Lord Robert Cecil Answers Ten Questions for Readers of the Daily Times; Presents Aspects Clarified; American View of League of Nations Impartance.

NEW YORK, April 27.—With the United States joining the League of Nations? What would be the gain by joining? What is the League of Nations? These questions are paramount.

Lord Robert Cecil, greatest British exponent of the much-discussed covenant, says the League is making a series of speeches that will cause it to do up dead war.

Protestants and antagonists of the League of Nations are interested to what Lord Robert says. Nearly every one has a question, and many of them editorial questions.

To get informative answers to such questions the Times of London has prepared a list of 10 representative questions and submitted them to Lord Robert. Here are his answers, personally authorized.

Q.—How many nations are now members of the League? A.—There are now 22 nations who are members of the League.

Q.—What is the League's aim? A.—The League's aim is to prevent war by settling disputes peacefully.

TWELVE DIE IN FIREMEN'S HOUSE BLAZE

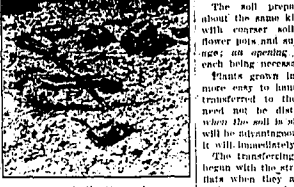


The Flats With Growing Plants, Being Given Fresh Air on a Warm Day. Before They Are Transferred to Pots or Other Containers, for Day Development.

THE VACANT LOTS GOOD FOR GARDEN

Richest Soil is Often Found in Neglected Places—Clean Out Unsightly Weeds.

Why not have a garden this year on that vacant site, town or village lot that is now growing to weeds or covered with empty tin cans? Some of the United States Department of Agriculture. The weeds and tin cans can be

disposed of any thin, and all about and other refuse material should be removed. If there are enough stones present, they might be placed in some of the vacant lots. During the winter months it is well to study the seed catalogues and make up an order of seeds, including peas, beans in the different sizes, and other vegetables. All seed will not grow. Plant to Test Germination is Wise Plan Followed by Majority of Gardeners.

All vegetable and flower seeds do not germinate. There are different tests, summer squash, muskmelon, cucumbers and pumpkins may be tested in the hot water. However, in the small garden to plant not more than 10 or 12 of the most important crops that require considerable space, but of the same thing it is usually desirable to have a small part of the garden devoted to them.

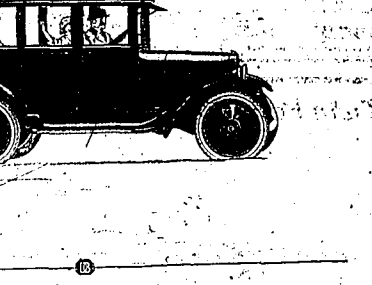

PLANTS GROWN IN POTS ARE THRIFTY

Vegetable or Flowering Stalks Should Be Transferred Several Times.

Pot-grown plants, vegetable or flowering plants, first sown in the flats, then transferred to small pots, then to larger ones, give the best satisfaction, and afford a highly practical method of growing plants in the home.

There is a knack in the handling of plants for the pot-grown variety, but it is not difficult to grow them and the satisfaction obtained is well as the pleasure in the growing process.

The soil preparation should be about the same kind, in the flats, with coarse soil, pebbles, broken flower pots and such, to afford drainage as opening at the bottom of each being necessary.

Plants grown in the summer are more easy to handle when they are transferred to the open the roots must not be disturbed. If removed when the soil is slightly damp. This will be advantageous to the plant, and it will immediately take hold.

The transferring process should be begun with the stronger plants in the flats when they are about one inch high. In the case of the plants for transplanting, the flat should be

watered well before the plants are removed, thus allowing dirt to cling to the roots, which should not be torn or cut, if possible to remove them intact.

Prune the Trees and Vines
Trimming and Spraying Only Sure Way to Obtain Good Crops Free From Diseases.

Pruned trees and vines must be treated as well as sprayed at the proper time. Gardeners cannot hope to obtain fruit from trees and vines that are neglected in this respect, and such treatment is necessary every year.

The early springtime is regarded as the best time to do this work, which should be done with the greatest of care, to save injury to the trees and vines.

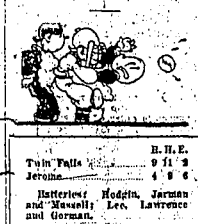

Tommy Murphy Won Million in Driving

Winning in Fourteen Years \$1,085,762.75.

