Johnson is game. There is no doubt of that. He is green about Jess Willard, however, and that is what does about fighting, granting that Jess knows very little about the man himself, and Johnson did better than he to present himself from an uppercut between now and May 12.

Johnson acquired the moral victory, if there is such a thing, in the fight game, last night. It was almost a complete moral comeback for the plasterer. He proved that he is possessed of gutsiness and that he is not a sucker. He also fought a clean fight, while Johnson was guilty of many uncalculated fouls that were slightly disguised to let the plasterer but failed in their purpose.

**CHICAGO, April 24.**—Steady and another cold wave caused prices to advance on the board of trade today.

Six to eighteen inches of snow was reported covering the wheat fields in Canada and some portions of the northwest, holding up wheat. Exporters predicted Europe would be in the market, thereby driving the next six months. The report of Secretary Miller of the Kansas department of agriculture, showed wheat in the eastern section in excellent condition but poor in the west due to lack of moisture and high winds.

Corn met with good cash demand and offerings were light. Receipts of all primary markets showed considerable falling off. The strength in wheat and unfavorable conditions in many sections of the corn belt for spring work, with the light movement from the farms caused most of the buying.

### IMITATING SMALL DAILIES

The New York Herald yesterday announced the issuance of a miniature newspaper for the busy man which can be read in ten minutes. In taking this step, that newspaper gives official recognition to the complaint an editor voiced against metropolitan newspapers that are too bulky and too cumbersome to be read. It is a far cry from a paper of 30 to 40 pages daily to a miniature paper that can be read in ten minutes. Small town papers often attempt to emulate metropolitan publications, but the action of a metropolitan paper emulating the small town paper is an innovation. It is an injustice way of saying the small town paper has the greatest proportions "pull."

A national advertising agency once said results from advertising campaigns invariably show the small newspaper yields far greater returns per reader than the larger newspaper. The cumbersome metropolitan daily has little opportunity to concentrate the attention of its readers upon any one thing. It is obviously impossible to read a daily newspaper of 6 or more pages in the time the average family gives to reading the day's news. Papers having 20 to 40 pages a day can hope to attract the undivided attention of their readers only on a few favorite features and the outstanding news. And these things are to be found in the small daily.

The only reason for a newspaper carrying columns upon columns of reading matter is to give balance to the heavy advertising patronage. Very little of this superfluous "news" is news at all. Much of it is hopelessly "padding" stuff to fill up space. The experienced reader of newspapers passes it with a glance at the headlines. He could do nothing else. It would take a solid month of reading to consume every word in the big Sunday editions of a New York newspaper.

But advertising stands an equal chance of being overlooked in newspapers of such size. It is necessary to use full-page advertisements at enormous cost to be certain that reader attention will be commanded.

The small daily newspaper has many advantages over the metropolitan editions, not the least of which is that it gives its readers the "cream" of the news—all that they are going to find time to read in a metropolitan daily.—Sheridan (Wyo.) Enterprise.

### THIS SUMMER

"We've been having queer weather lately in most parts of the United States. And we may be in for a queer, unusual summer. The weather bureau in Washington reports that 1922 was the sixth year in succession with temperatures generally above normal east of the Rocky mountains. Since nature in the long run keeps the average yearly temperature finely balanced, the reaction from these six abnormally warm years may be an abnormally cold year.

Will it come in 1923—a cold summer? A cold summer is due, but probably not until about 1926, in line with the climax of the "55-year cycle." Go back two cycles (110 years) from 1926 and you have 1816, "the year without a summer. Snow fell and ice formed in July in many of the northern states, and seed corn in 1816 sold as high as \$4 a bushel," Herbert J. Browne writes in Henry Ford's Dearborn Independent.

Browne quotes from the diary of Charles Peirece of Philadelphia: "August, 1816. Cloudless and cold. Northwest rains. Ice one-half-inch thick. Indian corn frozen."

While 1816 was extraordinarily cold, it was merely one of the "summerless years" that come periodically. The Black sea and the Bosphorus have been frozen over within recorded history. And in the year 1381 even the Adriatic froze.

One thing that helped make 1816 very cold, Browne writes, was the explosion of a huge volcano in the Dutch East Indies in 1816. Fine volcanic dust spread through the atmosphere all over the earth, excluding most sunlight the following year, 1816.

There was, of course, no such catastrophe in 1922, and that will help keep the summer of 1923 normally warm.

Another thing favorable to a warm summer this year is the fact that the Arctic ocean, which has a tremendous determining influence on our weather, has been exceptionally warm this winter. Freshish conditions in the northland are reported by the American coast at Bergen, Norway. He says the cold-water fish have stocked northward. Ice caps in the Arctic are retreating. In Greenland glaciers are melting and exposing ground that had been covered by ice always within the memory of the oldest inhabitants.

The scientific evidence, coupled with precedent, indicates that the summer of 1923 probably will be a warm one, and that the weather will even itself up by sending us a cold summer about 1926—though possibly sooner.
