KEEP DAIRY UTENSILS CLEAN

Bacteria Increase in Acidifying Nuts Here When Candied Air Fight—Must Be Kept Dry.

Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture. In dairies where the milk is not pasteurized, it is necessary to keep dairy utensils clean and to keep them dry. It is necessary to keep them dry, so that the milk organisms that are left after sterilization will not multiply greatly in addition to the proper temperature.



All Dairy Utensils Should Be Thoroughly Sterilized Before Use.

It is necessary that moisture be present for these germs to grow, but only a very thin film of water is needed. It is particularly important that milk cans be thoroughly dried and kept dry until used again, says the United States Department of Agriculture. In addition, they must be kept free from contamination with dirt, other oils and fats. Experiments carried on by the department show that a milk can which was covered before being dried the number of bacteria increased 700 times in 24 hours. An average of several tests showed that the count increased from 1,111,511 to 775,749,225. Milk put into cans in which the handles have been permitted to multiply to such an extent will soon that were dried before being used.

The source of milk drying the cans must be sterilized with steam or boiling water. If a sterilizer is used, the cans may be left in it until they are clean to be used again, but there must be some means of ventilation in order to get the moisture out. Care may be set on a rack to dry, but they should be stored from flies and dust, preferably in a well-screened milk house.

Producing Clean Milk. Factors to be observed in producing good clean milk: Clean, healthy cows in clean, well lighted and well ventilated quarters. Plenty of pure water for the feed and milkhouse. Clean utensils, thoroughly washed, steamed and sunned. Sterilizing milk cans with dry heat.

Remove milk from stable as soon as shown from milk cow. Have a separate milkhouse for handling milk and dairy utensils. Cool milk to 50 degrees F. or lower as soon as drawn. Keep milk at a low temperature until delivered and deliver promptly. C. E. Hart, State, Colorado Dairy Commissioner.

"Next to agriculture, the forest industry ranks first in community dependence and in this western country even agriculture depends upon the forests because the effectiveness of the waters used in irrigation is in a large measure dependent upon the headwaters of the streams. The national importance of the conservation of our forests is becoming a matter of general knowledge, but the average citizen fails to see his personal responsibility in the matter. It is this personal responsibility of every citizen which Forest Protection Week aims to emphasize, by being careful with fires in the woods and doing all in our power to protect forest fires and to report or report any which we may discover, we can all help materially to promote the prosperity of our country and state. "About three-fourths of all the forest fires in this state are caused and therefore preventable. Unattended camp fires, cigarette and matches and careless disposal of them are among the more important causes. The United States forest service, the state and the timber industry are spending from one to eight cents per acre per year for the protection of forest land and millions of dollars are represented in the costs of fire fighting and value of the resources destroyed, but not one cent is expended for protective organizations which really are effective unless every citizen cooperates intelligently in seeing that no fire originates through his carelessness."

5—POLITICAL PHASES

IT IS not the primary purpose of this essay to discuss our political organization. Democracy is merely the mechanism which individualism invented as a device that would carry out the necessary political work of its social organization. Democracy arises out of individualism and prospers through it alone.

Without question, there exists, almost all over the world, unprecedented disquietude at the functioning of government itself. It is in part a direct result of war, and in part a result of the aftermath of a period when the government was exercising and the individual feeling from which there is such a widespread feeling of dissatisfaction; one that all human life can be saved by governmental regulation, and the other that all regulation is a sin.

During the war, the mobilization of every effort, the destruction of the normal demand, and the normal avenues of distribution, required a vast expansion over the decline of individualism in order that we might secure definite results. Its continuation would have destroyed the initiative of our people and undermined all real progress. We are slowly getting back, but many will deplore these supposed "short cuts to the millennium."

Much of our discontent takes the form of a demand for a more equitable in the distribution of the products of war. "Ireland's Joan of Arc"



COUNTESS CONSTANCE MARKIEVICZ

Countess Constance Markievicz, often referred to as "Ireland's Joan of Arc," abandoned a life of luxury that she might fight side by side with Irish rebels, risking death sentences and actually undergoing imprisonment.

