

ENFORCEMENT WILL NOT BE ISSUED IN '24

Reason Given by Republicans for Efforts Which Will Be Made to Build Exploits of Contraband Ships, Tidy Candidates Look to Future and Prepare for Campaigns.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Great risk of prohibition enforcement as a political issue in '24.

This word has come out from the republican high command: it explains the administration's concentration on matters to try to get out the land but also the sea.

It is the reason for the determination to do the best to break up rum running; for the diplomatic negotiations with Great Britain to reduce alcohol prohibition to enforce shore and simply the enforcement laws now in progress in the cleaning up of the coast.

For the same reason the administration will combat attempts in the near future to restrict the liquor import service or to end the Volstead law.

From two parties meet in the summer of 1924, everything possible will be done to prevent the democrats from building a platform on the failure of republican enforcement of the prohibition laws.

The highest plan has for some time, for the enforcement of the liquor laws as one of the major questions of the next campaign.

No such plan has been made of intention of partisan legislation democratic to put in if their national convention is the question of taking a stand for brandy, light wine, on the ground that the Volstead law is not a step towards the end of the liquor traffic.

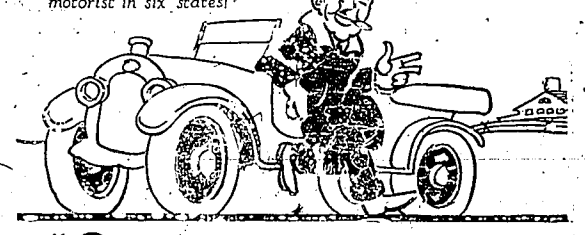

## TWIN FALLS OFFICERS-ELECT FACE GRAVE PROBLEMS

The successful candidates for major and commissioners have been through a very strenuous experience, but it is not a matter to what they will have to face during the coming year in the way of securing the municipal craft through the financial ways and breakers. The greatest single trouble has been the deflation in valuation which has cut the possible receipts to an alarming extent. This cut, due to a real deflation in value here and elsewhere, has produced an unfortunate situation so far as the collection of revenue goes, when it is necessary to keep the machinery of the city going. The street fund is badly in the red at present, regardless of which fund the intersection sprinkling appropriation is charged against eventually. There are \$65,000 of outstanding 1922 general fund warrants and the banks refuse to accept the city warrants on any terms. At best not to exceed \$35,000, or a little more than half, of these can be refunded, due to the state statute. There are plain facts that any incoming administration would have to face. The same problem would have been presented had Lambing, Stinson and Roberts been victorious. Doubtless the Eldridge, the McRoberts and the Tucker administration all made some mistakes, and each in turn was criticized, but natural causes over which none of them had control were mainly responsible for the financial situation in which the city finds itself today, and solving the problem presented is more important than re-terminating over past actions or omissions.

There must be economy somewhere. The city is going to be in a much better condition from the point of view of private business conditions next fall than it is now, and better next spring than in the coming autumn. But until there has been a material growth and increase in land values there will be no increase in valuation and no increase, therefore, possible in the sum total of taxes levied. More property will mean a much larger per cent of collection of taxes levied and this will tend to improve the situation. It is in this way that the increase in revenue will first come about. No increase in valuation would be possible at the present time.

It will take all the legal knowledge of Shad L. Hodgkin and the business acumen of W. T. Leslie and J. S. Keel, accompanied by the practical knowledge of present city conditions acquired by the hold-over commissioners, to meet the situation, and to bring about that degree of retrenchment and economy necessary to bring the city out of the doldrums, while property is retreating in the people.

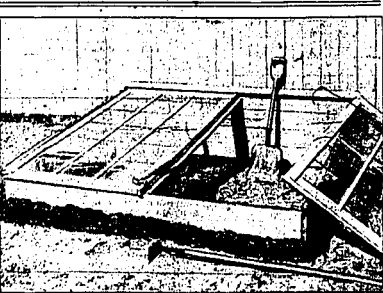

## TO BUILD HOTBED AND A COLD FRAME

With a few boards, straw or something of that sort during the cold nights the most tender plants can be raised just as well as in the open ground. The plants can either be set directly in the soil of the cold frame, which should always be filled and fairly well fertilized, or they can be transplanted into trays with paper banks, or wooden boxes, or into pots, if available, and these should set in the cold frame.

Another method is to build a small pit with fresh manure for one; no artificial heat for other.

Preparing Earth for Small Flats. Plenty of Pebbles or Rough, Fibrous Soil Necessary; Leaf Mold at the Top.

The Cold Frame. In a few cases where the fuel can be located along one side of the house it can be heated with hot water from the hot water heating plant of the dwelling.

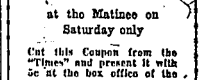

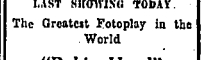
