## LIME SUPPLY FOR CHICKENS

Experiments Have Demonstrated That Other Minerals Will Not Take Its Place.

Feeding experiments with poultry conducted over a number of years in which an effort was made to substitute other mineral elements for lime in the ration are said to have demonstrated that other minerals will not take its place. It is found that lime is lacking in the food the elements of the body will be lost by drawing on the lime stored up in the bones and muscles of the fowl. It was also found that both lime and phosphorus are more easily taken from the bones of living animals than from dead bones said to be the animal.

## CURE FEATHER EATING HABIT

Indication That Fowls Are After Certain Classes of Foods They Are Not Getting.

The reason that fowls eat feathers is due to the fact that they are after certain classes of foods which they need but are not getting. This class of food is represented by any form of fat, tannin, most cereals, cotton seed meal, peanut meal, or alfalfa meal. If one or more of the above feeds are furnished them in sufficient quantities they will get over this habit.

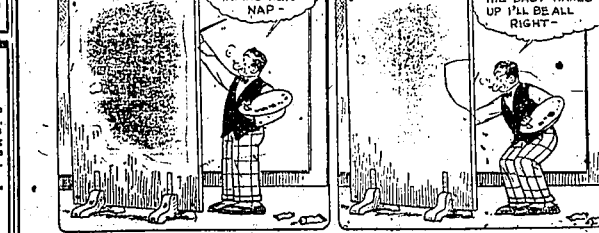

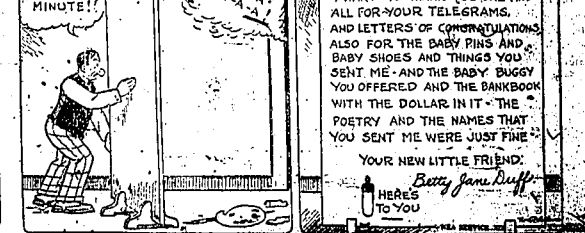

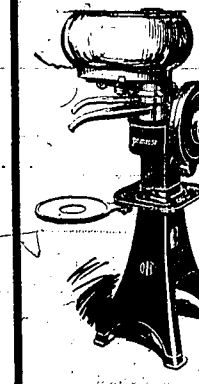

## COURT RULES ON WATER DELIVERY RICE ACTION

Supreme Tribunal Says That If Consistent with State Policy, Water to Irrigate Lower Land It Will Not be Compelled to Try.

The supreme court in the case of G. W. Rice against the Twin Falls Canal company, held that under the constitution a decision by Judge James H. Burdwell today held that the defendant had a valid defense in its claim that the canal company could not be held liable for its failure to deliver water in question unless it had enough to deliver. This was held to be a question of fact.

Rice, who was represented by the state and the attorney general's office, claimed that under the constitution the company could be compelled to deliver water to his land before an order of elevation. The company contended that this was not implied, as it would require pumping of a long pipe to deliver the water. It also contended that there is not enough water in the proposition to irrigate the lower land, and that, therefore, the rice cultivation was not applicable to the situation. Judge Jackson in effect ruled for Rice. His ruling was modified by the supreme court in its decision.

From the record it appears that Rice purchased some water land within the jurisdiction of a Carey act project after all the water rights for the land in the project had been sold and applied for water for his land. It was told that there was no water available without receiving a permit delivered to the land holder. The state held that Rice had a valid claim in accordance with the contract between the state and the Carey act company. The lower court also held that the state and granted the writ of mandate compelling the water company to deliver water to Rice's land. On appeal, however, the supreme court held that where a Carey act company provides that in no case will water rights or any excess of the appropriated water, neither the construction company nor the operating company can be required to sell additional water, the carrying capacity of the system or the appropriation has been sold to the user.

The decision was written by Associate Justice William L. Rice and concurred in by the other members of the court.