She has served as a minister of labor in the Irish republican cabinet and was the first woman to be elected to the British parliament, but was not permitted to take her seat because of her Sinn Fein sympathies.

Countess Constance, as she was known as a girl, was born of a noble family in County Wick, Ireland, the daughter of an Irish country squire and his English wife.

From childhood Constance was a sympathizer in the cause of Irish freedom, though her uncle served as British lord lieutenant of Ireland. She received her education from private tutors at home, then went to Paris to study art. There she met Countess Markievicz, Polish count. They were wed and made their home in Dublin.

The countess immediately aligned herself with those Irish who sought separation from England. The count went back to Poland to fight for the freedom of that country.

Countess Markievicz bore a rifle in the Easter revolt of 1916. She was captured and sentenced to death, this sentence being later commuted to penal servitude for life. She later gained her freedom.

When the free state treaty was signed, she joined with the Volunteers in vigorous opposition to it. She

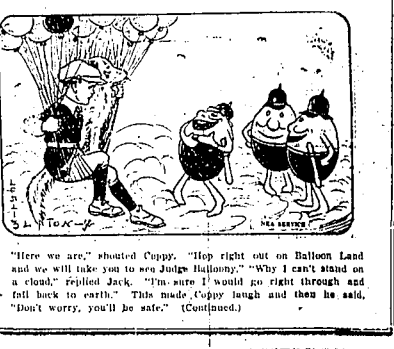

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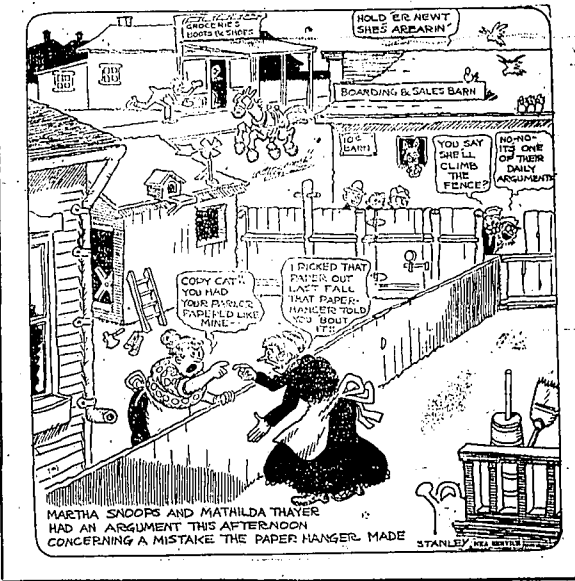

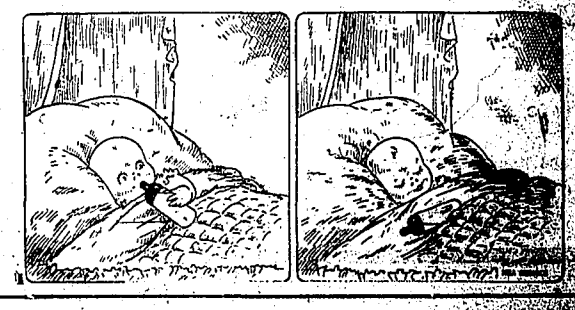

Hall Denies Change to the Roberts and Stinson Ticket Today

Asked "in regard" to reports in circulation to the effect that he had changed from Lewis and Reed, who received his support during the first election campaign and was supported by Stinson and Roberts, Attorney O. C. Hall, progressive candidate for supreme court justice last fall, vigorously denied the charge today. "I said nothing of the kind," he declared, "and I intend to support and vote for Lewis and Reed next Tuesday." About the only thing that I have said about the election was in response to a statement from a lawyer of Jack Roberts to the effect that "I wanted harmony in this city, the best way for him to get it would be to withdraw from the race and save the expense of a campaign and let the candidates who got a plurality and who were in harmony with Major Hoadley."

Vague rumors of chances here and there stems the basis on which considerable news is being done for the Stinson-Roberts ticket; being a sort of "unlabeled" appeal.
