## ENFORCEMENT WILL NOT BE ISSUE IN '28

Reason Given by Republicans for  
Efforts Which Will Be Made  
to Staff Exploits of Contraband Ships; Likely Candidates  
Look to Future and Prepare  
for Campaigns.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Get rid of prohibition, enforcement of the law, or protection, enforcement will be made to staff, exploit of contraband ships; likely candidates look to future and prepare for campaigns.

That work has been cut from the responsibilities which command it explains the administration's concentration on measures to "dry up" not only the land but also the sea.
