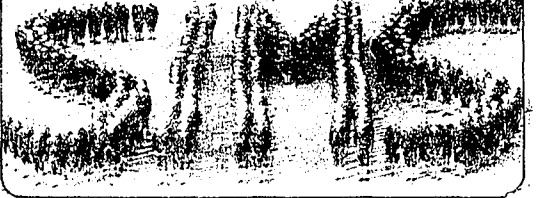

## New Yankee Stadium Opened By American League; 70,000 Attended

## Babe Ruth Hits Home Run Into New York Stadium in Third Inning at Opening American League in New York; Stadium Cost \$2,000,000; Crowd of Over 70,000 Gather Early; Frank Chance's Red Sox Are Opposing Yankees; Bambino Hit Two Homers in Practice.

NUMEROUS military, naval and police celebrities marched across the field for the ceremonies. When the two clubs prepared to take the field the stadium was filled and many fans were standing. The crowd must have been in excess of 70,000 and it was estimated there were at least 5000 outside the stadium. Governor Smith threw out the first ball, and when the Yankee took the field Everett Scott was at shortstop, increasing his record for consecutive life playing to 287 games.

YANKEE STADIUM, New York, April 18.—Babe Ruth's greatest stadium, the finest structure of its kind in the world, was dedicated here this afternoon when the New York Yankees and the Boston Red Sox opened the American league season.

One hour before game time the baseball records had been broken. A crowd of 45,000 was seated in the vast stands. It seemed almost certain that the stadium would be packed close to its capacity of 70,000.

The huge pile of humanity in the stands was more awe-inspiring than the Dempsey-Carpenter fight crowd because it stretched to so much greater boundaries.

Babe Ruth threw the crowd into frenzy when he rapped two tremendous drives far out into the right field bleachers of the first two bulls. Stan James arrested him in batting practice.

The game looked very thin and very earnest in every move he made. Sale of all bleacher and unreserved seats stopped 30 minutes before game time when the stadium had been virtually filled. Crowd still was storming outside when the ticket windows were closed.

DANCING CHAMPS.

What is your private opinion of these girls who wear out several endurances and a half dozen male pursuers before they get the title, "champion of the championship of the world"?

It's an interesting but futile pursuit that will take its health toll later in the young dancers' lives. Over-exertion always presents its bill. And it always arrives—in full.

Men run marathons, collapse at the end. The crowd cheers. No one thinks the runners are "enough" for over-exertion. Other men over-exert, contending to see which can lift the heaviest weights or bend the thickest iron bar over the chest. Crazy! It's never suggested.

But when the girls come forth to demonstrate endurance, you hear people on all sides grunting and snuffing. Envious, perhaps. But, more striking is the demonstration that what's sauce for the goose is not sauce for the gander.

This bit of psychology is evident all through life in its various ramifications. Man seems entitled to make almost any kind of a jackass of himself, without question. Woman, however, is quickly ridiculed.

There's just as much sense in endurance dancing as there is in long-distance running, weight lifting, auto racing—or even baseball, for that matter.

Doctors, interested about the women dancers "wearing out" partner after partner, disagree as to whether it indicates that woman has more endurance than man. However, she has. When a man and his wife get into a run of bad luck, the wife nearly always is last to "throw the sponge." Often, of course, this is because she doesn't realize as thoroughly as her mate, the extent of the trouble they're facing.

Not one man in 10 could endure the anguish of childbirth without "giving up"—killing himself or getting killed.

The endurance dancing craze started in England several months ago. First only a few amateurs took it up. Then whole crowds gathered the spirit. We'll probably have a repetition—people going in a mob to a continuous dance, trying to trip the light fantastic all night or longer.

Break dancing waves come periodically. Epidemic insanity—social hysteria, as the psychologists call it.
