WASHINGTON, D. C., April 23.—In an effort to win the rising temper in republican ranks over the world court, those of the foremost men in that party this week will pour the oil of their eloquence upon the troubled party waters.

President Harding today was delivering the speech he will deliver in support of the world court...

Senators Watson and McCormick intended to take up with Senate leaders on their arrival here tonight the question of pressing to the president an organized protest against making the court proposal one of the principal administration issues.

INDUSTRIAL OZARS GUIDE GERMAN ACTS

Premier Poincare of France in Exclusive Interview Asserts That Germany is Prisoner of Industrial Oligarchy; Says Ruhr Conditions are Improved.

PARIS, April 23.—The Berlin government in the prisoner of an industrial oligarchy similar to the old military oligarchy, which seeks to force Germany into bankruptcy in an attempt to evade payment of reparations, meanwhile using the money to buy the allies to perfect a great industrial machine.

Poincare stated that reports of three cabinet ministers who have just returned show the situation in the Ruhr is getting better and better. He charged that Berlin is directing the armed resistance, extending even to the assassination of French soldiers.

"The population of the Ruhr valley is not the greatest liability to cause the great industrial leaders, who since Versailles have done everything to avoid making reparations, to build their own prosperity at the expense of treaty he said."

"Sometimes however, but most often as an accomplice, the government at Berlin is a prisoner of an oligarchy which, like that of the old time militarists, runs the empire."

"No measures are taken to prevent exportation of capital. Insufficient taxes are inefficiently collected and the fall of the mark is augmented from week to week."

"But at the same time, while they are thus preparing openly and voluntarily for bankruptcy, the money used to pay the allies is employed to perfect an industrial machine and to increase the production of raw materials for the economic struggle of the future."

"During the time when I had France, who must think others will be saved by the German invasion, solve the problem of her financial relations; how low the industrial home for her unhappy people, simply by substituting interest for her defaulting debts."

## WHITE SOX BALL PARK IS DAMAGED BY BIG EXPLOSION

CHICAGO, April 22.—A bomb which exploded last night at the entrance of the Chicago White Sox baseball park, shattering windows and doing other damage to the vicinity, today was attributed by police to labor difficulties or the puller was on baseball grounds.

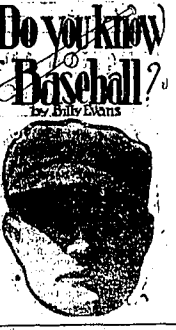

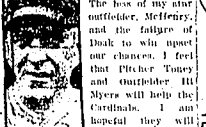

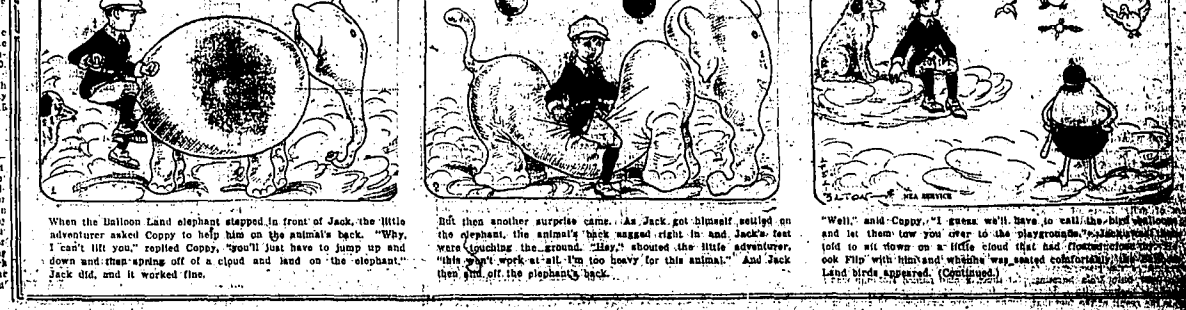

# BIG YIELDS FROM BEETS ARE CITED

Heaviest Growers Last Year Greatly Increase Acreage for Coming Season, but New Growers Are Not Numerous Here; Large Acreage Signed in Bureau and Paul; Season Drawing to Close.

Through three weeks only will elapse before the time for planting beets will draw to a close, and those who planted beets last year are doing their acreage, now signers are coming in slowly and only 3000 acres have been signed up here, while the big plant has a capacity for handling 10,000. Art Egan, who had 100 acres last year now has 125, Sampson and brother, who had 30 acres last year, now have 40, while the Petersons will have 75 acres at Kimberly. That year there were but ten beets planted here, these proved the best, being crop in the community many fields yielded from 15 to 20 tons, depending on the soil, with an average yield of 18 tons. The price received was \$8 a ton.

That the crop is a community benefit on several grounds is pointed out. In the first place it furnishes ready cash. In the second it provides for diversification and in the third a full and give employment to a host of workers who spend a great part of their money in this city and in the surrounding towns. This year 6000 acres have been signed up at Paul and as many at Burley.

Mr. Miller, mailed today District Manager James Selley quotes some figures taken from the books of the company selling the seed. The latter follows: If it had been possible for me to have had all the beets I could have planted this year, but I wish to call your attention to the fact that we had an average of about 10 tons per acre for every acre planted for the Twin Falls factory last year. We had an average of 12 tons per acre for the factory district. The same was the case of 1922. Two years out of three that I have been here both of these years the best crop made was in 1922. I can't say, but any other general crop that I know of, growers are receiving \$8.00 per ton.

# WALTON HOPE OF KU KLUX CANDIDATES

## RAINS ASSURE WATER ON THE SALMON TRACT

With nearly 200 newly registered voters and the McAuley vote to figure on, political operators in this city are predicting a close campaign and a big vote tomorrow.
