Farmer Must Organize and Market His Crops

Bernard M. Baruch Makes Above Statement and Urges Proper Relations Agreement Between Germany and France; Labor and All Other Industries Are Organized and Thus the Farmer Must Organize and Sell His Products on a Co-operative Basis or He is Left.

NEW YORK, April 15.—These are the two big things that must be done to insure a continuation of prosperity in America...

The farmer must organize commercially to market his goods co-operatively on a big business scale in order that he will have a fairer relationship established between what he produces and sells and what he buys.

Industry, labor, and business are organized to help themselves. The farmer remains outside.

Baruch thus amplified his statement that a real danger now lying ahead is German domination of the world trade in case war reparations are fixed at too low a figure.

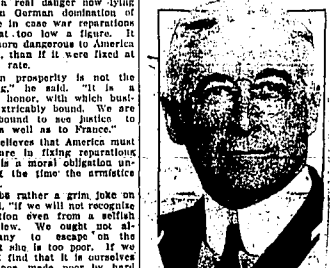

Noted Health Experts Join In A National Crusade To Make A Life Safe For Mothers and Children



DR. THOMAS D. WOOD

As officers of the American Child Health Association, Courtney Dinwiddie and Dr. Thomas D. Wood are associated with Herbert Hoover, president in a great undertaking, the slogan of which is "A Safe Mother and Child." Mr. Dinwiddie is the general executive of the Association and Dr. Wood one of the three vice-presidents. Both the officials are splendidly equipped for the tasks they have undertaken. Mr. Dinwiddie was graduated from 1904 to 1907, Medicine and all allied hospitals of New York, whence he went to Duluth, where for three years he has been in developing social service and health bodies. He was also superintendent of Public Welfare there and was responsible for its celebrated hospital. From Duluth, Mr. Dinwiddie came to Cincinnati. At first he was superintendent of the Anti-Tubercular League, but later fathered the Public Health Federation. He was also associated with a health experiment in the Indiana-Brigition district, which established new standards and methods for the protection of the health of babies and younger children especially. As executive secretary of the National Child Health Council, a group of the big organizations formed in 1920, he was prominently identified with the movement which led to the recent enactment of legislation which brought about the American Child Health Association. Mr. Wood long has been recognized as an authority on child health and has devoted much of his time to this work. He is college physician and professor of hygiene at the University of the American Medical Association and the National Education Association he has been especially active in developing standards for the health of school children. The American Child Health Association has taken the "Children's Bill of Rights," drawn up by Mr. Hoover, as a declaration of its purpose. WORLD COURT IS GOOD IDEA SAYS FRANKLIN SQUIRES

Hill Man Favors Peaceful Settlement After Trip Abroad; Says Surplus of Americans Will Eventually Confront World Trade Competition Back Home.

"This tract is coming back to Hill property" was the statement today of Franklin Squires of Utah, who was one of the earliest settlers in this county, who made a great success of farming; who has recently returned from a trip through Mexico and who discusses in an interesting way conditions there and in the old world. Mr. Squires last year visited southern Europe, the near east and northern Africa.

"It will take a couple of years to get back where we were in Twin Falls county but we are going to get back," he said. "I have been here from the beginning of its development and am confident of this."

Asked regarding Mexico and the eastern hemisphere he said: "I think that the administration of President Obregon in Mexico has been a success. It is unfortunate that the constitution prohibits a second term for the president there, as it would be difficult to find a successor who his term expires. I do not think he will try to set aside the constitution as Diaz did. The days of the dictators are over. We must gradually overtake Mexico with immigrants but there will be no invasion of the country. The western coast of Mexico will exceed California in its production. It is a wonderful country."

"So far as the places visited in Europe were concerned there seemed to be great unrest. We went through Portugal, Spain, Italy and Turkey. Then through Asia Minor to Damascus, then to Egypt and north Africa. I interviewed everyone I met and it is surprising how much people there know of America. Even ignorant Arab guides know about us and hope for us to settle their troubles as a big brother. They say we have all the gold and can do it. One thing that is needed is European federation."

Europe can get along without tariffs as well as our states can. They would not have to give up their own arrangements in a federation of nations. I should like to see free trade with Canada. I do not look with much favor on the League of Nations, though it has some good things in it if it would work, which I fear it would not. Perhaps I am somewhat prejudiced against the League on account of a dislike for Wilson. However, I believe that we should take a larger part in adjusting the affairs of the world. I am heartily in favor of the world court. We have come to have a lot of respect for our supreme court, though we sometimes do not like its decisions. I believe a world court to settle international difficulties is entirely right.

"Europe would be glad to have us with them in this. It was a surprise to me to find so many abroad reading American periodicals. They read our papers and magazines in England a great deal more than we read their."

