### NEVER WERE THERE MORE SEEKERS AFTER GOD

Much is said these days about the decline of religion among Christian nations. It is inaccurate, however to say that religion has declined. What has declined is the prestige of the church, as the sole repository and expression of religion.

That the church has no longer the authority nor the social importance that it possessed, say fifty years ago, is undeniable. But it is equally evident to anyone with eyes to see that never in modern times has so eager interest in spiritual things been so pervasive as today. Religion has seeped out of the churches and into the lives of the populace.

And so, while many churches are trying to prove that they are as snappy and up-to-date as the movies and the Sunday supplement, an increasing number of men and women, yes, and of young people, too, are troubled by a spiritual dissatisfaction and stirred by a spiritual seeking.

Can anything so vague be called a religion? Certainly it is not a creed. It is a restlessness, a hunger. It seeks, amid the materialism and the plunging machinery of the modern world, some spiritual center or center around which a life may be concentrated and stabilized. It seeks an escape from the despair that has followed the war. It reaches out for a faith—a hope—something to believe in, something worth dedicating one's self to. Never were there more "seekers after God."

No, it is not a creed. It does not oppose the revelations of science nor the speculations of philosophy. Rather it finds in them a stimulus, an incentive to spiritual effort. It feels that life is too multifarious and mysterious to be summed up in a doctrine; too profound to be plumbed, with the yardstick of a dogma; it is a state of mind—a spiritual alertness—a spiritual awareness. It does not despise the church, but it is not dependent upon it.

Unformulated and unorganized as it is, this religion or religiousness or undirected capacity for religion is the hope of the world. It must grow. It must define itself. It must find leaders and loyal workers. It must be encouraged. For the world is at the parting of the ways, and all that can save it from disintegration and collapse is the impetus of a positive hope, the support of a steadfast faith.

### GOOD EATIN'

Something new, to eat is invented in France and served at the Hundred Club, a famous organization of gourmets. Tony Giron, chef at the Cafe de Paris, originated this new mouth-waterer which has a name as long as a yardstick.

Tony served his latest creation at a banquet given to the mayor of Dijon on the eve of that official's departure for Canada to preach the merits of Burgundy wines. (Thirty Americans will wonder why a missionary is needed.)

Now, ladies, if you want to surprise pa Sunday with Tony Giron's latest delicacy, here's all you have to do: "Bake in the oven large peeled potatoes weighing at least a pound apiece. Cut them open in a snuff-box shape and hollow out the pulp till they are almost shell-like. On the other hand, prepare a fine tomato sauce with two soup-fuls of finely grated cabbage, cheese and half a pound of butter. Whip these ingredients away from the fire and add some mushroom sauce."

"Dress this cream into each potato and then add two delicately rolled fillets of sole poached in white wine, a sea-fan cut in fingers, some shrimps, and some browned mushrooms. Cover with cream and then pass through a hot oven (the food, not you) with." Spruce each potato with a shelled lobster's claw and a thimble sized truffle on top."

Well, if that's too complicated, give pa roast chicken. And the best stuffing for a roast chicken, according to Mme. Yvon, the queen of French cooks, is made by this recipe:

"Season with black pepper, sage and basil savory and sweet marjoram mild, wild thyme and parsley. Soak the stuffing in port wine and truffles for 48 hours. Spread over the chicken a gravy produced by simmering the spines of the birds in a fine wine consommé, to which has been added port wine and Armagnac. If you want to convert this into a peepie, use a thin top breast and run it with port wine jelly."

## The Cottage Gardener

Training Tomato Vines to Stakes is One Very Important and Satisfactory Form of Intensive Gardening. More and Better Fruit Can Be Raised and Cultivation is Easier.

**SWEET PEAS FINE FOR THE BOUQUETS**

No Annual Gives More Beautiful Flowers—Must Be Given an Early Start.

Nothing wants sweeter than No Annual gives more beautiful flowers for cutting, and this about a particularly useful display for a time, but it is not safe to provide bouquets for the home.

No one can have sweet peas without giving them an extra start. They will not mature fast, dry weather and harsh. Consequently they must be started early. If the ground is workable in March they should be sown in shallow trenches deeply, say about 7 inches.

It is much safer and safer to plant them in pots or boxes in a glass house for an early start. The paper flower pots of small size which can be very cheaply purchased, are the most desirable cups which can be had at a small outlay are ideal for starting the individual plants, planting them in the water cups which can be a good plan to have some light sticks seven or eight inches long if they are not over 12 inches at under class for some time right which the six plants may start to climb. ### CABBAGE FAMILY IN HOME GARDEN

Big, Juicy Leaves Supply Splendid Vegetable for Boiled Dinners, Salads.

In its native state it has a loose rosette of large, thick leaves for storage of surplus moisture. It may collect when it rains, and these leaves collect the cabbage of the garden, are large and deeply lobed and have a color from green to red. BATTING IMPORTANT PART OF BALL GAME

Team Will Not Be Successful Unless Players Can Hit Well and Speed on Bases.

Battling is the most important part of baseball. Unless a team has men in its lineup who can hit they will not be successful, no matter how good they may be on the bases. A team that can bat and run base strikes terror into the hearts of its opponents.

Unless you are commonly known as a natural hitter and have the unusual ability to connect with the ball without any difficulty, you must give a great deal of attention to form in batting. The average ball player usually has several faults in the form of batting that if corrected would add points to his batting average and value to his team.

A batter is said to hit in good form when he stands erect at the plate, swings with a stroke that is well controlled, and not so hard that he cannot follow the ball with his eyes. The arms must be kept well away from the body; the stride should be short, and the batter should watch the pitcher toward the plate. The back knee should be rigid and not bent as the swing is taken.

In starting the swing, the bat should be carried well back over the shoulder just before the pitcher is ready to let loose of the ball. When the swing care should be taken not to drop the right shoulder, as this tends to make you hit under the ball.

If the ball is between the shoulder and the waistline, the stroke is merely parallel to the ground; from the waistline to the knee it approaches a golfing stroke. The stroke should be made with a moderate swing that is followed through with the weight of the body behind it. Many a batter is ruined because he "waxins his head" with it. The harder you swing the less likely you are to connect with the ball.

Bearing these fundamental principles in mind, the batter must also take the correct position in the batter's box and hold his bat right. With an ordinary pitcher in the box, the batter should stand from side to twelve inches from the plate and directly opposite the pitcher. Against a pitcher with tremendous speed and a poor curve, stand as far away from the plate as you will not have time to make your stroke. If the pitcher uses many curves and slow balls without swing, stand at the extreme front of the batter's box. This will enable you to crack that slow ball before it curves—or at least before the curve reaches its maximum.

The bat should be held firmly, but with the muscles loose and relaxed in order that a free and easy swing may be obtained. Your hands on the bat should be together, or at the farthest not more than three inches apart.

The batter should watch the ball with an intense concentration, which does not get a second look right of the ball. From the second the ball leaves the pitcher's hand until it is right over the plate the batter's gaze should be intent upon it.

A good batter never hits at a bat ball, but should wait until the one to his liking comes over. Some of the really great sluggers may occasionally hit a bad ball safely, but it is safe to say that "pitchers" out of "treaty hits" are made of balls directly over the plate.
