for the berries must be picked, fertilized, kept free from weeds, and the dead wood must be removed every season.

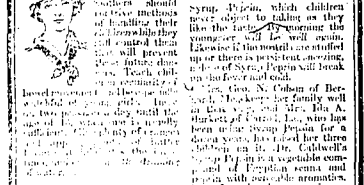

Those who make clothes have not pursued the line of least resistance. Close study of their modes shows that under apparent simplicity lies clever complication of cut.

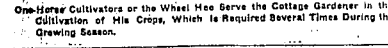
Strait Skirt Swallows Hips.

## HAVE LONG ROWS IN YOUR GARDEN

### Plan Will Not Only Save Labor but Will Prevent Injury to Tender Plants.

Arrange the garden in long rows and narrow alleys, the report which has been issued by the United States Department of Agriculture. These cultivation can be practiced where the rows are as narrow as 24 inches, but as a rule it does not pay to have the rows closer than 20 or 22 inches.

One good arrangement is to have the crops grown in three-foot rows except the major portion of the garden with a narrow alley along each side. In small beds or narrow rows in which all the smaller crops can be grown, the farmer may want to have the rows as narrow as 18 inches.

One of the best ways of having a good garden is to have the practice of cultivating with a hoe every Saturday afternoon. The soil is kept loose and free from weeds. It takes only about one hour to go over the garden with a hoe every Saturday. A little hand hoeing is able to keep the garden in perfect condition. While it may not always be convenient to cultivate the garden at a specific time, as does the farmer, yet these few short periods in farm work which the garden can be cultivated.

## PLUCKING SPINACH LEAVES

### Heart of the Plant Should Be Left to Produce More Tender Sprouts.

The fourth pound of seed will be sufficient to plant a bed five to seven feet in width and 30 feet in length which provides an abundance for the average family.
