## Queer Breads Eaten in Foreign Lands

**T**HE moving picture has familiarized us with the queer dress and some of the customs of the peoples of nearly thousands of miles away.

A few of these we call our attention to, and show you some of the queer breads eaten in foreign lands.

Open up your foreign school geography. No matter what land your eye selects, come from bread is eaten there. Corned Asia. The bread there is made of wheat and raisin syrup and is baked by the hot sun. This bread is packed in large tin cans and loaded on camels, to be transported in the public market places throughout the country.

The Chinese make a bread from the pith of the Palseira tree which is cut into thin strips and from out flat like a hundred ovals. In contrast to the Chinese leather weight, which is made of the hardy Lycopodium, his bread with a generous proportion of sheep or pig blood. It is called "Blood Bread." Such a bread would hardly taste the fabulous palate of the Americans, who are accustomed to the most correct baked, moist, delicious bread in the world.

The Turk bakes a sun-dried bread filled with chopped meat. The Pacific Islanders make a flour for their bread from the ground roots of the Kasa, while the Greeks take toward the brown, crisp bread sticks made of wheat flour.

In these lands, that lie to the west of the great American West, wheat is steadily gaining sway. Even the Germans and Russians are turning from their dark breads to white bread, and it is estimated that in 1922 over 100,000,000 more wheat flour were being added to the 500,000,000 already made.

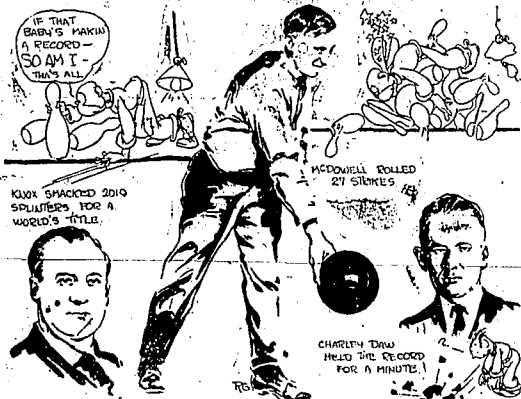

NATIONALS ARE STARTING 48TH SEASON TODAY

Many Stunts Pulled at Opening of Season for National League; Two Promising Rookies Try Out for First Time Before City Baseball Crowd; One Cost \$50,000 and the Other \$75,000; American League Opens Tomorrow.

(By HENRY I. FAHRELL.) NEW YORK, April 17.—One-half of the rosy family of baseball that got to work this afternoon was the National League which in its forty-eight seasons. After the other organizations have finished its parading band playing and flag raising, the American league will stage its jump-off tomorrow.

Four games are carded on the day's program, and favorable weather reported early today probably will not necessitate any postponements.

The world's champion pitcher will open against the Braves in Boston; Cincinnati fans will look at two promising newcomers in the game with the St. Louis Cardinals; the Pittsburgh Pirates will keep the Cubs out of their new ballpark; and the Brooklyn fans will have to watch the "Flats and the Hobins" in a game of ceremonial importance to be provided before the opening of the season "play ball" after the athletes of the bench. It is only on certain occasions like the opening and the big games of the world's series that the umpires put on their high hats and use the words of the book in getting a game started. For ordinary games the umpire usually says "Go with a batter."

In the approved crack of the whip. Commissioner Landis will be the ranking dignitary at Boston, where Christy Mathewson is to make his debut as city pitcher. John Heydler, president of the league, picked Chicago for its place of honor in the new park, which will seat 50,000 fans. Just ordinary club owners, Mayors and leading citizens will hold forth at the other parks.

Arthur Nehf or Hugh McQuinn is expected to get the call for the Philadelphia club; the Giants and Tim McManara, the Northern college star, will be on the mound for the Phillies. If Clegg or Mabeaux probably will pitch for the Phils, and the veteran Dutch Rueter is believed to be a sure starter for the Robins.

NEW CAMPAIGN BUNCOM

A new line of contention, not to say argument, was sprung Monday by the forces of Roberts and Stinson as to why these gentlemen should be elected to commissionships. It was said that it would be unwise to have the commission all one way and that the best thing that could be done would be to elect the opposition to Mayor-elect Shand L. Hodgkin, to the commissionships in order to "even things up." If contention, not harmony, were the objective sought by the voters this would be true. It is a sound rule of government that the administration ought to have a working majority to start with. To elect Stinson and Roberts would be to deprive Mayor Hodgkin of such majority. Commissioners All and Cogswell held their own during the campaign, which just closed. Mr. Lambing for mayor and Roberts and Mr. Atley for the commissionships; in other words he supported two anti-Hodgkin men and one independent. With Roberts and Stinson on the commission the mayor would be in the minority. The result would be a repudiation of the position taken by the voters on April 3. Last year, although Dr. Dwight led the candidate on the other ticket against whom he was pitted, for a run-off, he urged his friends to vote for his opponent in order that the administration should not be hampered.

Granting that there is no moral obligation resting on Stinson and Roberts to do likewise, the argument that they should be elected to create opposition to the mayor falls to the ground, even assuming the claim that there should be some opposition to have merit. For Cogswell holds over, and he was opposed to the election of Hodgkin. He is quite competent to officially present any objections to administrative policies which he may feel. The Times has often disagreed with Cogswell, but has never charged him with breaking his word, or being a sneak or a coward. The idea that it is the duty of the electorate to reverse itself in order to defeat the purposes for which it has so recently voted is more striking on account of its novelty than its soundness.
