WASHINGTON, D. C. April 7.—When President Harding makes his rounds of the country next June to meet the people and explain to them the policies which he will follow in the administration of his office, the progressives and radicals in his own political household will be glad to help. The president will find himself compelled to share the stage with Senator Borah, Senator Johnson, Senator La Follette, Senator Brookhart, and even Senator Norris, the conservative and irreconcilable.

Of all this group Senator Borah is most likely to cause Mr. Harding the greatest embarrassment. It is well known to Senator Borah's friends and enemies alike that he would like to see him across the continent in the first of his tours. This trip Senator Borah had two important subjects for his address. One is the need for an international economic conference called by the United States, and American recognition of the Russian soviet government. Now he has three, one of representation of the American people before the court of international justice—having recently been elected by Mr. Harding.

With Senator Borah talking to the same audiences that the president addresses—and either before or after the latter has spoken—these three subjects are bound to be prominent in his mind. 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BORAH AND BOLSHEVISM

(By JAMES D. WHELAN.)

The persistency with which Senator Borah insists on the recognition of Russia has aroused a great deal of interest and a great deal of discussion. The more rabid of his critics, like the Atlanta Georgian Sunlight, intimate that he is bought by the gold of the bolsheviks. On the other hand, a large number of people, many of them honest progressives, think that the opposition to Russian recognition is simply a device of the trusts to prevent the success of a government, often erring indeed, but forward-looking as a whole. These last hold that only the big interests stand in the way and fail to sympathize not merely with the Russian people but with the soviet government and its leaders in their purposes, if not in their methods.

Both of these views are wrong. Borah is not bought by any sort of gold. When he flirts with monopoly ambition not avertice is the cause. When he fights with the radicals, he is not doing so to get any financial take-off in cold cash, but insofar as he is disingenuous, he desires their votes not their shooks. He may be honest in his present purposes; anyway he is not bought for anybody's gold.

Nor is the opposition to the recognition of the bolshevik confined to the big interests or their deluded followers. Sumner Compton, for whose general labor policies, with some reservations, I have the highest respect, and whose ability and honesty I do not question, is a bitter foe of the Lenin-Trotsky regime and opposes its recognition.

The ablest critics of the leaders of Russian control and of the tyranny which they have established are socialists. When they broke out the greatest intellects in the American socialist party stood firm in behalf of the American government. When defeated in the convention they withdrew, indignation, yet their party and stood by their country. With only one or two exceptions, these patriotic socialists are today opposed to Lenin and all his works and their exposure of the methods of the man are illuminating and enlightening.

The most profound works in opposition to the Russian regime are those of Charles Edward Russell and John Spargo. Spargo sweeps aside as false, and quotes the names and genealogies of the bolshevik leaders, to show the falsity of the claim that the so-called Jewish conspiracy to rule the world is the cause of the trouble. But a small percentage of the leaders are Jews. Lenin is not. That Spargo also shows, that nevertheless, it is as nefarious a government as could be imagined.

That opposition to socialism itself considered, or desire to restore monarchy, is not the cause of intentional opposition, the following from "Bolshevism and the United States" by Charles Edward Russell, is in point:

"The government of the Bolsheviki had in this manner (by violent action of a minority of the people of one city) overthrown what a socialist government, Kerensky was an adult socialist of many years adherence to the faith; so were nearly all his colleagues. The principles upon which their government was promulgated were essentially socialist principles, the program they had adopted was a socialist program. The flag they flew was a socialist flag. The party to which most of them belonged was an old-time socialist party."

This government had been recognized by the United States. Even after the bolsheviki had become enthroned, when the constituent assembly met, freshly elected from the people, the bolsheviki had but one-sixth of the total membership. When it refused to adopt a bolshevik policy, Lenin sent in the red guard and drove out its members. Since that time Russia has been a despotism. The principles by consent of the governed, liberty, equality and fraternity, have been abolished in spite of the frequent pledges made by Lenin and his followers before they came into power. These are not my statements; they are socialist statements. Perhaps Borah's theory that plutocrats should not be observed after election may have had something to do with their attractiveness for him.

Russell puts his finger on the real cause. It is the principle adopted by Lenin. Anything which brings about a SOCIALIST IDEA is legitimate. However, pledges and treaties, hardly enough observed under all circumstances, are utterly disregarded as "scraps of paper." But that reason, modern governments would do well to be sure that some government, whether socialist, union labor, progressive or reactionary, is in power that can be depended on at least ordinarily, to keep its word. Sooner or later Russia will have such government. When it does, the form of internal administration is immaterial to the outside; so long as it works it should be recognized. Economically speaking, all sorts of socialism are substantially the same in theory. Personally, the writer thinks that they are all wrong. But there is a difference between the practice of men like Russell, Spargo, Benson, Simons and others who seek to keep their pledges, who defend their country when in just war and who conduct their campaigns in constitutional ways, and the bolsheviki who makes pledges to break them at will and disregard all law. Just as much as there is between the American Federation of Labor, which makes agreements to keep them and the I. W. W., which avowedly makes them to break them and the breaking does not harm to their employers.

Let Borah be sure the Muncieville leopard has changed his spots before talking him to his bosom.

GRAIN CLOSED YESTERDAY ON CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE. CHICAGO, April 7.-All grain closed higher in Chicago today. Continued reports of crop damage strengthened the market. The trade showed an inclination to await the government report to be issued tonight. Heavy quotations in the northwest continued with about a load of snow reported over the entire region. There was considerable apprehension on the part of exporters over the export situation. The market was expected to show more concern regarding their future supply. Reports from the Argentine indicated farmers were holding grain. Corn was strengthened due to light receipts and reports of delayed farm work, the result of unseasonable winds. Wheat was held by heavy buying and sales to the northwest reached new high quotations on the spot. Number 2, common, sold at 80 cents for the first time in several years. Heavy export inquiries also were in evidence. -Delayed farm work and rates to transshipment houses with eastern connections strengthened early. Crop reports continued unfavorable.

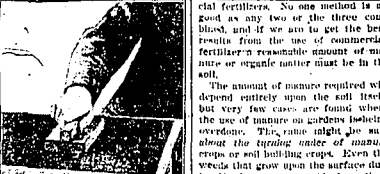

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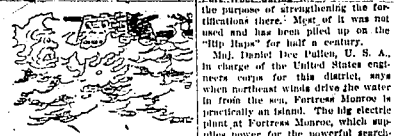

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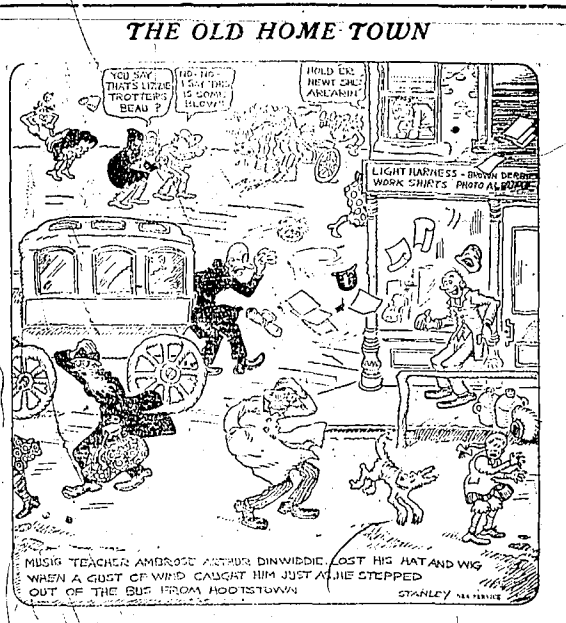
