BOND INTEREST FUNDED IN THE PRINCIPAL SUM

Five Years Will Elapse Before Collections Will Be Due on First Annual Payment on the Principal.

POCAHONTAS, April 12.—A feature of the proposed bond issue for the American Falls district that appeals strongly to property owners is the fact that the bond interest will be paid out of the principal for a period of five years. In other words, sufficient additional bonds above the necessities will be authorized, if the bond election on May 12 shall carry, to cover the interest for that period so that the farmers will not have to pay any money at all until after the American Falls reservoir has been completed and they have received the direct benefits therefrom.

By deferring all interest payments for five years it will be necessary to authorize more bonds than would be the case had the payments to meet interest and sinking fund begun at once, and the accounts in the report for the fact that the total amount of bonds to be voted May 12 is larger than had been originally contemplated.

While the farmers of the Snake River valley have been in no worse condition than those of other sections in common with agricultural sections everywhere they have been getting through a period of depression and deflation, and we feel that relief from any interest or other payments on the bonds will be given ample opportunity for them to catch up and be in a much better position to handle their situation than they are at present. Moreover, they will have received direct relief from the construction of the reservoir before they will be called upon to meet any payments, and will therefore be in much better position to meet the situation.

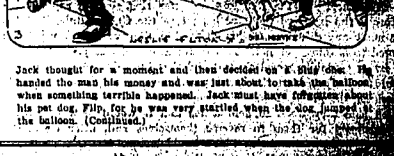

THE WORLD DEMANDING AMERICAN RAISINS

They go to over 75 Countries and the demand is rapidly increasing.

The American raisin is making a new record in its invasion of the world's markets. The total exports in the fiscal year 1922, which ends 30 days hence, will exceed 10,000,000 pounds against 5,000,000 in the fiscal year of 1921, and 75,000,000 in 1916. The value of the year's exports will approximate \$15,000,000 and will also exceed that of any earlier year.

This high record in the quantity and value of our raisin exports, says the Trade Record of The National City Bank of New York, is especially interesting in view of the fact that the other markets of the world, the Levant, has recently resumed its exporting to the world market. Prior to the war, the area fronting on the eastern end of the Mediterranean was a large contributor to the world market, especially to the United States. The production in agricultural activities in that area during the war, production was greatly diminished, and raisins from the United States were largely imported by Europe and in some cases supplied to their troops in the field, and the world thus

came to know the value of the American raisin.

The growth in world popularity of our raisins is evidenced by the fact that the exports advanced from 16,000,000 pounds in 1913 to 50,000,000 in 1918, the closing year of the war, and 10,000,000 in 1919. With the return of the Levant to raisin production and exportation, however, our exports fell to 5,000,000 in 1920 and 3,100,000 in 1921. In our short crop year 1922, with the high record of production of 1922, however, which is materially in excess of any earlier year, our exports for the current fiscal year seem likely to equal the high record of 10,000,000 pounds in the calendar year 1919, in which the Levant had not yet re-commenced its exports to the world market.

The raisin is a comparatively new factor in our export trade. It was only in 1908 that the quantity exported was of sufficient importance to obtain a place in the export statistics of the government, and the total exports of that year amounted to only 3,000,000 pounds, advancing to \$2 million in 1918, \$5,000,000 in 1919, and 10,000,000 in 1922.

It is due, however, to the growth in home demand that the raisin industry of California our chief

raisin producer, has so rapidly developed. The total production of raisins in California was in 1912 12,000,000 pounds, in 1919 50,000,000, and in 1922 50,000,000, and we are now producing more than one and one-half times as much as in 1912. About four-fifths of this big production is consumed in the United States. Of the 200,000,000 pounds produced in the past decade, 17-9 was exported and the remaining 180 was consumed at home. Even this big consumption from our own fields does not fully cover the requirements of our people.

Great Britain is the largest single buyer of American raisins, our total exports to that country in 1922 having been 44,000,000 pounds, against only 5,000,000 in 1921. Canada ranks next to Great Britain in the list of American raisin buyers. In 1922 her total for that year being 21,000,000 pounds. Japan has suddenly developed a taste for American raisins, and that country, in 1922 totaling something over 10,000,000 pounds as against 5,000,000 in the preceding year. All the world seems to have developed a taste for American raisins, the number of countries to which they were shipped in 1921, the latest year for which details are available, was 75, and represented every grand division of the world.

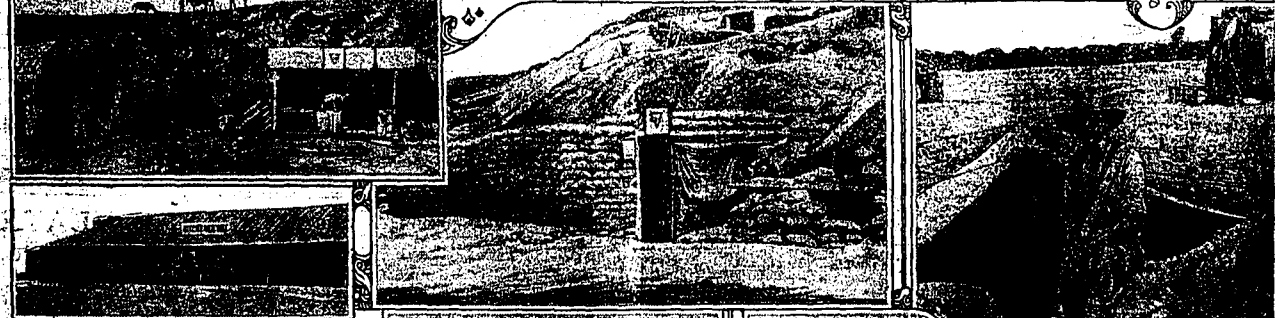
Tennis Balls Carried by Spring.

wherever the glancing war machine carried the soldiers of the Allies, there appeared a group of men accompanied by them. These were all British burdens but they were lightened by American help.

When the territorial troops began to flood the Egyptian there was a single American. William Jennings Bryan went to Gallipoli and established a center on the island of Imbros, where cakes and coffee were made and sent to the mainland. The American Y. M. C. A. entered Jerusalem with General Allenby, where it was called upon by the military