(BY HENRY L. FAIRHILL.) NEW YORK, April 16.—With the old circus prospects of being bigger and better than ever, baseball goes under way tomorrow for another stretch down to the series in October.

All of the club owners and the league officials expect a big season, and probably they will not be disappointed. Improvements have been made at many of the parks, and the new Yankee stadium here will make it possible to accommodate more fans than ever attended games in the past.

Prospects for a battle-riven season will be in the hands of the new managers. John G. Heydler, president of the National League, picks the Giants and the White Sox to lead in the big fight with the Cubs and the Cubs as dark horses. BONAR LAW GIVES PARLIAMENT BUDGET

LONDON, April 16.—Lower taxation was proposed in the course of comments today by Stanley Baldwin, chancellor of the exchequer, in submitting the new government budget. Baldwin proposed: 1.—Reduction of fifty per cent in the corporation profits tax after June 30. 2.—Six per cent reduction in the income tax. 3.—Reduction of the beer tax, a penny a pint.

LONDON, April 16.—The Bonar Law ministry presented its budget—which may make or break the government—to parliament today. As the momentous monetary problem was placed before the legislators rumors reported that the resignation of the Bonar Law cabinet was at hand. This was officially denied at 10 Downing street.

The fate of the English pocketbook lies in the budget. It has been announced that tax reductions will be submitted, and the nation is awaiting the outcome with breathless expectancy.

It is generally forecast that the reductions will include a slice of six pence from the luxury levy, a penny per pint off beer and a halving of the duties on tobacco. It has been announced that the Chancellor of the Exchequer Baldwin already has arranged with the Treasury for a reduction in the price of beer effective tomorrow. This is expected to be the occasion of a nationwide jubilee in all public drinking places.

While the budget session is hanging fire the government is having a hard time killing the widespread fear of military rearmament. The strategy, but today rejected the minor. TWIN FALLS BANK REPORTS

The bank statements, for the three Twin Falls banks, the last of which was published Saturday fully sustain the conclusions drawn, the comparison of the debts of the past three months as contrasted with the clearing for a similar three months of last year, in showing a wonderful increase in the prosperity of the people of this section.

Last year on April 3, the deposits were but \$2,142,545.49, while this year, they were \$2,341,210.12. Available cash showed a large increase. There has been a decrease of over \$100,000 in borrowed money, the amount being less than half of that of last year, when the total was \$772,195.78, while this year it is but \$364,429.50. Loans and discounts of the three banks showed a decrease of \$817,268.17, falling from \$2,493,636.95 to \$2,115,770.58.

Similar satisfactory showing is, relatively speaking, manifest in the surrounding towns of the country. The Burley and Rupert situations are also improving.

All this means that necessary liquidation is taking place, that there is money coming into the country and is being deposited. There is a more hopeful feeling on every hand.

When work begins on the American Falls dam there will be an influx of people with money, from the east, especially when the advertising plans of the Twin Falls Realty board and the various railroad systems begin to bear fruit, and the railroad to the south will immediately follow, if it does not precede these things.

IDAHO'S POPULATION

What Idaho needs is more, people, a fact that some Idahoans apparently do not appreciate. More people means greater consumption of home products and less dependency on far away markets, more home industries, more independence and less dependency upon others. This state has the resources. It has the lands; the hydroelectric power, the soil, the minerals, the timber—in fact, it has everything within itself and if forced to be independent "until itself" would survive.

But to take advantage of these many resources, to bring out lands into their own in the point of production so that every one of the fertile acres would count, to realize fully on our wealth in timber, to enjoy the great benefits of our vast water power resources, to mine the vast storehouse of mineral as yet untouched, we must have more people, who while they are producing are also consuming.

The quicker the state of Idaho opens its eyes to the importance of attracting those people to this state and taking care of them after they arrive, the quicker it will expand and develop. Idaho can never come into its own as a state by looking itself up and refusing to tilt the balance of the world about the vast storehouse it has within. But that is the policy the state seems to have adopted. It has closed its department of immigration and statistics. It has no recognized official avenue of publicity. It has no funds with which to promote its salesmanship. It is standing still in the matter of selling itself to others while its sister states are crying their wares. And just as long as that kind of a policy predominates, just so long will Idaho continue as a small state in population.

It is not a significant thing to this state that the great transcontinental carriers are today carrying out an advertising program for the northwest that is costing them millions of dollars? Why are they doing this? To get them more business of course. They believe that business will pass over their lines. Other states are spending thousands of dollars in advertising. Why? To attract more people, that their population may increase and the newcomer will help in developing their resources.

The census bureau statisticians of the United States have just issued the estimated population for states for July 1, 1923. A gain of almost a million and a half for the United States is shown annually which would raise the population of this nation by 1,930 up to 119,861,710. In these estimates Idaho is shown to have increased from 431,856 in 1920, when the last census was taken to 470,179 the estimated population this state will have by July 1 of the present year, or a gain of 38,323 in three years.

