If your garage burns and the mortgage on your house is foreclosed and your wife has beeps, do you sit down, wring your hands and wail or do you look the situation straight in the eye, grapple it with both hands and start building anew? During the war-years of high prices, the Snake river, sole source of the irrigationists' water supply was so low that the crops were short. When water became abundant, prices dropped disastrously. Alfalfa and leglets were the principal output of the district; they did not drop—they leaped and tumbled down the price precipice.

Yet the producers did not wail. On the contrary, they got ready for increased production. In January they organized by almost unanimous vote the largest irrigation district in the west for the sole purpose of helping to build the huge American Falls dam and reservoir for the storage eventually of three million acre-feet of Snake river flood water, to the end that the threat of a water famine might be definitely lifted and the productive area increased by a million acres.

YOUR OWN BOSS

CHICAGO, April 30.—After an early dip native buying appeared on the Chicago Board of Trade today and the market strengthened under the lead of corn.

The first loads in from Chicago loaded with grain left for Buffalo, New York, and the market showed a gain of over 100,000 bushels of corn and 120,000 of wheat. Reports from Hutchinson, Kan., reported the winter wheat market up slightly, but the market was not strong, it was doubtful if the modicum came in time to produce a crop. Other crop and weather reports throughout the country were favorable.

World shipments of wheat were 12,500,000 bushels, while was an increase of about 2,600,000 over last week.
