

SURPLUS WILL BE PAID TO CREDITORS

Expected Deficit Falls to Materialize; Expense of Operating Governmental Machinery to Be Less by \$200,000,000 Than That of Last Year.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 5.—The United States treasury will show a surplus of \$400,000,000 in the fiscal year ending June 30, instead of the expected deficit of \$200,000,000, Budget Director Loomis estimated today.

TAX REVISION ADVOCATED BY GOVERNMENT

Levy on Incomes Below \$5000 Mark Will Probably Not Be Altered; Reduction Asked on Stipends Which Run from That Figure to \$50,000.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The administration is preparing to recommend moderate tax reductions in the next session.

The income tax will include reduction in the income tax rates in the "middle brackets" on incomes above \$2000 a year and below \$5000.

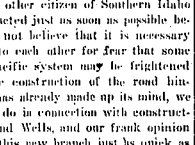

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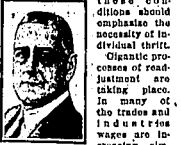
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Ku Klux Klan Is Defended by Burks