That is not a bad start. But it is not enough. Other states have gained by the hundreds of thousands where Idaho has gained but by the thousands. This state can support many times the population we now have. We have every advantage to attract people to Idaho. And our policy should be one of systematic and ever-persistent advertising of our resources and our advantages that we may bring within our boundaries more people, whose presence here, will assist in the solution of many of our own problems.—Capital News.

MANY DEPUTIES TO BE DROPPED BY THE WARDEN

Head of the Fish and Game Department Announces Reduction in Force But Promises to Keep Up Its Efficiency to Last Year Level.

The fish and game department of Idaho will make considerable cuts in the number of deputies, according to a statement made Saturday night by E. Thomas after a consultation with Governor C. C. Moore. It is said that 25 will be expected to do the work previously performed by 45.

Whether the number of men employed during the fiscal administration will be less than that of last year is not left undetermined in the final paragraph of the report, which was read at the department meeting Saturday night. The report of the fish and game department for the years 1921 and 1922 shows a total of \$1,444,672.91 was expended for salaries in fish supervision and approximately \$400,000 was spent for expenses of the field force. The records of the game department indicate that in the years 1921 and 1922, \$1,500,000 of the revenue received during those years was expended in approximately \$1,000,000 in additional equipment and \$250,000 for supplies which latter was expended for the purchase of game birds, fish eggs and other supplies. We believe that a more equitable administration of the affairs of this department will permit us to expend for pay but permanent employees approximately \$500,000 during the coming biennium with similar results in the amounts for birds, fish and other game.

During the biennium just ended an average of 45 field men were employed. These of course did not include hatchery superintendents and assistant superintendents and their assistants connected with the operation of the four fish hatcheries.

"In no sense would I be understood that active supervision is going to be discontinued. With the organization of various game clubs and the better organization and the co-operation of the farmers and public in general with the department we should be able to carry on this work with a considerable reduction in the active force.

"The game department is not on an appropriation basis, no money being appropriated by the legislature for its expenses, but our work is done with money derived from the sale of licenses should be expended as carefully as possible. In 1921 and 1922 we were a direct tax on the people of Idaho, agreeing perhaps that in bringing the state to complete the present standard a large force was required and it was necessary to experiment more or less with the force. But I may have the feeling that we had something of a tangible nature to account for the very large force. It is my hope and aim of the department for the coming biennium that D. P. Rich will retain his position as chief deputy until June 1."

BURLEY INTERESTED IN MEETING TWIN FALLS ON GRADING

That Burley is interested in the proposition of the Twin Falls and Burley highway districts to grade to the Cassia county line is indicated by the following from the Burley Bulletin:

Last year the Burley Highway district made arrangements with the state to complete the unfinished portion of the state highway, and the state entered into contract with the district to do the work and get aside \$27,000 state money for the purpose. The Burley Highway commissioners had made arrangements to be paid with their part of the cost which would have amounted to \$14,000, according to estimates of the cost. The work was to have started last year, but the Twin Falls highway board did not complete their arrangements for their part of the road, and the work was not started.

In making their budget for this year the commissioners of the Burley district did not make any provision for running the district and about \$20,000 for maintenance of roads already built, but nothing for new roads.

The proposition as now proposed by the Twin Falls board, has not yet been taken up with the Burley board, and what action they take in the matter remains to be seen.

The Burley highway district has only a fraction over eight miles to build from the end of the present completed highway to the Twin Falls county line. The estimated cost of this eight miles is \$18,000. We're interested at the highway office that the \$27,000 state money is still available for the project.

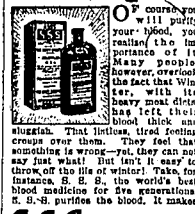

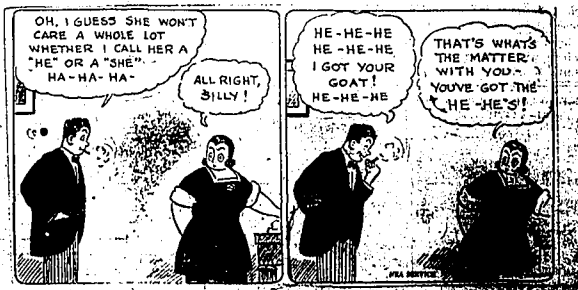

In response to a telegram sent by President Gray Friday evening setting forth the progress made by the Chamber of Commerce in securing the contract for the construction of the railroad, which the Chamber of Commerce holds with the Oregon Short Line, President Gray sent the answer, that appears above.

The activity of the union Saturday afternoon was the cause for general gratification among those who have been active in main line affairs and it is taken as additional evidence that just as much as they are fully equipped with the terms of the contract, actual railroad construction work will start. This, however, cannot be done if it is pointed out until the money authorized to the railroad fund is all paid in.
