CONCERN ON LAST NIGHT PROVES TO BE MUSICAL TREAT

Large Crowd Gathers Organist of Salt Lake City Talented and Accomplished Musician and Enjoy His Program.

W. Edgerston, of Pocatello, in his eloquent speech before the Jefferson club in Paris hall last evening.