Achievements in Driving Records to Extremely Fast Records More Remarkable Than Amount of Money He Has Captured.

Thomas W. Murphy computes his winnings in the subway in the last fourteen years at \$1,085,762.75 in purses and stakes. Only twice in that period and again last year—has he failed to head the list of successful drivers at the close of the season.

His achievements in driving, trailers and pacers to extremely fast records are perhaps more remarkable than the amount of money he has won.

Horses trained and driven by him now hold the world's records for trotters and pacers of any age also the trotting records for two-year-olds and four-year-olds, and the pacing record for three-year-olds.

Murphy's first championship trotter was Native Belle, whose exceptional time in 2:07 1/4 in 1902 wrested from Aflin the record for two-year-olds that he had held eighteen years. Since then the Poughkeepsie Wizard has driven every champion pacer of the past.

His record for three-year-olds is 2:06 1/4, which is the best in the last six years, and three times with Murphy in the saddle, while the record for four-year-olds during the same period has been lowered from 2:08 1/4 to 2:01 1/4, by young trotters of Murphy's development and training.

Therefore, the average person in 1922 consumed almost 11 pounds of meat less than in 1911. Had meat consumption remained on the 1911 level, the United States last year would have eaten a billion pounds of meat more than it did, prices would have been higher and the producers would have paid the interest on the mortgages.

But why place the blame entirely at Hoover's door? Isn't it just possible that high retail prices had something to do with the small per-capita consumption of meat?—May Sinsert.

In a Pullman-smoking compartment we heard a very rich man boasting that he had won a season baseball pass in a "guessing contest" conducted by a newspaper.

"It worked nights for a week," he chuckled, "and during it I didn't hit it just right!"

In a rough way we know the amount of this man's wealth, by reputation, and we figure that it cost him at least \$500 worth of time to win the prize that he could have bought for less than \$100. Of course, he worked it out in spare time, but spare time is valuable to him because it is needed for relaxation from brain work. Then, too, obsessed with winning the prize, he probably had it on his mind, detracting his attention from his occupation during general working hours of the day.

Eliminate the rash end, it doesn't matter much. For he'd have been just as elated if the ball was a prize of \$1.

How do you explain this rich man's jubilation over a victory that wasn't worth the price it cost him? Your first explanation probably is, "He got something for nothing."

There is no thrill like finding money—getting it without effort. Probably this is a reaction from the enslaving system that keeps our noses to the grindstone. The average millionaire gets a bigger thrill from finding a \$5 gold piece than from cleaning up \$1000 in a business deal. And, no matter how valuable his time, he'll do anything whatever he was intent on, and search the premises to see if more \$5 gold pieces are nearby.

You know how this weakness persists in our subconscious minds and rises to the conscious surface during dreams in which we find coin after coin until our pockets are filled.

"Something for nothing" is the lure that wastes time and takes the pocket's savings.

A greater motive than "something for nothing," however, animated the rich man in the line-walk guessing contest. His thrill, in victory, came mostly from the realization that in winning he demonstrated cleverness superior to that of the other contestants.

In a battle of wits, he won.

That is the motive of your "business genius," as much as and often more than the actual accumulation of profits.

Vanity—pride—is our motive in the things we do to bit often and to greater extent than any of us realize.

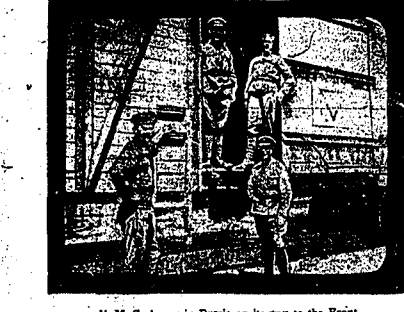

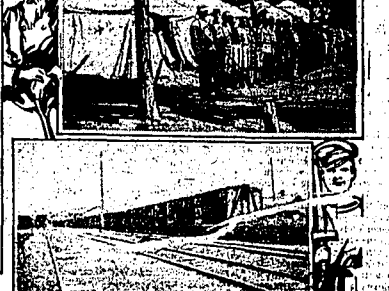
