VOTERS MAY CAST BALLOT IN RESIDENCE

Those Living on Different Precinct from Land May Vote at Home Precinct on Saturday. Confidence Expressed in Result.

There are voters living in some of the American Falls reservoir district voting precincts who do not live in other parts of the district. Such voters, together with their wives, can vote in the precinct in which they live irrespective of the location of their property in the district, according to a legal opinion furnished the general committee on information today.

There are two voting precincts on the south side Twin Falls tract, Twin Falls, Duhl and Pler—the same as the election last January when district was organized.
