The doctor may be right in part but we are sure that many leading physicians over the country could not agree to all these statements about the "Quacks."

THE NEW ORDER IN TWIN FALLS

The new city officials took their oath of office last evening and began the work of selecting their subordinate officers. The task before them is a gigantic one. They are called upon to perform almost the super-human and yet we believe they will measure up to the undertaking. With the new administration in power the dictatorship of the Walton-Mills duo has passed and their oligarchy has ceased to function. During the past six months this power has been slipping from them. The officers that they had helped to select turned their backs on them. This blot upon our city might have been prevented a little more than a year ago by the activity of a few more of our citizens in our city election at that time. As the new government takes charge it is with a feeling of hope and inspiration for better things and for a more harmonious administration of the community affairs.

The thing that we need most right now in Twin Falls is to get together and co-operate. To cease knocking and back-biting and to get together and boost. There are too many of us who are too ready to kick the other fellow down because we are not getting by just as we would like. There is a great future stretching out before us and if we will we can enter into the promised land and reach the goal of progress and prosperity.

The ascent to power of the Walton-Mills duo was not the real Twin Falls asserting itself but rather the failure of its better citizens to be aroused. Neglect to perform our duty as citizens in a commonwealth is a serious mistake and yet when the average citizen considers the haul and slash which is thrown at him when he does take part in a city election you are almost compelled to admit that he is justified in neglecting the greatest privilege which is given to an American.

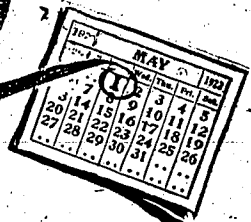
But how since the Hodgins-Kel-Leslie ticket has been elected by small or large majorities they immediately become your officials and my officials. They are no longer the opposition ticket and if we are the citizens that we profess unwarily to be we will get in and do our best to make this administration a success rather than a failure. Two of these men are elected for four years and then Mayor is elected for two years. But regardless of whether any of them ever seek to be re-elected or run for office again let's build here a city government which will be known far and wide for its ability as a law-abiding community. If we continue to disagree and denounce one another how can we get on in the great world of progress? If we stand off and throw rocks at one another how can we hope to get together on the great moral issues of life? These new officials are not perfect. They have all made mistakes and will perhaps make more if they're human, but we believe that they will be actuated by lofty motives and inspired by high ideals and if they are not we can, if necessary, recall them or when the next election comes name new men in their stead. But if Twin Falls is to co-operate and develop here a commonwealth which is worthy of emulation by other cities in Idaho then we must work together rather than pull apart.

There were bitter feelings in the recent election and this one and that one was accused of certain misconceptions and poor judgment but regardless of these we ought now to get together and work for the future of Twin Falls. If we refuse we are worse than a bunch of petty grown-up children jealous of one another and of the power imposed in a few. Surely Twin Falls is not made up of such citizens.

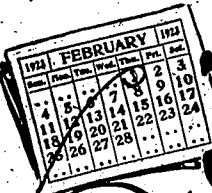

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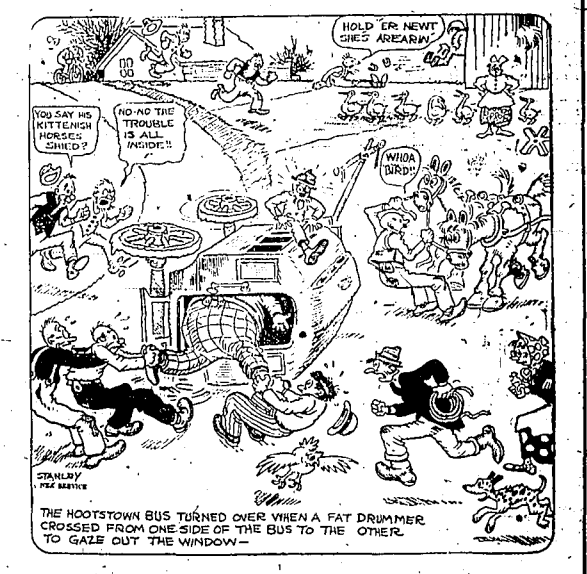

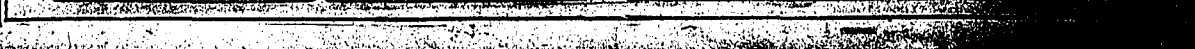

Hays, is a point in favor of the district and is planning to submit the name to the committee, which is composed of representatives to a large extent of dirt farmers representing every part of the tract.
