AS OTHERS SEE US

If your garage sits and the mortgage on your house is foreclosed and your wife has three, do you sit down, writing post cards and tell or do you look the situation straight in the eye, grapple it with both hands and start building anew? If you're a wiser look of the irrigation farmers of southern Idaho, take heart and follow their example.

During the six years of high prices, the Snake river, sole source of the irrigationists' water supply was so low that the crops were short. When water became abundant, prices dropped disastrously. Alfalfa and liegs were the principal output of the district; they did not drop—they tumbled down the price precipice.

Yet the producers did not wait. On the contrary, they got ready for increased production. In January they organized by almost unanimous vote the largest irrigation district in the world for the sole purpose of helping to build the huge American Falls dam and reservoir for the storage eventually of three million acre feet of Snake river flood water, to the end that the threat of a water famine might be definitely averted and the productive area increased by a million acres.

"YOUR OWN BOSS"

Are you nursing a hope that some day you can be "your own boss" instead of working under some one else's order? Certainly. Everybody does.

But there is no such thing as absolute independence in life. Always there is a boss—either a person or a force that stands over us with a whip.

Take the career of one man—Rodger Dolan. In his childhood his mother was his boss. When he grew too large for her to handle, dad stepped in with a whiplash.

Then he retired, with enough money to support him in comfort for the rest of his life.

CHICAGO, April 30.—After an early dip active buying appeared on the Chicago board of trade today and all grain prices strengthened under the lead of corn.

The first loads to reach Chicago loaded with grain left for Buffalo this afternoon carrying 1,000,000 bushels of corn and 125,000 of wheat. Reports from Hutchinson, Kan., reported the winter wheat growing up following last week's rains but stated it was doubtful if the moisture came in time to produce a crop. Other crop and weather reports throughout this country and Canada were favorable.

World shipments of wheat were 12,250,000 bushels, with an increase of about 2,000,000 over last week.

The market was weak of grades but followed in the general advance. Provisions were higher.
